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Devotional thoughts:

On which day of the week did you celebrate your birthday last year? How about next year? The day of your birthday celebration changes from year to year. Doesn't it? So does our celebration of Jesus' birth. Because of this, we do not have the opportunity to observe the Second Sunday after Christmas every year. But when we do, our Gospel lesson is always Luke 2:40–52, the account of Jesus at the temple when He was twelve years old.

This is the last time we learn about Jesus in Scripture until He is about 30 years old and the beginning of His ministry at His baptism in the Jordan River. Our Gospel lesson for next week will be this account from the Gospel of Matthew.

While we do not know much about Jesus' youth, we can glean much from these few verses. First, Luke reports that Jesus grew and became strong, filled with wisdom.

Since we know Jesus was not only truly God but also truly a man, we know that He experienced life much the same way that we do. Mary and Joseph were able to witness Him go through the stages of development that happen to all of us. He was born and grew from infancy to childhood. With encouragement from mom and dad, He learned how to walk and talk. He progressed from being totally dependent on His parents to being more and more independent. It is clear from our Gospel lesson, that Mary and Joseph were faithful in teaching Him Holy Scripture and how to be faithful to everything that God expects from us.

Then, when He was twelve years old, something amazing happened on their annual trip to Jerusalem for the Feast of the Passover. Jesus began to understand that He was transitioning from childhood to adulthood. This happens to all of us at about the same age.

As an adult, Jesus knew that He must take up His life's work. But as so often happens, He may have been a little hasty in assuming adult responsibilities.

Mary and Joseph recognized Jesus' increasing abilities. They granted Him a large amount of independence so that they had traveled for an entire day without seeing Jesus, expecting Him to be with family and friends. We can all understand how frantic they must have been when they could not find Him. I, for one, would have imagined the worst.

But after three days, they do find Him. He is in the temple, His Father's house, learning from the Bible scholars. As we might expect, his questions and answers were amazing. He had been an awesome student of Scripture. He even astonished His parents.

While Jesus may have recognized that He would soon be an adult, in His parents' eyes, He was still a child. Their distress had been great. Jesus explained to them that His impending adulthood required Him to be in His Father's house and to be about His Father's business.

A short side note is appropriate here. Translations vary at this point. Some years ago, I wondered why some translations said, "Father's business" such as the King James Version, and others said, "Father's house," such as the English Standard Version. The answer is simple. In the original Greek, neither "business" nor "house" appears. They are simply implied. The translators must make their best decision because English as a language is not comfortable with implied words except in poetry. We are always waiting for sentences to be completed.

I can live with either translation but I'm slightly partial to "business" considering Jesus' age and the assumption in those days that a son would inherit the family business. You are free to make your own choice. Both work.

Finally, we learn that as a sinless Son, Jesus returned to Nazareth with Mary and Joseph and was submissive to them. Apparently, Luke is able to report this story to us because Mary treasured up all these things in her heart.

There is much to learn from this episode in Jesus' life. As parents, we learn the importance of diligently instructing our children in God's holy word. We also learn the importance of being faithful in our study of the Bible as children.

We learn that our lives progress according to an orderly plan. In due time, we are able to assume the responsibilities of adulthood. However, that time of transition can be difficult for all concerned.

We learn the importance of God's house in our lives and being faithful in our attendance to the customs of worship and biblical celebrations. Of course, we also remember that the Old Testament Sabbath laws no longer apply to us in the Church (Colossians 2:16). Yet, our strength of faith and wisdom grow when we feed our faith on word and sacrament.

Finally, we are reminded of the importance of the Father's business. His business is the salvation of sinners. For this reason, He sent His Son into the world (John 3:16). Jesus, even at this young age, knew that He must soon take up His Father's business. This business would ultimately lead Him to the cross. It was an extremely difficult business indeed. But He did it out of love for us as St. Paul writes in 1 Timothy 1:15, "The saying is trustworthy and deserving of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am the foremost."

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice. Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:4-7).

L Heavenly Father, Your Son diligently studied the Holy Scriptures and grew in wisdom and stature. He was submissive to His earthly parents and always about Your business and in Your house. Keep our families in Your Word, and always treasuring Your divine wisdom and favor.

Introduction

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Devotional thoughts:

There is great irony in the visit of the Wise Men. Those who ought to be worshiping the newborn King of the Jews are clueless. And in the end, instead of worshiping, they crucify Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews.

However, the foreign gentile scholars who we would expect to ignore the savior's birth are eager to worship Him and give Him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

A careful reading of the Gospel of Matthew makes his reporting of this account quite understandable. Matthew's inclusion of Jesus' genealogy, his careful documentation of the fulfillment of prophecies, and the overall flavor of his text make it clear that he was writing for a Jewish audience. But over and over again, he records how gentiles are welcomed into the family of God. In Matthew 8, we learn of the faith of a Roman centurion. In chapter 15, we hear the Canaanite woman beseech Jesus with these words, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." The centurion at the cross at Jesus' death, declared, "Truly this was the Son of God!" Finally, Matthew closes His Gospel with these words from Jesus, "Make disciples of all nations (gentiles!) (Matthew 28:19).

Whether we may be lowly shepherds or magnificently clad magi, we all are welcome at Jesus cradle. We may bring to Him gold, frankincense, or myrrh. Or we may simply sigh and say, "Nothing in my hand I bring, Simply to thy cross I cling." Jesus welcomes all who come to Him in faith. He grants us forgiveness, life, and salvation! Forever may we sing, "Alleluias" to our King!

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice. Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:4-7).

My only memory from attending my first Vacation Bible School is this song:

Among many aspects of our Epiphany celebration, gift-giving is near the top of the list. With gifts, we recall the visit of the Magi and their gifts to Jesus of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

While the Magi were in all likelihood, not kings as we sing in the song. In fact, magi had once briefly ruled in Persia. But that's a story for another day. Nevertheless, Psalm 72:10 reminds us that far off kings render Him tribute and gifts! In fact, they fall down before Him and serve Him! This strikes a chord for me when I read Matthew 2:11, "They fell down and worshiped him. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts, gold and frankincense, and myrrh."

The giving of gifts on Epiphany should not be restricted to kings or magi. We all have the opportunity to give gifts. The poor, the needy, and the weak (Psalm 72:12-13) are all around us. They certainly need our gifts. One way that God delivers them is through the compassion of His people!

The gifts of the Magi and indeed all of our gifts pale in comparison to the greatest Epiphany gift of all. The greatest gift is the gift of salvation given by King Jesus to the poor in spirit, who come to Him in faith.

Prayer: O Lord, the psalmist prefigures the visit of the Magi and the bringing of gifts. Grant that we also may have the wisdom to be generous with our gifts to the poor, the needy, and the weak for we were spiritually the poorest, the neediest, and the weakest of all, through Jesus Christ our Lord Amen.
