The Seventh Sunday of Easter May 16, 2021







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Devotional thoughts:

This Sunday is Confirmation Sunday at Christ Lutheran Church in Stevensville, Michigan where I served for 32 years with 30 of those years as Senior Pastor. The third Sunday in May has always been Confirmation Sunday, well almost always.

Many of our families have relatives in neighboring churches. Some years before I arrived at Christ Lutheran, it was decided that each church would have an assigned Sunday for confirmation so that families would be able to attend confirmation services for nieces and nephews at nearby churches. Christ Lutheran was assigned the third Sunday in May.

The first year that I was senior pastor was much like this year. The third Sunday of May was the last Sunday of the Easter season which means that the next Sunday would be Pentecost.

At our pre-confirmation meeting in the fall, the former senior pastor announced to the parents that confirmation Sunday would be moved to the fourth Sunday in May so that the young people would be confirmed on Pentecost. This decision seemed reasonable at the time. Unfortunately, a couple of months later, the calendar came out with Confirmation Sunday again scheduled for the third Sunday in May. No one noticed the error until the former senior pastor had accepted a call to another position.

So as the newly minted senior pastor, I was approached by several parents who explained to me that their relatives had scheduled trips to southwestern Michigan for the fourth Sunday in May and now confirmation was changed to the third Sunday in May. They wanted to know what we were going to do.

I put on my Solomon Hat and decided that confirmation would indeed be on the fourth Sunday of May since it was the first date announced and trips were planned. Then I declared that ever after, Confirmation Sunday would be the third Sunday in May! I am happy to report that I was able to keep that promise for the rest of my ministry at Christ Lutheran even though there were some times that I had to miss important family events so I could be faithful to this promise.

Maybe you remember your own confirmation. I hope that it was an important day that you remember fondly. In our family, Confirmation Day has always been accompanied by a large celebration. Family and friends are invited. An open house follows. It's an important day to commemorate and cherish.

I know some pastors who reject the notion of celebrating confirmation. They prefer to make it a low-key event, arguing that celebrating at confirmation makes it too much like a graduation. They then suggest that young people believe that they are done with the church. I am unconvinced by this argument.

High school graduation no longer means an end to education. For many, it means the beginning of higher education in a college or university. College graduation no longer means an end to education but it is the beginning of a lifelong learning project.

Big celebrations at weddings are not a declaration of the end of love but only the beginning. So it is also with confirmation celebrations. Something important has happened. It is time to celebrate!

What important thing happens in confirmation? There are several good answers to this question but our focus for today is the making of a promise! At weddings, couples promise to be faithful to each other until death parts them! In confirmation, we promise to be faithful to God until death brings us to be with Him in heaven.

After confessing their faith with the words of the Apostles' Creed, the pastor asks:

Do you intend to continue steadfast in this confession and Church and to suffer all, even death, rather than fall away from it?

To this, the confirmation class responds, "I do so intend with the help of God."

This question and answer are reminders of the suffering experienced by Christian martyrs in years past and the words of Jesus in Revelation 2:10, "Be faithful unto death, and I will give you the crown of life."

Confirmation is about instruction in the Christian faith. It is about promises made and kept. It is about a lifelong commitment to Christ and His Church. Most important of all, it is about the gift of eternal life won by Jesus on the cross.

Keeping promises can be hard. Faithfulness is difficult. But thanks be to God, He keeps His promises to us. As we think about confirmation, it is good for us to remember the words of the Apostle Paul to Timothy:

The saying is trustworthy, for:

If we have died with him, we will also live with him;

if we endure, we will also reign with him;

if we deny him, he also will deny us;

if we are faithless, he remains faithful—

for he cannot deny himself (2 Timothy 2:11-13).

As you remember your confirmation and the promises that you made, pray for the newly confirmed. Pray that we will remain faithful and so receive the crown of life!





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Confirmation

We know that Confirmation is not a sacrament and that it is not commanded in the Bible. However, it is important for us to remember that everything we do in confirmation is commanded in the Bible. If we were to do away with confirmation, we would still need to continue with the process that we call confirmation.

