

## **Devotional thoughts:**

If you haven't noticed, this is an election year. Really? Can you even imagine someone in our country not noticing? We have just finished being bombarded by news from one political convention and the next one is on the way. Television and social media are awash in political advertising. And if that is not enough, I am constantly receiving calls from pollsters who want to know what I think about this or that candidate.

There was a time when I would have felt honored to be included in a poll. I would have been happy to share my views, but no one ever asked. Now public opinion surveys are so common, I sometimes receive more than one call a night. They have become so intrusive that I seldom choose to participate.

In many ways, polling is valuable. It's good for advertisers, political parties, and news media to know public opinion. It helps to sell products, promote candidates, and discover what citizens believe about significant issues facing our country. However, it is also essential to remember that public opinion is often wrong when it comes to vital facts. Such is the case in our Gospel lesson for today.

Jesus asks the question, "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" Jesus uses the term "Son of Man" to refer to Himself about 80 times. By this expression, Jesus indicates that He is fully a man but much more. It is a title of the Messiah from the Old Testament that combines the ideas of a servant who will suffer and die for all people and the exalted Son of Man who will reign for all eternity.

The Gospel of Matthew was written for readers who were fully acquainted with the Old Testament and should understand what Jesus meant by this title. Mark and Luke wrote for people who may not have a strong background in the Jewish faith. They render Jesus' question this way, "Who do people say that I am?"

The disciples were in a good position to answer this question. Countless people had come to hear Jesus and seek healing from Him. Thousands had been fed when the disciples distributed loaves and fish blessed by Jesus. They certainly had their fingers on the pulse of public opinion when it came to Jesus.

There seemed to be four main answers to the question, "Who do people say that I am?" In the minds of the people, Jesus could be John the Baptist, Elijah, Jeremiah, or simply one of the other prophets. I wonder how that would have been reported on the evening news.

"This just in. Current polling indicates that 38% of eligible voters consider Jesus to be John the Baptist. 29% judge Him to be Elijah, 17% think He is Jeremiah, and 16% regard Him as one of the other prophets. John the Baptist seems to have an insurmountable lead at this point."

Here we can see the weakness of public opinion polls. People can be 100% wrong! Jesus was none of these individuals. John the Baptist had been a great preacher like Jesus. Elijah had worked great miracles like Jesus. But Jesus was neither. Jesus was so much more as we learn when Jesus asks His disciples, "But who do you say that I am?"

Contrary to all public opinion, Peter jumps in with the absolutely right answer, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." How could He be anything less? He walked on the water. He calmed the seas. He raised the dead. He healed the sick. He gave sight to the blind. He made the lame to walk and the deaf to hear. He was indeed the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world!

We teach young people to resist peer pressure yet we often forget as adults that the crowds can be dangerously wrong. As Christian people, we ought never to submit our ideas concerning morality to the test of public opinion. Our actions should never be swayed by mobs in the street. Our faith should not be dictated by culture, social media, or trendy celebrities.

We stand apart from the unbelieving world and trust that Jesus is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. Rather than the din of the nightly news, we listen to the good news of great joy clearly proclaimed by angels to shepherds, "For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord" (Luke 2:11).

Peter's confession of faith was shared by all the disciples. We share the same confession with him, "Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the Living God." From the very beginning, the Christian Church has been built on the rock of this confession. The storms and thunder of public opinion may rage against it, but nothing can move us from this rock of our salvation. Even the gates of hell shall not prevail against the Church built by Jesus upon the rock of this confession. Our Savior, the Son of the Living God, will one day bring us to be with Him for all eternity!

“Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus” (Philippians 4:6-7).

God’s richest blessings to you in Christ.

#### Introduction

Most modern forms of meditation turn a person inward. Biblical meditation turns a person outward toward what God has said and done especially what He has said and done through Jesus for our salvation.

Each Sunday has its own special theme directing us to meditate on God's word and actions. This theme is found in the Propers of the Day (the parts of the service that change week to week). From Advent through the Easter season these themes focus our attention on the life of Jesus from His birth to His death and resurrection. There is always much more in the propers than can be covered in any Sunday service. God willing, I will use the propers for Sunday to provide you with a devotion each day to help you meditate on what God has done for you.

This Psalm often comes to mind when I learn of foolish plans made by earthly rulers who think that they can outsmart God and defy His decrees and eternal will. According to verse 4, God simply sits in heaven and laughs at their foolishness.

God has set His King on Zion! He has made His only-begotten Son to be King of Kings and Lord of Lords. He has been crowned with many crowns, the Lamb upon His throne.

