


The third day He rose again from the dead. He ascended into heaven

Devotional thoughts:

I have lived through (endured?) seventeen presidential elections. This one is my eighteenth! Some elections are more memorable than others. The first one that I remember is the election of 1960.

I remember JFK and his bold challenge to reach the moon by the end of the decade. I was under the weather and not at school the day he died so I was watching TV when the first report of his shooting interrupted regular programming. I watched his funeral. If I searched hard enough, I could find a Kennedy half-dollar that I collected when they first were minted.

God has blessed America with great leaders. We have also had to endure those that have had significant flaws. I thank God that He has blessed us with a system of government that is of the people, by the people, for the people and is larger than any one individual.

This year and in every presidential election year, we are bombarded by campaign promises. Ignoring attacks made on opposing candidates, each candidate proclaims what they believe the voters want to hear.

In a way, many presidential candidates are like the second son in Jesus' account of the two brothers. They are all talk but no action. American history is littered with broken campaign promises. They are too numerous to even begin listing them.

But before we get too far afield in criticizing those running for office or the chief priests and elders of the Gospel lesson, it is more important to see ourselves in this Parable of the Two Sons. Have you ever been hurt by those who are "all talk and no action?" Have you ever been "all talk and no action" when it comes to promises made? Have you ever been let down by someone when you depended on their commitment to you? Have you ever let down someone who depended on your word?

It should be no surprise when we see worldly people display a lack of integrity. However, it is particularly disappointing when God's people are found wanting in truthfulness and honor. Through the years, I have heard many stories of people who have been hurt by pastors or people who call themselves Christians. Likewise, I know of numerous accounts of congregations deceiving pastors with false or misleading promises. Such is life in a sinful world. None of us live up to God's standard! May God grant us this recognition.

The tax collectors and prostitutes are represented by the first son. They made no pretense of obedience. They took pride in flatly refusing the father's request.

You have probably met many people like this. Their ungodly attitude is on display for all to see. They may have foul language or a riotous lifestyle. They may slander Christians and call them crazy. Yet often these are the ones who find the Gospel message so wonderful and appealing.


I once met a young husband and father like that. I was convinced that I would never see him in church. Yet by God's grace and the working of the Holy Spirit, I was given the opportunity to instruct him in the faith and confirm him. A few years later, he told me that he and his family would drive in the car and sing our Lutheran liturgy. His favorite part was "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me...Restore unto me the joy of Thy salvation!"


How did this happen? Jesus explains at the end of His parable. "John came to you in the way of righteousness, and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the prostitutes believed him."

When we are smug and self-righteous, it is too easy to join with the chief priests and elders. It is too easy to believe that we have earned a place in God's kingdom. But in truth, we are "all talk and no action." Promises to live holy and sinless lives are empty. In thought, word, and deed, we fail to go into the vineyard.

Only when we recognize the great disappointment our actions bring to God do we turn from our sin and believe in our Savior. We join with the tax collectors, sinners, slanderers, and thieves, laying our sins at the foot of Jesus' cross. We hear His soothing words, "Father, forgive them." By God's grace and the working of the Holy Spirit, we sing:



Enhancing Your Worship Meditating on God's Word and Works

The Week of the Seventeenth Sunday after Pentecost September 28 – October 4

Introduction

Most modern forms of mediation turn a person inward. Biblical meditation turns a person outward toward what God has said and done especially what He has said and done through Jesus for our salvation.

Each Sunday has its own special theme directing us to meditate on God's word and actions. This theme is found in the Propers of the Day (the parts of the service that change week to week). From Advent through the Easter season these themes focus our attention on the life of Jesus from His birth to His death and resurrection. There is always much more in the propers than can be covered in any Sunday service. God willing, I will use the propers for Sunday to provide you with a devotion each day to help you mediate on what God has done for you.

Introits begin with an antiphon. An antiphon is a short verse or chant added at the beginning and end of the introit or psalm. It is sometimes used as a refrain in the middle of a psalm. The idea of using an antiphon is one of the oldest parts of Christian worship. It was brought over from the experience of worship in the synagogue.

In general, the antiphon is a verse from the psalm that echoes the theme. The antiphon for this week is Psalm 147:6, "The Lord lifts up the humble; he casts the wicked to the ground."

