Devotional thoughts:

John appeared! Today, we know more about John the Baptist than the people who first went to be baptized by him. Luke tells us that his parents were Zechariah, a priest serving in the temple, and Elizabeth. Elizabeth, as a descendant of Aaron, was also raised in a priestly family. His birth was announced by the angel Gabriel who gave him the name John.

John appeared! He appeared in the wilderness proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And the people came! They came from far and near. The Jordan River is about 25 miles east of Jerusalem a few miles past Jericho. The journey is not easy. They must travel through a dry and desolate country but the people came! They came because they craved what John was offering, a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. They craved forgiveness.

This reminds me of a significant event early in my ministry. There was a young couple who, under unusual circumstances, came to me to officiate for their wedding. That is a story for another day. They were not members of our congregation. In fact, they lived about 50 miles away in the remote forests of Northwestern Ontario. So I wasn't surprised when I did not see them again for a number of months.

One Sunday morning, this same couple appeared in church. I couldn't miss them. They sat in the front row! Of course, our church was so small that I wouldn't have missed them if they had been sitting in the back row. One thing was different about them. God had granted them a baby!

Following the service, as was my custom, I greeted the people at the back of the church. But this young couple remained near their seats in the front of the church. When everyone left, I walked up to greet them.

I was surprised when the baby's father turned to me. I saw tears streaming down his cheeks!

I asked, "What is wrong? Is there something I can do to help?" He looked at me with his red eyes and softly said, "This is the first time I have ever heard of forgiveness." These were not tears of sadness. They were tears of joy!

For those of us raised in our church, forgiveness is something we often take for granted. It is offered every Sunday in church. It is new every morning. Living in faith means we are drenched with forgiveness all day, every day! But it was something new for this young couple. It was something that the people of Judea and Jerusalem craved. To receive forgiveness, they were motivated to take an arduous journey to the Jordan River to be baptized by John!

One day, among the throngs coming to John for baptism, was Jesus! Luke tells us that Elizabeth and Jesus' mother, Mary were related. John's entire ministry was directed toward this day. He came to prepare the way for Jesus and His ministry. It is only through Jesus that forgiveness of sins became a reality!

Many people ask, "If Jesus is sinless, why must He be baptized?" That is not too difficult to answer. In Jesus' case, John's baptism was more than a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. When John, himself, has doubts about baptizing Jesus, Jesus explains that John should baptize Him because it is, "fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness" (Matthew 3:15).

The second reason Jesus is baptized is to reveal Him to be the Son of God! God had told John, "He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain, this is he who baptizes with the Holy Spirit" (John 3:33). John was sent to prepare the way for the coming savior but until Jesus was baptized, John did not know who the savior would be. Following Jesus' baptism, John says, "I have seen and have borne witness that this is the Son of God" (John 3:34).

And so, when Jesus is baptized, a most dramatic thing happens! Mark records it this way. Jesus was "baptized by John in the Jordan. And when he came up out of the water, immediately he saw the heavens opening and the Spirit descending on him like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, "'You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased'" (Mark 1:9b-11).

We have just celebrated Jesus' birth. We have learned of visits by shepherds and wise men. We witnessed Jesus increase in wisdom and in stature and in favor with God and man. Now we are ready to walk with Him from the Jordan to Calvary. There He again will be recognized as the Son of God. But this time it will be by the centurion standing at the foot of the cross. This was his exclamation when he witnessed the Lamb of God who was being offered as a sacrifice to take away the sins of the world.

You and I are privileged to receive this forgiveness won by Jesus on the cross. We receive it in baptism. We receive it in the Lord's Supper. We receive it when spoken to us by fellow believers. But every time we receive it, we receive it by faith. And as we receive forgiveness, we receive life and salvation! For where there is forgiveness of this there is life and salvation. This very Son of God was given to us so that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life. Thanks be to God!

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice. Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:4-7).

God's richest blessings to you in Christ.

