A white candle is in the middle of the wreath. On the Fourth Sunday in Advent, we light all four candles around the Advent wreath. You may choose to light it now or in the service where indicated.



Devotional thoughts:

In the Old City of Jerusalem, just north of the Temple Mount, stands a church near the Lion's Gate. Nearby are the remains of the Pool of Bethesda where Jesus healed a man who was unable to walk. This church has some of the most wonderful acoustics. It is a spiritual experience to stand there under the dome and sing hymns with fellow believers. The church is known as the Church of Saint Anne.

Lutherans may have heard of St. Anne. On July 2, 1505, the twenty-one-year-old Martin Luther was returning to the University of Erfurt when lightning struck nearby, possibly knocking him to the ground and injuring his leg. In fear, he cried out, "Help me, St. Anne, I will become a monk!" And as they say, "The rest is history."

The Church of Saint Anne is dedicated to Anne and Joachim, the parents of the Virgin Mary. It is the traditional birthplace of Mary.

What do you know about the Virgin Mary? You may have seen a statue of her in front of a church or a home. This time of year, she graces many Nativity Scenes.

In fact, the Bible does not reveal the names of Mary's parents or her birthplace. But we do learn much about Mary by carefully reading what the Bible does say about her. The Gospel of Luke is a good starting place.

We first learn of Mary in our Gospel lesson for today, where we read, "The virgin's name was Mary." In Greek, her name is Miriam. She shared her name with Miriam of the Old Testament, the sister of Moses and Aaron. From this, we may infer that her parents (whatever their names may have been) were devout Jews.

Why is it that Luke can fill in so many details about the events surrounding Jesus' birth? A little detective work may provide the answer.

In the first verses of his Gospel, Luke informs us that he is writing about the life of Jesus after having done significant research, even contacting eyewitnesses. We then read about the birth of John the Baptist and Jesus in the first two chapters. Where does Luke get his information? Twice, Luke gives us clues. In Luke 2:19, he reports, "Mary treasured up all these things, pondering them in her heart." Then again in Luke 2:51, we read, "His mother treasured up all these things in her heart." These two statements lead us to deduce that Luke knew Mary personally or spoke to someone very close to her.

With this in mind, it may well be that Mary's encounter with the angel Gabriel comes to us from her own memory of the event. It has been dramatically portrayed in Christian art throughout the centuries. It is retold each year by children in countless Christmas pageants. Here we learn one of the most important things about Mary. She was a woman of faith. When she was told by the angel, "Nothing will be impossible with God," she responded, "I am the servant of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word."

God has seen no need to send the angel Gabriel to me. But he has spoken to me. He has spoken to me through His holy word. He has spoken to you in the same way. Like Mary, He calls us to faith. He calls us to believe that nothing will be impossible with God!

The "impossible" happened this year! At least, something that many of us thought was impossible. We are living through a worldwide pandemic of epic proportions. We have witnessed untold suffering and death.

For countless people, the impossible has happened. They have examined their personal frailty and weakness. We have learned again of our need to trust in God.

But why trust in God? After all, what is there that is good about me that would make God care? I don't belong on His "nice" list. I have fallen short of His glory. I have sinned in thought, word, and deed. Do you want to know a secret? So have you!

But the impossible has happened! God so loved the world that He gave His only-begotten Son so that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life! I know that doesn't seem reasonable but it is true.

When the disciples heard Jesus say, "It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the kingdom of God" (Matthew 19:24), they responded with this question, "Who then can be saved?" It seems impossible! Jesus calmed their fears by assuring them, "With man this is impossible, but with God all things are possible" (Matthew 19:26).


The impossible became possible when Jesus paid for the sins of the whole world. The impossible became possible when Jesus rose from the dead. The impossible became possible when God welcomed you into His family.

This Advent and Christmas are difficult. We are pressed upon and strained in many ways. But this does not lessen our true joy. The impossible foretold by Isaiah has happened, "Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel" (Isaiah 7:14 KJV). "When the fullness of time had come, God sent forth his Son, born of woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons" (Galatians 4:4-5)

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice. Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:4-7).