It reflects the words of Jesus recorded in the Gospel lesson, where tax collectors and the prostitutes go into the kingdom of God before the chief priests and elders! This is a reason to praise the Lord!

Psalm 147 is the second of the five "Hallelujah Psalms" that complete the Book of Psalms. Hallelujah is Hebrew for "Praise the Lord." In these five psalms, the word praise occurs 44 times in the ESV translation!

Here we praise the Lord for lifting up the humble, those who are poor in spirit (Matthew 5:3). If you have time, read all five of these psalms. You will discover that we praise the Lord because He heals the brokenhearted; He gathers the outcasts; He makes peace in your borders, and He fills you with the finest of the wheat.

We learn that all creation praises the Lord. Kings of the earth and all peoples, princes and all rulers of the earth praise the Lord! Young men and maidens together, old men and children praise the Lord!

Why do you praise the Lord? We praise the Lord because, in Jesus, there is peace on earth, goodwill toward men; In Jesus, there is forgiveness and salvation; In Jesus, we will live in Paradise forever; In Jesus, the Lord lifts up the humble!

Let us pray. O Lord, let me never stand before You in foolish pride. Grant that I may humbly confess my sins and receive forgiveness, life, and salvation.

In Psalm 25, David continues the theme for this week of God caring for the humble. Yet we miss the point if we do not recognize that true humility is the recognition of sin!

David pleads in this psalm, "Remember not the sins of my youth or my transgressions." It is easy to be plagued by guilt from past wrongs. David felt guilt and in humility pleaded for forgiveness.

Unfortunately, our psalm this week ends at verse 10. However, let us also consider verse 11. "For your name's sake, O Lord, pardon my guilt, for it is great." This is the plea of a humble man. May we join him in this plea.

Thanks be to God. He has heard our plea for mercy and sent His only-begotten Son to be our Savior. We rejoice in the Lord's steadfast love and faithfulness. He has forgiven our sins and granted us eternal life.

Prayer: O Lord, move our hearts to join with King David in true humility. Grant us grace to confess our sins and receive forgiveness from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen.

The news over the last few weeks has been distressing. No one can doubt that injustice exists in our land. It always has and it always will. As long as sinful people are in charge, injustice will exist in every nation.

Equally distressing is seeing people suffer at the hands of those who claim to want justice. Innocent people have been hurt, property has been destroyed, and bystanders have been killed, all in the name of justice.

This section of Ezekiel is a look at God's justice. Ezekiel tells us this message from God, "the soul who sins shall die." There is no escaping God's justice. Everyone is responsible for their own crimes and transgressions.

I have no one but myself to blame for my sin. I deserve each and every consequence of sin that I receive. This is justice.

How thankful I am that God is not only just but He is also merciful. God's justice demands payment for sin. God's mercy provides that payment in the person of Jesus, whose holy precious blood, innocent suffering and death are more valuable than gold or silver.

There is no way that one person could pay for the sins of another (Psalm 49:7). However, since Jesus is not only a man but also God, His death on the cross paid for the sins of the whole world (John 1:29).

¹⁴Do all things without grumbling or questioning, ¹⁵that you may be blameless and innocent, children of God without blemish in the midst of a crooked and twisted generation, among whom you shine as lights in the world, ¹⁶holding fast to the word of life, so that in the day of Christ I may be proud that I did not run in vain or labor in vain. ¹⁷Even if I am to be poured out as a drink offering upon the sacrificial offering of your faith, I am glad and rejoice with you all. ¹⁸Likewise you also should be glad and rejoice with me.

Jesus is the perfect example of humility. Although He was (and is) completely God, He "made himself nothing, taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross."

It is for this reason that Paul urges us all, "Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others."

It is difficult living in "a crooked and twisted generation." Yet since we know Jesus, have been forgiven of all our sins, and have the gift of eternal life, we can "shine as lights in the world."

In this time of national distress and anxiety, may God grant that His people would bring the message of light and life to people around them.

We begin a new gradual this week with the words of Psalm 91:11, "He will command his angels concerning you to guard you in all your ways." We follow the Good Shepherd into green pastures and beside still waters. He is with us as we walk through the Valley of Death. However, we never knowingly cast ourselves from the pinnacle of the temple.

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name, Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven; give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.