The pastor says at the beginning of the Rite of Confirmation, "Beloved in the Lord, our Lord Jesus Christ said: 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I will be with you always, to the very end of the age."

Jesus directs us to baptize and when we bring our children to Him in baptism we are fulfilling His will. But He makes it clear that Christian discipleship does not end with baptism. He also directs us to teach them everything that He has commanded.

It has become rather fashionable in some corners of the church to downplay the importance of doctrine and teaching in favor of emotions and feelings. Yet Jesus says, "Teach them everything." Even if we were to do away with confirmation, we would still be required to teach our young people the whole will and counsel of God. Following confirmation instruction, there should be no secrets remaining about what we teach in our church.

Confirmation is a time to celebrate the faithfulness of each student who has devoted himself to the study of God's word. It is also a time to rejoice that these fellow believers join with us in publicly confessing the faith.

Jesus said: "Whoever confesses me before men, I will also confess him before my Father in heaven. But he that denies me before men, I will deny him before my Father in heaven." If we no longer observed confirmation, we would still need to provide an opportunity for each Christian to publicly confess the faith.

Please join me in praying that all confirmands will remain faithful to their public confession of faith and so receive the crown of life. Indeed, with them numbered may we be, here and in eternity!

Introduction

Most modern forms of mediation turn a person inward. Biblical meditation turns a person outward toward what God has said and done especially what He has said and done through Jesus for our salvation.

Each Sunday has its own special theme directing us to meditate on God's word and actions. This theme is found in the Propers of the Day (the parts of the service that change week to week). From Advent through the Easter season these themes focus our attention on the life of Jesus from His birth to His death and resurrection. There is always much more in the propers than can be covered in any Sunday service. God willing, I will use the propers for Sunday to provide you with a devotion each day to help you mediate on what God has done for you.

"Whom shall I fear?" David asks this short question at the beginning of Psalm 27. We might fear many things such as the darkness, or creepy, crawly things, or dangerous storms. However, this Psalm begins by asking about people we fear.

Whom do you fear? We may rightly fear the aggression of enemies or the terror of criminals. David faced enemies and adversaries who breathed out violent threats against him.

You also may rightly fear secret enemies. These are people who wish you harm but keep these thoughts secret. They may even pose for a time as your friends or confidants, but in their deepest thoughts, they are plotting for your downfall.

But David exclaims that when God is your Light and Salvation, you do not need to fear anyone or anything. God is able to vanquish every foe. On the cross, Jesus destroyed sin, and death, and the devil. There is no problem so great that He cannot solve it. There is no difficulty that He cannot overcome.

Sometimes, we must learn patience. God has a way of coming to our rescue in His own time and in His own way. We cry aloud to Him and He is gracious and answers. But as you wait for His gracious answer, be strong, and let your heart take courage. Wait for the Lord.

We live in difficult and dangerous times. News reports are more depressing every day. There is violence in even our smallest cities. Riots go unchecked in the streets. Political leaders seem to be bullies. The litany of woes goes on and on. In other words, we live in a sinful world. Every generation is faced with danger and difficulty.

My mother would often ask after watching the evening news, "Do you think that this is the end of the world?" It is easy to speculate about this with all the gloomy reporting. It seems each correspondent is trained to make their segment sound more dreadful than the last.

I would often remind my mother that yes, we may be facing the end of the world but that things have been bad in the past. She experienced the Great Depression. She lived through World War Two. She raised a family during the Cold War under the threat of nuclear annihilation. Her cousin was killed in Vietnam. Such is life.

But we are not left without consolation. Jesus has ascended. We are left to carry on. He knew that work and ministry in a sinful world would always be hard and grief-filled. This is why He sent the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit brings comfort and relief. He gives us faith and the peace of God that passes all understanding. He reminds us:

This world's prince may still Scowl fierce as he will,
He can harm us none.
He's judged; the deed is done;
One little word can fell him.

The King of glory, Lord of hosts has conquered sin, death, and the devil. The world is a difficult and dangerous place but He has overcome the world. In Him, we have comfort, peace, and joy. Do not lose heart. Jesus has won for us eternal life. We look to the day when we will experience never-ending happiness in paradise.

