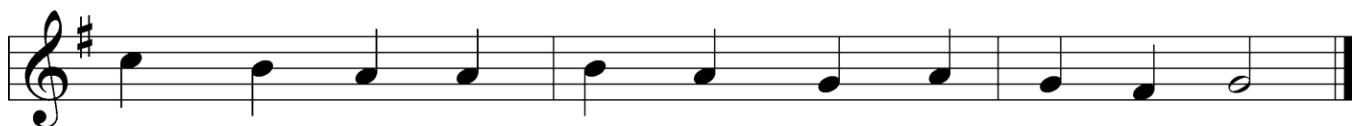

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Devotional thoughts:

Today's Latin lesson is "*paramentum*." It means "adornment." We receive our English word "parament" from this Latin word as the name for the cloth hangings that adorn our altars and pulpits. In churches all around our country, the paraments have been changed to purple for the season of Lent. For centuries purple has served as a visual reminder to the faithful that we are in a time of somber repentance and restraint as we prepare for Easter.

The word "Lent" comes to us from Old English and German. It originally meant "lengthening." It was a word for spring when the days are beginning to lengthen. An older designation for Lent that more accurately describes this season and is still used in French, Italian, Spanish, and other languages are words that refer to the number 40. They are a reminder that Lent is 40 days of self-restraint and spiritual renewal.

In yet other languages such as Russian, Polish, and Ukrainian, the name for this season is a reference to fasting. Together these names help us to recall Jesus' 40 days of fasting in the wilderness following His baptism as He prepared for His three years of ministry.

For Christians around the world and through the centuries, Lent allows us to remember t time in Jesus' life and in some small way to participate in it. We do this by fasting and self-sacrifice. We focus on prayer and repentance. We echo Jesus' life with acts of kindness and love such as generosity and compassionate care for those in need.

Our three-year lectionary puts us at a slight disadvantage this year as we begin our 40-day Lenten journey with the Gospel of Mark. It recalls this time in Jesus' life with only a single verse, ".And he was in the wilderness forty days, being tempted by Satan. And he was with the wild animals, and the angels were ministering to him" (Mark 1:13).

To understand the full impact of this event, it is good for us to read again the historic Gospel lesson for The First Sunday in Lent:

Matthew 4:1–11

¹Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. ²And after fasting forty days and forty nights, he was hungry. ³And the tempter came and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread."

⁴But he answered, "It is written,

"Man shall not live by bread alone,
but by every word that comes from the mouth of God."

⁵Then the devil took him to the holy city and set him on the pinnacle of the temple ⁶and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down, for it is written,

"He will command his angels concerning you,"

and

"On their hands they will bear you up,
lest you strike your foot against a stone."

⁷Jesus said to him, "Again it is written, 'You shall not put the Lord your God to the test.'"

⁸Again, the devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their glory. ⁹And he said to him, "All these I will give you, if you will fall down and worship me." ¹⁰Then Jesus said to him, "Be gone, Satan! For it is written,

"You shall worship the Lord your God
and him only shall you serve."

¹¹Then the devil left him, and behold, angels came and were ministering to him.

When Christians practice the discipline of self-denial in Lent, they are strengthening their capacity to resist temptation. Satan is clever in his ability to make sin look attractive. He makes sin look like a shortcut to happiness and self-fulfillment. In one way or another, this was the essence of each of the three temptations that he placed in front of Jesus. But Satan's real goal was to derail Jesus' mission to be the perfect sacrifice for sinners.

Three years ago, my mother was called to be with Jesus in paradise. As you can imagine, I have been thinking of her quite a bit lately.

During the last years of her life, every morning at about 8 A.M., I would call her on the phone. More often than not she would be laughing as she recounted to me some misadventure of Wally and Beaver. She loved the sitcom, "Leave it to Beaver" so much that I purchased for her the complete series on DVD. Unfortunately, I did not have the opportunity to present it to her as a gift.

Because of her love for the show, I found myself watching it more and more with fresh eyes. I know it is common for "sophisticated" 21st-century people to belittle this program as naive and culturally uninformed. Nevertheless, it provides insight into human nature seldom matched by contemporary writers.

