My story of Quasimodogeniti

I remember my pastor mentioning *Quasimodogeniti* Sunday when I was young. He taught our congregation all the Latin names for the Sundays of the Church Year and I have to confess that I am fond of them. *Quasimodogeniti* is a somewhat startling and fun name to say but that is not why I like this Sunday so much. It's because of the message of 1 Peter 2:2, "Like newborn infants, long for the pure spiritual milk, that by it you may grow up into salvation."

My love of this Sunday began in 1978. I attended the Minnesota North District Convention. It was my first convention as a pastor and I eagerly looked forward to it. At the opening service, the First Vice-President of the District preached on 1 Peter 2:2. It was one of the most inspiring and memorable sermons that I have ever heard.

Upon reflection, I now realize it was so remarkable to me because this was the first sermon that I had heard in almost a year. As a new pastor, I preached every Sunday but on that day that I was able to sit and drink in the wonderful message of God's word proclaimed by someone else.


This experience drove home to me the importance of craving the pure spiritual milk of God's word and growing in the faith.

When we are absent from church (even when we are doing our own Bible study), we lack the full impact of the Word of God on our lives. When people claim that they can be Christians without going to church, they are deceiving themselves. It's like saying that you can be a baby without craving milk! Indeed, this is a true statement. However, a baby that doesn't crave milk will be a very weak baby.



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Devotional thoughts:

As is so often the case, the Gospel lesson for this week is jam-packed with significant Bible teachings. Here is an incomplete list

Jesus' Resurrection

Jesus' greeting of peace

Jesus' crucifixion wounds remain in His resurrected body.

The sending of the Apostles

The institution of holy absolution and the Office of the Keys

The doubting and faith of Thomas The divinity of Jesus Jesus blessing upon all believers

The purpose of the Gospel of John and the entire Bible: that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and have life in His name!

Each of these is worthy of a lengthy dissertation. Today, let's consider Thomas.

The tension between doubting and faith is something that confronts every Christian. Sometimes we are vocal about it. Other times we are silent. Sometimes we exhibit a false boldness of faith. Other times we weep at our faithlessness.

As we contemplate Thomas, let us first remember Doubting Peter. No, Peter didn't start by doubting. He began with a boastful faith. On Maundy Thursday, immediately following the Last Supper, on the Mount of Olives, Jesus said, "You will all fall away because of me this night." To this, Peter responded, "Though they all fall away because of you, I will never fall away" (Matthew 26:31-33).

Today, Christians are often applauded for testimonies of faith such as Peter's. But Jesus knows the human heart better than we do. To help Peter see the folly of his false confidence, Jesus foretold his threefold denial and the crowing rooster.

Both Thomas and Peter demonstrate the struggle between faith and doubting that confronts us all. On one hand, we may stand up before the greatest challenges of life and declare with Martin Luther, "Take they our life Goods, fame, child, and wife, Though these all be gone, Our vict'ry has been won; The Kingdom ours remaineth." Other times, we deny our faith when confronted by a servant girl (Matthew 26:69).

Sometimes doubting is obvious. Hurting Christians question the goodness of God when calamity strikes. We doubt when fervent prayer is not answered according to our own demands. We leave faith behind when success or fiscal responsibility demands it.

Other times our doubting may not be so apparent. We pray in the Lord's Prayer, "Thy will be done." Yet every time we sin, we are saying, "Lord, I don't believe that Your holy will is best for me. In this case, it is my will that will be done."

On the first Easter evening, Thomas was vocal in his doubting. He demanded physical proof of Jesus' resurrection. The testimony of his fellow disciples would not suffice.

I've seen doubting like this. I'm sure you have, too. We become frustrated and concerned when friends and loved ones lack saving faith. However, we must remember that God has not finished His activities in the lives of the people around us.

