**"Life eternal! Heav'n rejoices: Jesus lives who once was dead"** are words to sustain us through our earthly pilgrimage.

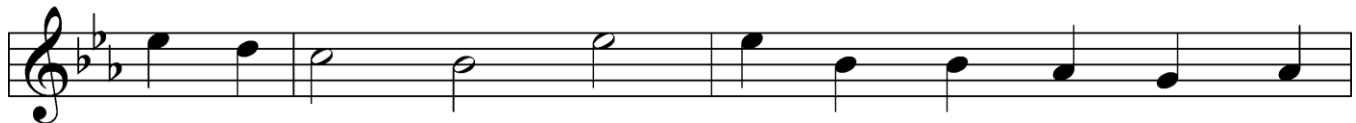

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## Devotional thoughts:

The word “saint” has an interesting history. It comes to us from Latin but first, it takes a long journey through French and Middle English. The original Latin word is *sanctus* which means holy. In our communion liturgy, we sing the Sanctus which begins “Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God of power and might.” *Sanctus* in turn is the Latin word for *Hagios* which is holy in Greek. So the word saint means “holy one.” The New Testament uses the word saint approximately 80 times.

Today we often use the word saint to refer to someone who lives an especially good life towering above the rest of humanity. Some of these “exceptionally good” people have been designated by the Roman Catholic Church to be called saints. But this is not how the Bible uses the word. In the Bible, the word saint is simply a designation for Christian people. In biblical terms, you and I are saints! “How can this be?” you may ask. “If saint means holy, how could this refer to me?”

Yes indeed, it is true. You are a saint. You are holy! You are holy because Jesus has taken your sins away. When your sins have been forgiven, in God’s eyes, you are a saint! Of course here on earth, you are also a sinner. These two realities live side by side in us and all the Christian people. One day, when we join with all the saints in heaven, the sinner part of us will be gone and we will only be holy for all eternity.

There are three saints that I would like for us to consider. The first one is Stephen. You can read about Stephen in Acts 6-8. He is an example of someone that we would normally consider a saint in our way of thinking.

Stephen was one of the first seven assistants chosen to help the Apostles. In Acts 6:5, we learn that he was a man full of faith and of the Holy Spirit—a saint! Luke goes on to report that he was doing great wonders and signs among the people. Like Jesus, he is arrested and brought before the council.

In Acts 7, Stephen delivers a powerful message that condemns them for killing Jesus, the “Righteous One.” This enrages the council. They drag him out of the city and stone him. As he is dying, Stephen calls out, “Lord

Jesus, receive my spirit.” His final words are, “Lord, do not hold this sin against them” (Acts 7:59-60). Indeed, Stephen was a saint!

The second saint for us to consider does not seem very saint-like. We don’t know anything about his childhood or early life. We can guess that it didn’t go well. I’ve often imagined that he was a disappointment to his mother and father. Anyway, we know that he eventually became a criminal and paid the ultimate price for his crimes. He was crucified. He appeared to get what he deserved.

But this is not the end of the story. As you may have guessed, he was crucified on the cross next to Jesus. As his final hours of life were slipping away, he met the Lord of Life. Luke records this,

<sup>39</sup> One of the criminals who were hanged railed at him, saying, “Are you not the Christ? Save yourself and us!” <sup>40</sup> But the other rebuked him, saying, “Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation?” <sup>41</sup> And we indeed justly, for we are receiving the due reward of our deeds; but this man has done nothing wrong.” <sup>42</sup> And he said, “Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom.” <sup>43</sup> And he said to him, “Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in paradise.” (Luke 23:39-43).

Here is a man who died a saint! Yes, he was only a saint for a few hours, if that. But through faith in Jesus, his sins were forgiven and he received the gift of eternal life. No, he didn’t fit our contemporary definition of a saint but nevertheless, he was. And is!

