

The Fifth Sunday in Lent

March 21, 2021

The lessons today present us with many opportunities to ponder our condition before the Lord. The fact that we ought not to think too highly of ourselves is an important theme. James and John thought that they were more important than the other ten disciples therefore they asked if they could sit at Jesus' right and left hand in the glory of the kingdom to come. Jesus was quick to point out that proper Christian conduct is service. Just as Jesus came to serve us through the cross, we too serve our brothers and sisters.

One of the most dangerous ways of thinking too highly of ourselves is to believe that our sins are not so bad and that we do not need forgiveness. This deadly delusion leads to eternal destruction.

Thanks be to God that in Christ we have forgiveness, life, and salvation. Thanks be to God that He offers them to us through word and sacrament. May each of us remember the sound of the words of the Lord given through Jeremiah, "For I will forgive their iniquity, and I will remember their sin no more."

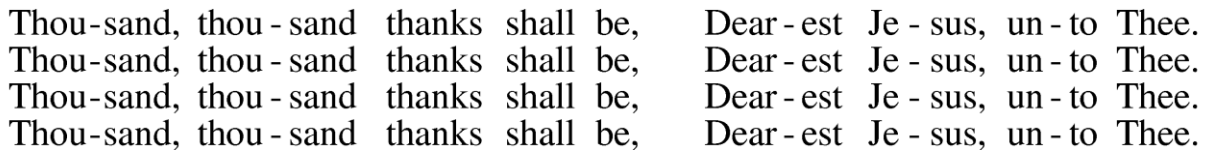

Devotional thoughts:

“I reject your reality and substitute my own,” Adam Savage from the opening of Mythbusters! While the television show Mythbusters popularized this quote, it originated in 1984 with a low-budget sci-fi/fantasy film *The Dungeonmaster*. In this B-movie, a demonic wizard challenges a modern-day computer programmer to a battle of technology vs. sorcery, with the programmer's girlfriend as the prize.

It often feels like I'm living in this film! <wink, wink> Everyone has their own reality and that reality is at odds with the reality of everyone else.

There is a reality of the left and a reality of the right. There is a reality of our current administration and a reality of our former administration. There is a reality of the secularists and a reality of the religious people. There is a reality of the young and a reality of the old. The list goes on.

Wouldn't it be nice if we could actually reject a certain reality and substitute our own reality? But in truth, there is only one reality—the reality of Jesus!

Our Gospel lesson begins with Jesus describing reality, the reality of the cross. On their journey from the Jordan River valley to the highlands of Jerusalem, Jesus explains to His disciples the purpose of their trip. For the third time since they began near Caesarea Philippi, Jesus declared, “The Son of Man will be delivered over to the chief priests and the scribes, and they will condemn him to death and deliver him over to the Gentiles. And they will mock him and spit on him, and flog him and kill him.”

Unfortunately, James and John reject this reality. They are stuck in their old way of thinking. Where Jesus sees the cross, they are blinded by personal glory. They present to Jesus this outrageous request, “Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your glory.”

James and John are living in the reality of personal aggrandizement and fame, selfishness and self-importance! Only a few verses earlier, Jesus had said, “Let the children come to me; do not hinder them, for to such belongs the kingdom of God. Truly, I say to you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God like a child shall not enter it.” James and John reject this reality of humility. They sound a lot like me!

Our sinful human nature looks out for number one! In our sinful version of reality, selfishness is good and noble. Self-sacrifice for others is unspeakable. We reject the reality of Jesus and substitute our own! The words of Jesus seem irrational to our ears. Who could live like this? But Jesus insists, “Whoever would be great among you must be your servant, and whoever would be first among you must be slave of all.”

Our annual Lenten journey to the cross reminds us that there is only one reality. It is the reality of sin and death. No amount of wishful thinking will free us from destruction. Earthly thrones will ultimately crumble. All false human realities will collapse but the word of the Lord endures forever!

Thankfully for James and John, for you and me, Jesus suffered many things and went to the cross. There He paid the debt of sin. He erased all traces of our self-aggrandizement and arrogance. And after three days, He rose from the dead!

The reality of the cross is unthinkable to humanity but it is the only path to the reality of the resurrection! It is our only escape from the reality of death! In the cross, the words of the Lord given to Jeremiah are fulfilled, “I will forgive their iniquity, and I will remember their sin no more” (Jeremiah 31:34).