Let us pray: O King of glory, Lord of hosts, uplifted in triumph far above all heavens, leave us not without consolation but send us the Spirit of truth whom You promised from the Father; for You live and reign with Him and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Today, I am reminded of Julie Andrews as Maria Von Trapp in the Sound of Music. One day she learns that the Von Trapp children do not know how to sing. She then teaches them the Do-Re-Mi song. There is no way I could count all the times that I have sung "Doe, a deer, a female deer. Ray, a drop of golden sun."

But do you remember the start of the song? She sings "Let's start at the very beginning. A very good place to start." That phrase came to mind as I read Psalm 1. What a very good place to start when reading the Psalms!

The way to be "unblessed" is to listen to the advice of the wicked, to walk side-by-side with sinful people on the path to destruction, and to mock and ridicule godly, wholesome people. Rather the way to be blessed is to delight in God's word and meditate on it day and night.

Yesterday, we considered the sorry state of the world around us. The way to be "unblessed" is to jump right in and play that game of violence, bullying, and power-grabbing. Satan often tempts us to manipulate, deceive, and exploit the people around us to achieve our goals. Unfortunately, we see this even in the church!

However, the blessed escape that world of sin and destruction. They live under the grace of God and receive forgiveness for all their past deception and aggression. The blessed are free to trust God and meditate on His word of life and salvation.

Ultimately, the way of the wicked will perish! Those who trust in the Lord receive His blessings now and in eternity.

Prayer: O Lord, thank You for Your word of life and salvation. Motivate us to meditate on it day and night through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

Acts 1:12-26

¹²Then [the apostles] returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a Sabbath day's journey away. ¹³And when they had entered, they went up to the upper room, where they were staying, Peter and John and James and Andrew, Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew, James the son of Alphaeus and Simon the Zealot and Judas the son of James. ¹⁴All these with one accord were devoting themselves to prayer, together with the women and Mary the mother of Jesus, and his brothers.

¹⁵In those days Peter stood up among the brothers (the company of persons was in all about 120) and said, ¹⁶"Brothers, the Scripture had to be fulfilled, which the Holy Spirit spoke beforehand by the mouth of David concerning Judas, who became a guide to those who arrested Jesus. ¹⁷For he was numbered among us and was allotted his share in this ministry." ¹⁸(Now this man bought a field with the reward of his wickedness, and falling headlong he burst open in the middle and all his bowels gushed out. ¹⁹And it became known to all the

inhabitants of Jerusalem, so that the field was called in their own language Akeldama, that is, Field of Blood.) ²⁰"For it is written in the Book of Psalms,

""May his camp become desolate, and let there be no one to dwell in it';

and

"Let another take his office."

²¹So one of the men who have accompanied us during all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, ²²beginning from the baptism of John until the day when he was taken up from us—one of these men must become with us a witness to his resurrection." ²³And they put forward two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also called Justus, and Matthias. ²⁴And they prayed and said, "You, Lord, who know the hearts of all, show which one of these two you have chosen ²⁵to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place." ²⁶And they cast lots for them, and the lot fell on Matthias, and he was numbered with the eleven apostles.

Do you enjoy working with people? It can be a challenge. One pastor quipped, "Being a pastor wouldn't be so bad if you didn't have to work with people!" But shepherds must live with the sheep.

In this section of Acts, we read about the first congregational meeting in the church. Jesus is not physically there to guide the process. It is not openly stated but there is a slight disagreement in who should serve as the apostle to restore their number to twelve.

Peter presents the qualification and job description for this individual.

- 1. He must have been with them from the time of Jesus' baptism until Jesus' ascension.
- 2. He must become a witness to Jesus' resurrection.

We don't know how many disciples met this qualification but two names are put forward. Each one must have had supporters in the meeting. They both were qualified but only one could serve. In this instance, they chose to cast lots and the lot fell on Matthias. I feel confident that the supporters of Justus and his friends were disappointed. But they willingly accepted the outcome of the selection process.