From earliest times the birth of Jesus, Epiphany, and The Baptism of our Lord have been closely associated in the Church Year. By 385 Epiphany and The Baptism of our Lord was a major eight day celebration in Jerusalem.

The Baptism of Jesus in the Jordan River is a much loved subject of Christian art. It adorns stained glass windows, paintings and icons.



Although The Baptism of our Lord is often passed over in many non-liturgical churches, it affords us the opportunity direct our attention to Jesus' message and ministry. John the Baptist, Jesus, and His disciples all share a common message, "Repent for the Kingdom of God is at hand." From their time until now, baptism and repentance have been closely connected.

As we celebrate the beginning of Jesus' ministry at His baptism, let us see its fulfillment in the cross and resurrection. Jesus' Baptism is the ideal time for us to remember that in baptism we have been truly connected to Jesus' death and resurrection. May we daily return to baptism in repentance and live the new life we have received by the working of the Holy Spirit through baptism.

Introduction

Most modern forms of mediation turn a person inward. Biblical meditation turns a person outward toward what God has said and done especially what He has said and done through Jesus for our salvation.

Each Sunday has its own special theme directing us to meditate on God's word and actions. This theme is found in the Propers of the Day (the parts of the service that change week to week). From Advent through the Easter season these themes focus our attention on the life of Jesus from His birth to His death and resurrection. There is always much more in the propers than can be covered in any Sunday service. God willing, I will use the propers for Sunday to provide you with a devotion each day to help you meditate on what God has done for you.

Our introit for this week includes verses from Psalm 2. Psalm 2 has long been associated with the baptism of Jesus. At Jesus' baptism, God the Father declares, "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." In Psalm 2:7, we hear God declare that the coming Messiah is His son: "The Lord said to me, 'You are my Son; today I have begotten you.'"

The antiphon for this week from Isaiah 42:1 also reminds us that Jesus' baptism is an indication that He is chosen by God to be the savior.

But Psalm 2 is particularly appropriate for this time in the history of our country. It seems to me that many in our country have become overly fixated on politics. The chaos at our Capitol last week is just the latest in a string of heated demonstrations and riots that have gripped our nation in recent months. There seems to be hardly anyone in our country that hasn't chosen sides. Psalm 2 provides an important correction for a time like this.

Psalm 2 begins with these words, "Why do the nations rage and the peoples plot in vain?" These words are a good reminder that we ought not to put our trust in politics and governments. All of their plotting is in vain. Our real trust must be in God alone. Every other thing is sinking sand.

Psalm 2:4 is one of my favorite verses in this psalm. It says, "He who sits in the heavens laughs." When people in authority plot against God and His plans, God simply sits in heaven and laughs.

We are so often caught up in the here and now that we forget to pause and consider the big picture. God is still in control. He has done everything necessary for our salvation. He will certainly take care of us in difficult times, no matter how the nations may rage and plot against us.

L Let us pray. O Lord Jesus, You are the only-begotten Son of God come into the world to be our savior, grant that we may never become so caught up in the affairs of the world that we forget this wonderful truth.

On two separate occasions Scripture records that God the Father publicly declared Jesus to be His Son. Once was at Jesus baptism and the other was on the Mount of Transfiguration. A number of times the Bible clearly teaches us that Jesus is God's only-begotten Son. You may ask, "What is begotten?" Begotten is the opposite of adopted. We are adopted children of God. Jesus is begotten. He is the only-begotten Son but not the only son. God's family is immensely large with those who have been adopted into God's family by faith through Holy Baptism.

As children of God we are heirs of the salvation won for us by our brother, Jesus. Read more about this in Ephesians 1:3-10:

³ Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, ⁴ even as he chose us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and blameless before him. In love ⁵ he predestined us for adoption to himself as sons through Jesus Christ, according to the purpose of his will, ⁶ to the praise of his glorious grace, with which he has blessed us in the Beloved. ⁷ In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace, ⁸ which he lavished upon us, in all wisdom and insight ⁹ making known to us the mystery of his will, according to his purpose, which he set forth in Christ ¹⁰ as a plan for the fullness of time, to unite all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth.