Like Thomas, none of us can force ourselves to believe. God must take action to bring us to faith. On the Sunday after the first Easter, the disciples were again gathered in a locked room. This time, Thomas was with them when Jesus came and stood among them. He repeated His greeting of peace. But on this occasion, He came for just one reason. He came to bring Thomas to faith. Can you imagine the joy in Thomas' heart when he heard Jesus say, "Put your finger here, and see my hands; and put out your hand, and place it in my side. Do not disbelieve, but believe"?

Thomas' confession of faith is one that we all share. Jesus is "my Lord and my God."

But none of us can take credit for this faith. It is a gift of God lest we boast (Ephesians 2:8-9).


Jesus graciously intervened in Thomas' life so that he would believe and receive eternal life. He does the same for each of us when He sends the Holy Spirit to work in our hearts through word and sacrament. For this reason, we confess with Martin Luther, "I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith." (Luther's Small Catechism, The Explanation of the Third Article.)

Doubting will always perplex us in this life. All doubting will finally be removed when we join in praising God with the saints in heaven. Until then, this is our prayer, "Lord, I believe; help my unbelief!" (Mark 9:24 NKJV) as we remember 2 Timothy 2:13, "If we are faithless, he remains faithful—for he cannot deny himself."

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice. Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with

thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:4-7). God's richest blessings to you in Christ.

Introduction

Most modern forms of mediation turn a person inward. Biblical meditation turns a person outward toward what God has said and done especially what He has said and done through Jesus for our salvation.

The Sunday after Easter is called The Second Sunday of Easter. It was previously known as *Quasimodogeniti*. However, an Anglican priest friend of mine informed me that this Sunday is also known as "Low Sunday." The obvious reason for this name is the historically low attendance on the Sunday after Easter.

I often hear people complain about Christmas and Easter Christians. I never do. I am so happy to have people come and hear the wonderful message of salvation. I always hope that they will come every Sunday. But I am happy if they come on Christmas and Easter, the most wonderful Sundays of the year.

I don't believe that most of the increase in attendance on Easter is from Christmas and Easter Christians. Yes, there are a few. But from my observation, the increase in attendance comes from families gathering from far away on those special days. It comes from church members who attend every other week, every third week, every fourth week, etc.

What is special about the Sunday after Easter is you can be sure that it is mostly attended by the every-Sunday worshipers. These are the Christians in the family of God who are with you through thick and through thin. These are the ones who, like babies, have a constant desire for the sincere and pure milk of the word of God.

These are the believers who understand the love and forgiveness that is theirs in Christ. These are the ones who cherish the Word of God.

May we always be counted among those who desire the sincere milk of the Gospel that we may grow up to salvation!

I have to warn you. I am an incurable history enthusiast. It's one of my many flaws. History is filled with treasures that enrich our lives and give valuable insight into our human condition.

I love Bible history. I, especially, like learning about the life and times of Jesus. As an extension of that, I love learning about the Greek and Roman society that surrounded the ancient Church. It's fascinating to learn how the Church coped with and even grew during times of oppression.

In my little corner of the Church, there is also much history to learn and appreciate. The founding and growth of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod is a fascinating story of passion for the Gospel and a determination to trust God in the face of incredible hardship and difficulties.

Many individuals contributed to the founding of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod. All of them had significant roles to play but it's almost certain that the LCMS would not exist without the work and ministry of C. F. W. Walther. Besides being the founding pastor of four congregations in St. Louis, he was the first president of The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, the first president and professor of Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, and a prolific author and theologian. He published Der Lutheraner, a newspaper that united pastors and congregations leading to the formation of the LCMS. His most enduring work is a book titled, *The Proper Distinction Between Law and Gospel*. His focus on Law and Gospel has been a distinguishing feature of my Church.

Jesus always taught with this distinction of Law and Gospel in mind. In His Sermon on the Mount, Jesus clearly articulated the holy law of God. He made it clear that if we are to be saved by the law, we must be perfect as our Father in heaven is perfect (Matthew 5:48). No one is saved by the law! (Romans 3:20). Rather, the law shows us our sin and our need for a savior.