In many episodes, Beaver is given firm directions by his parents. Beaver in all sincerity promises to obey. For example, he promises not to play outside in his Sunday clothes. Or, he promises that he will come straight home from school, etc. However, soon he encounters Larry Mondello, Whitey Whitney, or the infamous Eddie Haskell. They each in turn convince Beaver to discard the wisdom of obedience and indulge in some misguided behavior. It never turns out well. And as they say, “comedy ensues.”

“Leave it to Beaver” was a top-rated show for six seasons because it so well portrays human nature. There is a little bit of Beaver in all of us. Satan sends each of us our own “Eddie” or “Larry” to make sin look attractive. And more often than not, we succumb to the temptation. When we do, the outcome is disastrous. We do more than dirty our clothes. We soil our souls. Sin makes us unfit for an eternity with a holy God. We are doomed to face judgment for our misguided deeds. We are responsible for our own actions. It won’t work to stand before God and say, “Eddie made me do it.”

For this reason, God sent His only-begotten Son into the world to be perfectly holy for us. He faced every temptation that we face but He never sinned, not even once (Hebrews 4:15). And even more than that, as the sinless Lamb of God, He became the sacrifice for the sins of the world. In Him, we receive forgiveness, life, and salvation.

With the coming of Jesus, “The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand!” Now is “the time to repent and believe in the gospel.”

“Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice. Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus” (Philippians 4:4-7).

Introduction

Most modern forms of mediation turn a person inward. Biblical meditation turns a person outward toward what God has said and done especially what He has said and done through Jesus for our salvation.

The introit for this week comes from Psalm 91. Psalm 91 is a strong reminder of God's comfort and protection in times of trouble and stress. It is particularly appropriate during this time of political unrest, ongoing crime, and violence in our nation. You may wish to read it in its entirety.

It is selected this week because verses 11 and 12 are quoted by Satan in His second temptation of Jesus:

For he will command his angels concerning you
to guard you in all your ways.
On their hands they will bear you up,
lest you strike your foot against a stone.

Jesus' response from Deuteronomy 6:16 is appropriate for us to remember. It kept coming to my mind during the pandemic and its enforced safety measures.

During that time, I heard Christians disparage pandemic safety measures by saying, "I'm not changing my life. I am trusting God. When it's my time, it's my time."

How would you respond to such a statement? My standard response was, "It is true that when God is ready for me, He will take me to be with Him but I still look both ways when I cross the street."

Jesus' response is better, "You shall not tempt the Lord your God." (KJV).

God does promise to protect us. His first form of protection is giving us human wisdom. Jesus refused to throw Himself from the panicle of the temple because it would be foolish. Likewise, it is foolish for us to reject common-sense measures to fight infectious diseases. Do not tempt God!

Nevertheless, there are times when dangers comes that are beyond our control. In these times, we trust in God's grace and mercy to do what is best for us in every circumstance of life.

Fatalism is not a Christian virtue. Rather faith and trust are the hallmarks of Christianity. It would be hard to find a better description of this attitude than the words of the hymn writer, Hans Adolph Brorson, translated by Ditlef G. Ristad.

Spin, spin, spin! Watching evening or morning news reminds me of a story I learned many years ago. Three candidates were applying for a job. One was a mathematician. One was a statistician. One was an economist.

The job interview consisted of one question asked to each candidate in turn. The question was, “What is 2 + 2?”

The first candidate responded, “With mathematical certainty, I can tell you that the answer is 4.”

The second candidate answered, “Statistically speaking, there is a more than 90% probability that the answer lies somewhere between 3 and 5.”

When the economist answered, he furtively glanced around the room. Then he closed the blinds and quietly whispered, “What do you want it to be?” (Pause for laughter <wink, wink>)

Truth is a commodity that is hard to come by these days. Media personalities continually spin the facts to hurt the opposition or to protect their personal favorites. It doesn’t take a rocket scientist to recognize the endless spinning of the news.