Lent is the time to renew our commitment to the cross and resurrection. It is a time to die again to sin and rise to Christ. It is a time to join Jesus in His mission and ministry. He came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many! May we join in serving Him and our neighbors until He calls us to join Him in the resurrection!

“Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice. Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus” (Philippians 4:4-7).

Introduction

Most modern forms of mediation turn a person inward. Biblical meditation turns a person outward toward what God has said and done especially what He has said and done through Jesus for our salvation.

Each Sunday has its own special theme directing us to meditate on God's word and actions. This theme is found in the Propers of the Day (the parts of the service that change week to week). From Advent through the Easter season these themes focus our attention on the life of Jesus from His birth to His death and resurrection. There is always much more in the propers than can be covered in any Sunday service. God willing, I will use the propers for Sunday to provide you with a devotion each day to help you mediate on what God has done for you.

Have you ever heard of “Throwback Thursday?” A few years ago, Thursday was a day for posting old photographs online. We could marvel at old hairstyles and clothing. We could see our younger and possibly more-fit selves. I would like to name today, “Throwback Monday” or more alliteratively, “Memory Lane Monday” as we take a step back in time.

From before the time of Martin Luther until a few decades ago, the Fifth Sunday in Lent was called “Judica Sunday” or simply “Judica.” Judica is the first word in the introit for today in Latin from Psalm 43:1. The King James Version translates it this way, “Judge me, O God, and plead my cause against an ungodly nation.”

While we still have Psalm 43:1 as the beginning of our introit for this week, most of the rest of the Sunday has been lost with the updating of the lectionary. Considering Psalm 43:1 without the historic Gospel for Judica could possibly lead us down the wrong path. For many centuries after singing Psalm 43:1 as part of the introit, the congregation would hear John 8:46-59 read as the Gospel for the day.

John 8:46 begins with these words of Jesus, “Which one of you convicts me of sin?” Jesus was dealing with people who refused to believe. In fact, they declared, “Are we not right in saying that you are a Samaritan and have a demon?” Jesus was dealing with people who judged Him to be a sinful, blasphemous demoniac. In fact, John 8:59 reports that these enemies of Jesus picked up stones to throw at Him! In this context, we can see Psalm 43:1 as a reference to the sinless Jesus being accused and judged by ungodly people.

If God were to judge me, I would never be vindicated! Like the rest of humanity, I am sinful. I fall short of the glory of God (Romans 3:23). All my righteousness amounts to no more than filthy rags (Isaiah 64:6). Only Jesus can stand before God and truly plead, “Vindicate me, O God.”

In spite of His complete holiness and righteousness, Jesus was put to death by unholy people. He hung upon the cross for your sin and mine. But from the cross, in the moments before His death, Jesus says, “Father, forgive them” (Luke 23:34).

Our vindication does not come from our own righteousness. It comes through the gift of forgiveness. Our vindication comes from Christ’s righteousness given to us by grace and received by faith! In Christ’s righteousness, God in His judgment declares you, “Not guilty!” You are justified and holy in God’s sight because of Jesus!

L Let us pray. Thank You, God, that You vindicate me by Christ’s death and resurrection. Let me never trust in my own righteousness by only in the forgiveness won for me by Jesus on the cross, through the same Jesus Christ, my Lord.

Sinful, unbelieving people will go out of their way to criticize and insult believers. One common condemnation of God goes like this. If God is so good, then why did this bad thing happen? Of course, the world is filled with bad things. Evil is everywhere. It is found in the headlines. It is found in our homes!

How should God handle evil? There are two solutions that come to mind. First, He could remove from us our ability to make choices and simply force everyone to do only good and wholesome things. Or second, He could simply destroy all evil and only let the good and wholesome remain.

At first, it is tempting to applaud this second option. Many of God's critics claim that they would praise Him for destroying evil. Murderers would drop dead. So would thieves, adulterers, and unruly children. The world would soon be rid of evil ... and people.

God's way of dealing with evil is with goodness and mercy. The world continues to exist because of God's mercy. God in His patience allows sinful people the opportunity to repent. In His goodness, He sent Jesus to be our savior and pay for our sinfulness upon the cross.