Let us pray: Father in heaven, at the Baptism of Jesus in the Jordan River You proclaimed Him Your beloved Son and anointed Him with the Holy Spirit. Make all who are baptized in His name faithful in their calling as Your children and inheritors with Him of everlasting life; through the same Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

The hoopla of the holidays is past. We are entering the doldrums of winter. In southwest Michigan, one day pretty much seems like another. Being so close to Lake Michigan we experience what some have dubbed “permacloud.”

Hidden behind all the drabness of winter, we have a God who is powerful and full of majesty. Sometimes we see His majesty in majestic mountain vistas or the beauty of rainbows. Sometimes we see His majesty in the amber waves of grain. Sometimes we see His majesty in tornadoes, hurricanes, earthquakes, and blizzards.

But more important than seeing God’s majesty in the created world is hearing His voice in the Gospel. The Gospel of salvation through faith in Jesus is more majestic than any grand vista or natural weather phenomenon. When we hear it every day, we may be tempted to think that it is drab and featureless. But it is quite the opposite. God’s only-begotten Son has set aside His throne of glory to come and be one of us.

During the Epiphany season, we will catch a glimpse of His glory as when He changes water into wine, or heals the sick, or makes the lame to walk, or the deaf to hear or the blind to see. We catch a glimpse of His glory when He calms the storm or feeds the five thousand. But we most clearly see His glory when it is hidden in the drabness of the cross and we hear Him say, “Father, forgive them.”

Prayer: O Lord, thank You for the steadiness of Your love for us. Let us never tire of it or begin to think that it is drab and unimportant. Grant us peace that surpasses all understanding because we have witnessed the glory of our Savior giving Himself for us on the cross. Amen.

There is so much happening in our lessons this week that I’m slightly embarrassed that it has taken until today to think about the grand doctrine of the Holy Trinity. How do we know that the true God is the Triune

God? We know this because He has revealed this fact to us in the Bible.

At Jesus' baptism in the Jordan River, we see the Son of God being baptized. God, the Father's presence is made known through the voice coming from heaven declaring, "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." We witness the Holy Spirit's presence in the form of a dove descending upon Jesus.

There are other places in Scripture that witness to the truth of understanding God as Three in One and One in Three. As we ponder Jesus' baptism, we cannot help but remember our own. We were baptized according to Jesus' direction in Matthew 28:19, where He commands, "make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

The Old Testament Lesson this week from Genesis 1:1-5 is a witness to this fact. Here in the very second verse of the Bible we first meet the Holy Spirit. He was hovering over the face of the waters.

Today, He also comes to us through water. The Holy Spirit is granted through the waters of our baptism. And in our baptism, the Holy Spirit makes us beloved children of God.

Prayer: Almighty God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit bless and preserve us always in our baptismal grace. Amen.

¹What shall we say then? Are we to continue in sin that grace may abound? ²By no means! How can we who died to sin still live in it? ³Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? ⁴We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life.

⁵For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. ⁶We know that our old self was crucified with him in order that the body of sin might be brought to nothing, so that we would no longer be enslaved to sin. ⁷For one who has died has been set free from sin. ⁸Now if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. ⁹We know that Christ being raised from the dead will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. ¹⁰For the death he died he died to sin, once for all, but the life he lives he lives to God. ¹¹So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

The Bible is rich in baptismal theology. These verses from Romans form a central focus of any discussion of Christian baptism.

The natural man is tempted to think of free forgiveness as a license to sin. Nothing could be farther from the truth. Those of us who have been baptized in the Christ Jesus are baptized into His death. This means that as

new people in Christ, we are dead to sin and alive in Him.

Yes, we still may in weakness succumb to the temptation to sin, but that is not who we are. We are no longer creatures of sin and evil. We are a new creation. We are no longer slaves to sin. We are dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

Prayer: O Lord, thank you for making us new people in Christ Jesus. Grant that Satan would never deceive us into sinning by whispering the promise of forgiveness in our ears. Amen.