Sometimes it feels like we will never learn the truth. And of course, we should expect this. There is only one place where we can be certain that truth will be found, God’s word. Psalm 25:5 says, “Lead me in your truth and teach me, for you are the God of my salvation.”

I expect media folks to spin the truth but it is more disturbing when religious leaders try to spin God’s word. They seem to look around at society and then ask, “What do you want God to say?”

In reality, the truth of God’s word never changes. God is still holy and righteous. Sin is still sin. Guilt is still real. Repentance is still required.

We plead to God with the words of Psalm 25:7, “Remember not the sins of my youth or my transgressions.” And thanks be to God, forgiveness is also new every morning. God’s love is found on the cross.

Lent is a time to ponder Jesus’ sacrifice for sinners and to rejoice that God never changes His promises to grant life and salvation to all who believe.

Prayer: O Lord, during Jesus’ temptation in the wilderness, Satan sought to spin the truth. Let us never be deceived by his lying ways. Grant that we will always trust the truth of Your holy word and receive the promised salvation won by Christ on the cross. Amen.

Humanity does not want God to be God. If we had our way, each of us would declare ourselves to be God. That was the temptation presented by Satan to Eve in Genesis 3:5, “You will be like God,”

It is not uncommon for people to read this account of Abraham and Isaac and doubt God’s righteousness because of His request for Abraham to sacrifice his son, his only son. In doing this, we are making ourselves to be God.

Here is a better approach. When we read something in the Bible that makes us question God and His activities or judgments, simply respond, “I don’t understand this God, but I trust that what You are doing is best.”

Abraham was put through this shocking trial for the benefit of all. In this account, we learn of God’s incredible love for us in Christ. It is hard for us to fathom the sacrifice that God requested of Abraham. It is more incredible that God made an even greater sacrifice for us when Jesus, the Lamb of God, went to the cross to save sinners. In Him, all the nations of the earth are blessed!

James 1:12–18

¹²Blessed is the man who remains steadfast under trial, for when he has stood the test he will receive the crown of life, which God has promised to those who love him. ¹³Let no one say when he is tempted, “I am being tempted by God,” for God cannot be tempted with evil, and he himself tempts no one. ¹⁴But each person

is tempted when he is lured and enticed by his own desire. ¹⁵Then desire when it has conceived gives birth to sin, and sin when it is fully grown brings forth death.

¹⁶Do not be deceived, my beloved brothers. ¹⁷Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change. ¹⁸Of his own will he brought us forth by the word of truth, that we should be a kind of firstfruits of his creatures.

Our epistle from James this week begins with the words, “Blessed is the man who remains steadfast under trial.” The trials of life are always difficult for us to understand, yet we all have them.

Prosperity preachers have a counterfeit answer to trials. Their message is, “If you do what God wills, He will bless you and you won’t have trials.” Then they say, “If trials come, you don’t have enough faith or you aren’t walking in the will of God.” This is a disastrous message and one that is contrary to Scripture.

On this side of eternity, we can never know for certain why God allows this or that trial to come into our lives. Was the Covid-19 pandemic a judgment from God? What purpose did it serve? God has not granted us the answers to these questions. We are simply called upon to trust Him and persevere.

God allows trials to come. They test our faith. But we must always remember that God tempts no one. He is not the author of evil. Rather, He strengthens us for each challenge that comes our way. He grants courage and peace to believers as they struggle with the difficulties of life. At the right time and in the right way, every Christian must take up his cross and follow Jesus.

Lent is a time for self-examination. We ask, “Have I brought these trials upon myself?” When the answer is yes, we bring them to the Lord in repentance. When they come from others, we pray for the grace to bear each other’s burdens (Galatians 6:2) just as Christ bore our sin upon the cross.

Prayer: O Lord, thank you for every good and perfect gift. Grant us strength to remain steadfast under trial, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Lent is a time for us to be like Jesus and sacrifice for others. Let us put selfishness aside and care for others around us with grace and mercy just as Jesus cared for us.

But let us also look past Lent to Jesus’ resurrection on Easter morn. Let us look past Lent to the time when we will join Him in paradise for all eternity.
