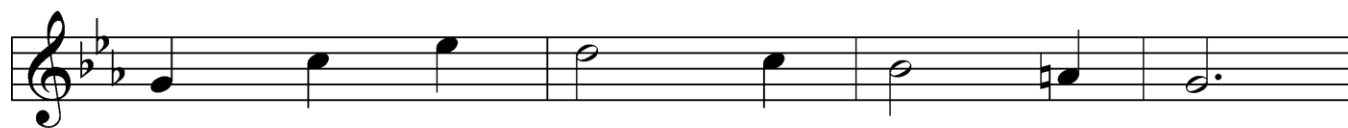

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Devotional thoughts:

On the outskirts of old Nazareth, there is a place to visit called Nazareth Village. It is an open-air museum in the heart of the bustling modern city of Nazareth. Jesus grew up a short distance away and it is not hard to imagine Him walking the terraced hillside of this fascinating place.

Nazareth Village is a reproduction of first-century life from the time of Jesus. Among other things to do and see there, you can sit in a synagogue, go to a first-century carpenter shop, learn the first century way of spinning wool into yarn and watch it woven into clothing. It is built on ancient agricultural land. The original farm has been restored with its ancient terraces, irrigation system, and stone quarry. It boasts the area's last remaining first-century wine press.

While reading the Gospel lesson for today, I could picture Jesus walking through this vineyard. I wonder. As a boy, did Jesus help with the harvest in this vineyard? Did He ever walk the short distance to this farm to play with children in the family? Did He watch the grapes being pressed into juice? Did He taste wine made from the grapes grown in this vineyard?

Jesus clearly knew all about vineyards. But more than that, Jesus knew human nature. He knew of greed and selfishness. They were unmistakably displayed by the chief priests and the Pharisees who first heard this parable.

The most familiar portion of Matthew 21 is Jesus' Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem. We celebrate it on Palm Sunday every year because it happened on the Sunday before Jesus' resurrection on the first Easter. Our text for today is the end of the chapter.

The chief priests and elders are angry with Jesus. They resent the adoring crowds of Palm Sunday. When He cleansed the temple, they saw their livelihood threatened. They didn't like John the Baptist. They like Jesus even less.

The chief priests, elders, and Pharisees in theory were working for God. In reality, they were only working for themselves. Indeed, this is nothing new. Corrupt leadership was a problem for Israel throughout Old Testament history. Jesus tells The Parable of the Tenants to drive home this point.

God had always been the Master of the Vineyard. He cared for the people of Israel in the same way a farmer cares for his vineyard. He planted it. He protected it. He watched over it. He placed those who should have been faithful to Him in charge of the day to day operations.

These leaders didn't want to serve the Master. They only wanted to serve themselves! Over and over again God sent His servants, in the form of the prophets into the vineyard of His people. Over and over again, they were beaten, killed, and stoned. Finally, the Master sent His Son!

It would have been amazing to live in the time of Jesus to see the very Son of God. Yet this is not what the chief priests and elders thought. They only saw Him as a challenge to their authority, to their income, to their lifestyle. And as we know, just as in the parable, they killed the Master's Son. How sad!

Nevertheless, their rejection of Master's Son was used by God to redeem lost and condemned sinners. “The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; this was the Lord's doing, and it is marvelous in our eyes.”

We should not be too quick to simply condemn the chief priests and elders of Jesus' day. The same warning and promise are true today. When we think we are in charge of our own realities, moralities, and lifestyles, we reject the Master. God continually sends His servants to us today. Unfortunately, many choose to reject them. In some parts of the world, they are still beaten, killed, and stoned.

Yet for us who live in the vineyard and have been redeemed by the death of the Master's Son, we see this turn about as marvelous in our eyes. The rejected stone has become the cornerstone. Death has been changed to life. Sin has been covered with righteousness. The broken are healed.

The Lutheran Women's Missionary League has been working in the vineyard for 78 years. We rejoice that through their mites and offerings, God's kingdom has been advanced. Let us join them in serving the Master of the Vineyard until "the great Church victorious Shall be the Church at rest."

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:6-7).

Introduction

I once worked a summer job in a very hot factory. I stood next to a molten crucible of aluminum. One ladle at a time, I filled the cylinder of a die-cast machine. Next, I pushed a button and a piston rammed the molten aluminum into a water-cooled die. A few seconds later, the die opened and I removed the freshly made cast aluminum part. I would repeat this process over and over again for eight hours a day. By the way, if you don't know, aluminum melts at 1,221°F.