We all can learn from this event. Many times in the church we are faced with making decisions between two or more options. In our human wisdom, each option has value. But a decision must be made. When the choice is made, some will be disappointed. If the result is not sinful or wrong, it is beneficial if all are willing to accept the outcome (as difficult as that may be!).

Life in the Church is an exercise in humility and grace. Because we are fallible human beings, sometimes poor or bad decisions are made. But God is still in charge! He overcomes evil with good. Death becomes life. Grace and charity prevail.

Prayer: Almighty God, You are in charge of the Church. Grant that we would learn to work faithfully and effectively in the church even when decisions are made that we disagree with, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

1 John 5:9-15

⁹If we receive the testimony of men, the testimony of God is greater, for this is the testimony of God that he has borne concerning his Son. ¹⁰Whoever believes in the Son of God has the testimony in himself. Whoever does not believe God has made him a liar, because he has not believed in the testimony that God has borne concerning his Son. ¹¹And this is the testimony, that God gave us eternal life, and this life is in his Son. ¹²Whoever has the Son has life; whoever does not have the Son of God does not have life.

¹³I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God that you may know that you have eternal life. ¹⁴And this is the confidence that we have toward him, that if we ask anything according to his will he hears us. ¹⁵And if we know that he hears us in whatever we ask, we know that we have the requests that we have asked of him.

I thought I was wrong once! No one wants to admit to making a mistake but such is life. I find it easy to see the flaws of logic in people around me. It's much more difficult when I evaluate my own decisions. Yet the evidence is abundant. People make mistakes! They make wrong decisions. They believe falsehoods.

The mandatory mask order has recently been lifted by the CDC (I think since the mayor of Chicago still says that she will wear a mask). Following the ever-changing advice of those who "follow the science" gives evidence to the fact that we all make mistakes, even those who smugly "follow the science."

The testimony of God is greater than all human testimony and understanding. We ought never to reject God's word based on flawed human reason. God is not a liar. Whatever He says is true! "This is the testimony, that God gave us eternal life, and this life is in his Son. Whoever has the Son has life; whoever does not have the Son of God does not have life" (1 John 5:11-12).

There is much to learn from the Bible. But the Bible has ONE overarching purpose! It is to bring you eternal life through Jesus. Never let human logic or reason dissuade you from the truth.

Prayer: O Lord, thank You for the love that is ours in Christ Jesus and the truth of Your word. Grant that we would ever trust Your testimony and believe in Jesus for salvation through the same Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

I have guarded them, and not one of them has been lost except the son of destruction, that the Scripture might be fulfilled. ¹³But now I am coming to you, and these things I speak in the world, that they may have my joy fulfilled in themselves. ¹⁴I have given them your word, and the world has hated them because they are not of the world, just as I am not of the world. ¹⁵I do not ask that you take them out of the world, but that you keep them from the evil one. ¹⁶They are not of the world, just as I am not of the world. ¹⁷Sanctify them in the truth; your word is truth. ¹⁸As you sent me into the world, so I have sent them into the world. ¹⁹And for their sake I consecrate myself, that they also may be sanctified in truth."

Jesus' words are always overflowing with information. This small section of His High Priestly Prayer is no exception. Let us concentrate on John 17: 17 today, "Sanctify them in the truth; your word is truth."

Jesus makes this identity statement, "Your word is truth." It is His prayer that the disciples would be made holy (sanctified) in the word of God.

God's word of truth is the only means to holiness in this world of sinners. To be made holy, we must first be cleansed of sin. We are fully and completely cleansed from sin when we believe the Gospel! That is when we have faith in God's holy word that Jesus died on the cross for sinners and takes away my sin and the sin of the world.

We then are free to live holy lives by following God's holy law as revealed in His word. We are not at liberty to invent our own modes of holiness and righteousness. We are sanctified when we faithfully follow His word of truth.

Prayer: O Lord, thank You for Your word of truth. Grant that we would never be deceived into believing that Your word is ever false or misleading but grant that we would ever believe in the forgiveness that Jesus won for us on the cross and move us to follow Your holy will as revealed in the Bible through the same Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

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