The Fourth Sunday in Advent December 21 – December 26

Note: The Christmas season begins with the Christmas Eve service. It is preferably conducted after sunset on December 24.

Introduction

Most modern forms of mediation turn a person inward. Biblical meditation turns a person outward toward what God has said and done especially what He has said and done through Jesus for our salvation.

Each Sunday has its own special theme directing us to meditate on God's word and actions. This theme is found in the Propers of the Day (the parts of the service that change week to week). From Advent through the Easter season these themes focus our attention on the life of Jesus from His birth to His death and resurrection. There is always much more in the propers than can be covered in any Sunday service. God willing, I will use the propers for Sunday to provide you with a devotion each day to help you mediate on what God has done for you.

Monday

Today is the winter solstice. Today is also the conjunction of Jupiter and Saturn, the so-called, "Christmas Star." You might be able to see them just after sunset in the southwest sky.

While Christmas does fall close to the solstice, an honest and thorough study of the history of the date of Christmas will show that early Christians did not celebrate the Savior's birth at this time of year because of the solstice. That's a story for another day.

Likewise, many have sought to explain the Star of the Wise men as a conjunction of planets. However, a careful reading of Matthew will show that such a heavenly event does not fit the text. Again, this is a story for another day.

What we do learn by looking at the sky is explained in Psalm 19:1, "The heavens declare the glory of God, and the sky above proclaims his handiwork."

Before electric lights, the night sky was a universal experience of humanity. Today, we spend most nights inside our homes. When we do go out at night, the stars fade from sight. I am fortunate enough to spend some nights each year many miles from electricity. There, I often go out at night and think of shepherds abiding in the field keeping watch over their flocks by night.

When you can, take a moment a look up on a clear night. Marvel at the moon and the stars. Enjoy the northern lights when you have the opportunity. Then pause and realize that the God of creation has revealed Himself to you in the Bible.

There you learn that the baby born in Bethlehem came into the world to save sinners! There is nothing more marvelous than that.

Let us pray. O Great Shepherd of the sheep grant to us true repentance and faith as You restore us and save us. Let your face shine upon us and give us peace.

Christmas continues because God's grace and mercy continue. They are new every day. We live under the cross, in view of the empty tomb. We will always sing in our hearts, "Christ the Savior is born!."

As we often say in our family, happy Christmas Eve Eve! Advent has been an especially difficult journey this year. Covid-19 cases are surging. The economy is staggering. It's been a long and winding road! How did we ever make it?

There is only one answer to that question. God's steadfast love!

Psalm 89 has a total of 52 verses! Our psalm this week is only the first 5. Let's look at a few more.

Not only do the heavens praise the wonders of the Lord (v5) but He also rules "rule the raging of the sea." (v.9),

Consider verses 11- 18:

- ¹¹ The heavens are yours; the earth also is yours; the world and all that is in it, you have founded them.
- ¹² The north and the south, you have created them; Tabor and Hermon joyously praise your name.

¹³ You have a mighty arm;

strong is your hand, high your right hand.

- ¹⁴ Righteousness and justice are the foundation of your throne; steadfast love and faithfulness go before you.
- ¹⁵ Blessed are the people who know the festal shout, who walk, O Lord, in the light of your face,
- who exult in your name all the day and in your righteousness are exalted.
- ¹⁷ For you are the glory of their strength; by your favor our horn is exalted.
- ¹⁸ For our shield belongs to the Lord, our king to the Holy One of Israel.

When we consider God's might and power and the blessings that He brings to us, especially in Jesus, we cannot help but conclude our thoughts with the last verse of this psalm:

⁵² Blessed be the Lord forever! Amen and Amen.

¹Now when the king lived in his house and the LORD had given him rest from all his surrounding enemies, ²the king said to Nathan the prophet, "See now, I dwell in a house of cedar, but the ark of God dwells in a tent." ³And Nathan said to the king, "Go, do all that is in your heart, for the LORD is with you."