All the evil plans of the world will come to nothing. They will all fall apart. God’s Church, His people, who have been redeemed by the blood of the Lamb will remain forever. The gates of hell will not prevail against it.

Ours is not the first generation to challenge the concept of truth. John records this encounter between Jesus and Pilate.

Then Pilate said to him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this purpose I was born and for this purpose I have come into the world—to bear witness to the truth. Everyone who is of the truth listens to my voice." Pilate said to him, "What is truth?" (John 18:37-38).

Why is it that so many people want truth to be variable? Why do they reject the idea of absolute truth? The answer is found in our sinful nature. Humans rebel against anything that stands in the way of their own selfish desires. Have you ever been in front of an impatient driver and heard the blast of a horn 10 microseconds after the light turns green? Nothing should be allowed to get in our way, not traffic, not truth!

Traffic laws should be ignored at our own peril. So also truth should be ignored at our own peril. Rejecting truth means rejecting God. Rejecting God means rejecting truth and life.

Jesus is the truth! In the Sermon on the Mount, He spoke clearly about sin. He taught frankly about death and judgment.

He also is the Life! He gave up His life on the cross so that we may live eternally. He is the Way, the only Way, to eternal life. May we never reject Him!

Throughout most of history, God’s people have been surrounded by unbelievers. So it was in the time of King David. Yet in spite of being surrounded by false gods and false religion, David was determined to sing his praises to the true God.

We live in a time when our mainstream culture is bold in attacking God’s people and our faith. We may become hesitant to publicly praise our Lord and Savior. Yet, like David, we are moved to give thanks to God for His steadfast love and faithfulness.

God has not abandoned us to sin and death. Rather, He sent His only-begotten Son so that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life. In the midst of trouble, He preserves us.

Whatever your situation, David reminds us that the Lord has a purpose for you. He may not have revealed it to you, but you can be certain that He will fulfill His purpose for you. We are convinced that His ultimate purpose for us is to experience His steadfast love forever!

Prayer: O Lord, grant us the opportunity and ability to sing Your praises in every circumstance. Let us never forget that Your ultimate will for us is to spend eternity with You, in your Son, Jesus Christ. Amen.

Our greatest strength in times of weariness is the salvation that is ours in Christ Jesus. He is our Good Shepherd who leads us beside the quiet waters and into green pastures. He gently leads us and protects us with His rod and staff until we shall dwell in the house of the Lord forever.

There is enough material in this small section of Romans for countless sermons! It begins with the words chosen as the gradual for many weeks during the season of Pentecost. God’s wisdom and knowledge is so far beyond our comprehension that no one can begin fully to know the mind of the Lord.

The only way we can begin to receive this knowledge is through His divine revelation to us. The most perfect revelation of God’s wisdom and knowledge is Jesus Christ!

It seems irrational to humans that the Creator of the Universe would send His Son to die for sinful people. Yet that is the inscrutable way of God!

It seems irrational that death on the cross would lead to resurrection and life eternal. Yet that is the inscrutable way of God!

In light of God’s inscrutable grace, may we present ourselves to Him as a living sacrifice. May we not be conformed to this world but transformed into a mind that seeks what is good and acceptable and perfect.

Prayer: O God, thank You for revealing to us Your divine plan of salvation through faith in Christ. Grant us the desire and ability to live lives that are a living sacrifice to You through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Stone is the most common building material in the holy land. Because of this many structures remain from ancient times. There are places where you can see and explore buildings by Herod the Great or the Romans. The massive stones of the Temple Mount are a testimony to their construction prowess.

In the small town of Capernaum on the northwestern shore of the Sea of Galilee, you will find a 4<sup>th</sup>-century synagogue built on the foundation of an older building from Jesus' day. Between the synagogue and the shoreline, you will find the remains of a house identified by many as the home of St. Peter.

This is the house where Jesus often stayed in Capernaum. It is the place where Jesus healed Peter's mother-in-law. It is the house where four men lowered a paralytic through the roof for Jesus to heal.

It is easy to see why Peter writes that we "like living stones are being built up as a spiritual house." There are many famous church buildings in the world. Because they are where the family of God gathers we often simply refer to them as churches. Yet the real church is not a building made with stones but one made with living stones, the people of God.

You and I are the church. Buildings may crumble but the church remains strong because it is built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets with Christ Jesus Himself being the cornerstone. This Church will remain for all eternity. In it, God dwells with His people because He has made us His own in Christ.