The third saint for us to reflect on is the only one that ever lived who was a saint on his own merits. He was born in Bethlehem, wrapped in swaddling clothes, and laid in a manger because there was no room for him in the inn. Although he was tempted by Satan, himself, he never sinned! The Bible tells us, “He appeared in order to take away sins, and in him there is no sin” (1 John 3:5). This Sinless Saint went to the cross and paid for the sins of the whole world so that we can become saints!

All the saints in heaven are there because Jesus went to the cross. You and I are saints because Jesus went to the cross. You and I will one day join Him in paradise because this Saint took our sins upon Himself and gave to us His holiness! He has made us saints!

Today we thank God for all the saints who are now with Jesus in paradise and we look forward to the day when we will join them for all eternity.

“Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus” (Philippians 4:6-7).

God’s richest blessings to you in Christ.

#### Introduction

Most modern forms of mediation turn a person inward. Biblical meditation turns a person outward toward what God has said and done especially what He has said and done through Jesus for our salvation.

Each Sunday has its own special theme directing us to meditate on God's word and actions. This theme is found in the Propers of the Day (the parts of the service that change week to week). From Advent through the Easter season these themes focus our attention on the life of Jesus from His birth to His death and resurrection. There is always much more in the propers than can be covered in any Sunday service. God willing, I will use the propers for Sunday to provide you with a devotion each day to help you mediate on what God has done for you.

On this Election Day, as we make our voices known through the privilege of voting, our nation is sharply divided. Unfortunately, many on each side see those on the other side as evil. ## Revelation 7:9–17

These words from Revelation give us more than enough to consider for the entire week. For now, let us consider the words of the great multitude, “Salvation belongs to our God who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb!”

Though most of the decades of my life, our nation has become more and more fascinated with the non-Christian religions of the world. Each of them is unique in its own way but they all have one thing in common: The good are rewarded in eternity and the evil are punished. This reward or punishment may come through reincarnation or some form of heaven and hell. They all are united in this thought, your eternity is determined by what you do, think, and say in this life. We are all subject to some form of karma.

The Bible rejects such thinking. Salvation does not depend on me and my actions. My salvation depends upon God had His actions for me in Jesus, the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Left to my own devices, I will get what I deserve: eternal death and punishment for my sin—karma if you will.

But thanks be to God, I have been given the gift of eternal life because of what Jesus has done for me! This is the Christian faith. There is none other like it. It is along in declaring, “Salvation belongs to our God who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb!”

Prayer: O Lord God, thank you for the gift of forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation. Grant that I may be faithful to You until the day you call me out this present time of tribulation and trial, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

If you have been following along with these home worship services and daily meditations, you will know that this is the first time I have saved the Gospel lesson for Saturday.

Matthew 5-7 is Jesus’ Sermon on the Mount. You may wish to read the entire sermon today. The most famous part is The Beatitudes, our Gospel lesson for this week.

On the northern shore of the Sea of Galilee on top of a mount is the Church of the Beatitudes. It is a modern church located not too far from Capernaum which served as Jesus’ home base for ministry. A church has been located on this site since at least 381 when it was reported on by a pilgrim to the Holy Land. On the side of the mount, you can recognize a natural amphitheater where it is easy to imagine Jesus delivering His



sermon.

These words of the Beatitudes begin Jesus' sermon on righteousness. Whenever I read this sermon, I am taken aback by how far I fall from Jesus' expectations. No wonder that people prefer to read the Beatitudes and Jesus' promise of blessings.

The entire Sermon on the Mount is a sermon on God's grace. None of us can be perfect as God is perfect (Matthew 5:48). None of us can live up to the law's demands as Jesus articulates it in this powerful sermon. We only can receive perfection from God by grace. The poor in spirit receive the kingdom by grace. When we come humbly to Jesus not relying on our own merit or worthiness but poor in spirit, He gives us all the blessings of living with Him for time and eternity!

Prayer: O Lord, thank You for Your gift of grace. Grant that we may always receive the blessings You have for the poor in spirit. Amen.

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