⁴But that same night the word of the LORD came to Nathan, ⁵"Go and tell my servant David, 'Thus says the

LORD: Would you build me a house to dwell in? ⁶I have not lived in a house since the day I brought up the people of Israel from Egypt to this day, but I have been moving about in a tent for my dwelling. ⁷In all places where I have moved with all the people of Israel, did I speak a word with any of the judges of Israel, whom I commanded to shepherd my people Israel, saying, "Why have you not built me a house of cedar?" ⁸Now, therefore, thus you shall say to my servant David, 'Thus says the LORD of hosts, I took you from the pasture, from following the sheep, that you should be prince over my people Israel. ⁹And I have been with you wherever you went and have cut off all your enemies from before you. And I will make for you a great name, like the name of the great ones of the earth. ¹⁰And I will appoint a place for my people Israel and will plant them, so that they may dwell in their own place and be disturbed no more. And violent men shall afflict them no more, as formerly, ¹¹from the time that I appointed judges over my people Israel. And I will give you rest from all your enemies. Moreover, the LORD declares to you that the LORD will make you a house.

¹⁶And your house and your kingdom shall be made sure forever before me. Your throne shall be established forever."

This portion of 2 Samuel talks about the building of the temple in Jerusalem. David is concerned that he lives in a nice house of cedar but God is still dwelling in a tent (the tabernacle). Of course, David is not permitted to build the temple as a house in which God dwells. He may raise the finances but building it will be left to his son, Solomon. The temple built by Solomon was magnificent. It stood for centuries until destroyed by the Babylonians.

Following the exile, the returning Jews again built a temple. Unfortunately, this temple could not compare with the one built by Solomon, When people who remembered the original temple saw the second one, they wept!

In Jesus' time, the temple was again spectacular. It had been expanded and rebuilt by Herod the Great. Yet Jesus says, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up" (John 2:19). Jesus wasn't speaking of the temple built with stones, He was speaking about the temple of his body (John 2:21).

The story of Christmas is the story of God Himself coming to live with His people in the person of Jesus. This is in fulfillment of the prophecy of Isaiah referenced in Matthew 1:23, "'Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall call his name Immanuel' (which means, God with us)."

God is still living with us today, wherever we are. This is the promise recorded in the last words of the Gospel of Matthew, "I am with you always, to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20).

Christmas is the story of God coming into our world so that we will one day live in eternity with Him forever.

Prayer: Mercifully hear, O Lord, the prayers of Your people, that we may always be aware of Your presence in our lives and grant us the faith to trust Your promise of eternity with You, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

¹⁵When the angels went away from them into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go over to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has made known to us." ¹⁶And they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby lying in a manger. ¹⁷And when they saw it, they made known the saying that had been told them concerning this child. ¹⁸And all who heard it wondered at what the shepherds told them. ¹⁹But Mary treasured up all these things, pondering them in her heart. ²⁰And the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

God has granted me the privilege of traveling to Bethlehem twice. Each time, I was able to visit the Church of the Holy Nativity and descend to the grotto of the traditional birthplace of Jesus.

I also visited two different sites identified as the Shepherd's Fields. Both sights featured caves. One of them had an extensive underground structure that was ideal for a dwelling. It is easy to imagine shepherds living in these cozy surroundings.

One argument against a December date for Jesus' birth is the fact that Luke reports shepherds in the fields at night. The complaint is that December is the rainy season and shepherds wouldn't be in the fields. Clearly, these critics have never visited Bethlehem. In this particular field, the caves were spacious enough for shepherds, their families, and their flocks to find shelter in times of rain.

Of course, it doesn't matter if Jesus was born in December or July or any other month. The most important thing is that God's own Son was wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger. He came to bring salvation to shepherds and tax collectors, fishermen and farmers, young and old, Jew and gentile, men and women, young and old. He came to save sinners of whom I am chief.

Prayer: Most merciful God, You gave Your eternal Word to become incarnate of the pure Virgin. Grant Your people grace to put away fleshly lusts, that they may be ready for Your visitation; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.. Amen.

But today, He is with us always, even to the end of the age. And one day, He will take us to be with Him in paradise.