Once we become convinced of our sin, we are ready to turn to Jesus for salvation. The Gospel is the message of salvation through faith in Jesus. It is God's saving power through the cross of Christ (Romans 1:16). Jesus summarized all of this in one verse, "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16).

The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod was founded to perpetuate this message of salvation. The Apostle Paul says it this way:

But now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, although the Law and the Prophets bear witness to it— ²² the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction: ²³ for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, ²⁴ and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, ²⁵ whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith. This was to show God's righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over former sins. ²⁶ It was to show his righteousness at the present time, so that he might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus.

²⁷ Then what becomes of our boasting? It is excluded. By what kind of law? By a law of works? No, but by the law of faith. ²⁸ For we hold that one is justified by faith apart from works of the law (Romans 3:21-28).

Through God's providence and blessings, The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod celebrates its 175th anniversary on this date. May God continue to bless it as long as it continues to remain faithful to His word of Law and Gospel. If it should stray, may God send leaders to return it to the clear and pure proclamation of God's word.

Let us pray: Almighty God, grant that we who have celebrated the Lord's resurrection may by Your grace confess in our life and conversation that Jesus is Lord and God; through the same Jesus Christ, Your Son, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

The Book of Revelation is intriguing, challenging, and sometimes frustrating. It speaks in picture language that we no longer are accustomed to hearing. Interpreting the imagery of Revelation is particularly difficult for us because we do not live in the first century Roman Empire. Revelation was written with a contemporary urgency that spoke to people who were fully in tune with the challenges of living in a hostile culture.

Unfortunately, many individuals in our time have found a home in Revelation for strange teachings that are in conflict with the rest of the Bible. The best piece of advice I have for those reading Revelation is not to worry about anything in the book that you do not understand. It doesn't say anything that is different from what you all ready know about Jesus and God's plan of salvation for sinners. Its message is simple. Do not be discouraged when times are bad. God has already won the victory over evil through Jesus' cross and resurrection. This victory will be completely and finally revealed to us at the end of time when:

"Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people, and God himself will be with them as their God. He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away" (Revelation 21:3-4).

The Epistle this week from Revelation is appropriate for continuing our Easter celebration. Here, John gives us a picture of our resurrected Savior who died but is alive forevermore. He has the keys of Death and Hades. He unlocks hell and opens for us the kingdom of heaven! We know how the story ends!

Prayer: O Lord, thank You for the gift of salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ. Grant that we would never become discouraged because of the challenges of life. Give us faith and confidence to trust that Jesus has already won the victory for us. Amen.

sick and those afflicted with unclean spirits, and they were all healed.

Many people cannot understand why Russia invaded Ukraine. I'm one of them. Daily reports from Ukraine reveal how evil people can be. Why are people doing these things? Similarly, it is hard for me to understand why the high priest and all who were with him chose to arrest the apostles and place them in prison. Their only crime was doing signs and wonders. These two events, plus many others, reveal to us the fact that sometimes we suffer for doing good. When this happens, do not be surprised. God can and does work through all of these obstacles for us.

In the case of the apostles, God chose to intervene by sending an angel to open the prison door. God may not be so dramatic when He comes to your rescue. He may send an angel or He may send patience. Whatever God chooses to do for you, remember the most important thing is for people to learn the words of life that come from Jesus who is the Life! In Him was life, and the life was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it (John 1:4-5).

During the Easter season, we celebrate that death and the grave could not overcome Jesus. No, through the cross, Jesus overcame sin, death, and the devil. Jesus' resurrection from the dead proves it. Because He lives, we too shall live!

Prayer: O Lord, thank You for the message of salvation we have received from those who were eyewitnesses of Your resurrection. Thank You, that You have brought us to faith through their word. Grant that we, too, may be Your instruments of sharing the message of salvation with those around us. Amen.