Lent is the time to repent. Lent is the time to "Return to the Lord your God, for he is gracious and merciful slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love" (Joel 2:13).

Let us pray: Almighty God, by Your great goodness mercifully look upon Your people that we may be governed and preserved evermore in body and soul; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Jeremiah lived in difficult times. People were rebellious. They refused to listen to the word of God. As the author of Lamentations, he is often called the "Weeping Prophet." Yet God also allowed him to speak of a better time, a marvelous time. You can read about it in Jeremiah 31:31-34.

It is the day of the New Covenant, the New Testament. It is the day of Jesus. It is the day of salvation. It is the day when He will forgive iniquity and remember sin no more.

It is a great blessing for us to live in this time. We live when we can witness again Jesus' payment for sin on the cross. We can hear Him tell the malefactor on the cross, "Today you will be with me in paradise." We can celebrate His resurrection and look forward to our own.

Prayer: O Lord, thank You for Jeremiah and Your word of consolation spoken by him. Grant that we may always turn in repentance to You and find comfort in Your word of promise to remember our sins no more, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

Hebrews 5:1–10

¹For every high priest chosen from among men is appointed to act on behalf of men in relation to God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. ²He can deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is beset with weakness. ³Because of this he is obligated to offer sacrifice for his own sins just as he does for those of the people. ⁴And no one takes this honor for himself, but only when called by God, just as Aaron was.

⁵So also Christ did not exalt himself to be made a high priest, but was appointed by him who said to him,

“You are my Son,
today I have begotten you”;

⁶as he says also in another place,

“You are a priest forever,
after the order of Melchizedek.”

Hebrews is one of the most fascinating books of the New Testament. It shows us how Paul, Barnabas, and the early Christian evangelists proclaimed Christ to the Jewish people scattered around the Roman Empire. For us modern gentile readers, it takes a little bit more effort to fully appreciate it. To better understand the Book of Hebrews we must first explore the Old Testament and the religious practices of the first-century Jews.

The concept of the high priest and the priesthood of Melchizedek are two areas that require more study than time allows for today. However, let us take a brief look.

Priests sacrificed for sins daily in Jerusalem. A variety of animals were offered at the temple. A special offering was made one day a year on the Day of Atonement. The high priest would enter the Holy of Holies in the temple and sprinkle the blood of the sacrifice upon the Mercy Seat (or Atonement Cover – ESV). It was only on this one day of the year that the high priest could enter the Holy of Holies to make atonement for the people. The Holy of Holies was never to be entered by anyone other than the high priest on that day. You can read about this in Leviticus 16. Although the temple was destroyed in A.D. 70, observant Jews still observe this

holy day. It is called Yom Kippur.

Like all of the Old Testament sacrifices and ceremonial law, we no longer observe the Day of Atonement. Why? Because Jesus is our high priest. He has made the perfect atoning sacrifice for sins once for all (Hebrews 10:1-18). The Old Testament religious regulations were a foreshadowing of the perfect sacrifice made by Jesus on the cross (Colossians 2:16-17).

Today we rejoice that the very Son of God came into our world to be our perfect high priest and sacrifice himself for sins. No animal sacrifice could ever truly pay for sins. He made that sacrifice for us on the first Good Friday that we will recall again one week from today.

Prayer: O Lord, thank for Jesus, our Prophet, Priest, and King. Grant that we would never doubt the forgiveness won for us by the sacrifice of Himself upon the cross. Amen.

Jesus came to serve! The word minister means “to serve.” Some years ago a book titled “Each One a Minister” was very popular. However, it did tend to lead to some confusion.

Some Christians began to believe that every Christian should serve as a pastor or overseer of the flock. Nothing could be farther from the truth. In truth, every Christian is called to minister. All Christians are called to serve their neighbors. This service often includes sacrifice.

As the Lenten season draws to its conclusion, let us not grow weary of service. We are about to witness the greatest service of all as we recall the day when Jesus gave His life as a ransom for the world.

One of the greatest services that we can offer is to bring the message of forgiveness through Jesus to the people around us. Pray that you may find a way to use Holy Week and Easter as an opportunity to point others to Jesus, the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world (John 1:29).

Prayer: O Lord, thank You for Jesus and His cross of salvation. Grant that we would use Holy Week and Easter as opportunities to serve our neighbors with the blessings of the Gospel, through the same Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

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