One day, every 15 to 20 minutes a man would come and take a new casting. A few minutes later, he would come and adjust my machine. I soon discovered that he was cutting the castings and examining them. The castings were not being made to the required specifications so he would return and adjust my machine. At the end of the day, I learned that my entire day's work was rejected. None of the castings could be used. Of

course, I was paid for my work but I still remember the disappointment I felt when I learned that eight hours of working with molten aluminum had been rejected!

The factory had no other choice. The parts I made were below the required standard. Still, I felt bad. Imagine what it would be like if what I had produced was perfect but rejected?

That is exactly what happened to Jesus. His life was absolutely perfect, but He was rejected by the religious leaders of His day. Yet we know that ultimately, theirs was not the opinion that mattered. What mattered is that in God's eyes, Jesus' perfectly fulfilled the law for us. For this reason, God seated Him at His right hand and made Him the head of the Church.

More than that, Jesus' perfect sacrifice on the cross was accepted by God as payment for the sins of the world. You and I are not rejected by God for our sins. Rather, we have received Jesus' righteousness as our own and have been welcomed into the family of God for time and all eternity. This is indeed marvelous!

Prayer: Gracious God, You gave Your Son into the hands of sinful men who killed Him. Forgive us when we reject Your unfailing love, and grant us the fullness of Your salvation; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

I live near many, many vineyards. This time of year, the smell of ripe grapes is everywhere. It is wonderful.

In the Psalm for this week, God's people are compared to a vine tended by God. As Israel grew, the vine

covered the Promised Land from the sea to the River. Blessings abounded.

Unfortunately, the time of blessings did not continue. The people of Israel forgot about God. They turned away from Him. The vineyard fell into disrepair. It was ravaged by beasts. It was burned by fire. It was cut down.

How can the vineyard be restored? Turn back to God, the vinedresser.

This Old Testament truth is still relevant today. God always wants to bless His people. Yet, because of our sinful nature, we continually turn away from Him. Often, we suffer the consequence of our sin. Unless we turn back to Him, we will suffer the ultimate consequence of sin, eternal separation from God.

Fortunately, when we do return to God, He restores us. He saves us from sin and blesses us with eternal life.

Prayer: O Lord, move our hearts to turn from our sin and return to You. Restore us and let Your face shine upon us, O Lord. Amen.

This week is Sukkot or “The feast of booths or tabernacles.” It began last Friday and ends tomorrow. It recalls the time when Israel left Egypt and wandered in the wilderness. Its origin is recorded in Leviticus 23:42-43, “You shall dwell in booths for seven days. All native Israelites shall dwell in booths, that your generations may know that I made the people of Israel dwell in booths when I brought them out of the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God.”

Today, it is a joyful time of celebration. It is also a time of celebrating the harvest. How appropriate! I have been watching the harvest taking place all around me for the last few weeks.

Scholars suggest that this reading from Isaiah was proclaimed in Old Testament times during the celebration of Sukkot.

In this portion of Isaiah, we learn that God cares for His people as a vineyard. He protects it with a watchtower. He plants it in fertile soil cleared of stones. The vineyard is lacking nothing.

In spite of all this tender loving care, the vineyard grows wild grapes. This is the sad but true history of all humanity.

Still, God has not abandoned His vineyard. He sent the True Vinedresser to save His people. He cleared away the briars and the thorns of sin. He restored the vineyard to its intended purpose. He welcomes back all of His people who turn from their sins and dwell in the House of the Lord!

Prayer: O Lord, as we witness the bounty of the harvest, let us always bring to you our thanksgiving. Help us to remember that we are Your vineyard, that you tenderly care for us, and grant us a place in eternity with you because of the True Vinedresser. Amen.

⁴If anyone else thinks he has reason for confidence in the flesh, I have more: ⁵circumcised on the eighth day, of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; ⁶as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness, under the law blameless. ⁷But whatever gain I had, I counted as loss for the sake of Christ. ⁸Indeed, I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things and count them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ ⁹and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God that depends on faith— ¹⁰that I may know him and the power of his resurrection, and may share his sufferings, becoming like him in his death, ¹¹that by any means possible I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

¹²Not that I have already obtained this or am already perfect, but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. ¹³Brothers, I do not consider that I have made it my own. But one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, ¹⁴I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus.

As we continue our reading through Philippians, we take a break from the vineyard imagery for this week. The Apostle Paul declares that in human religious terms, no one is better than him. He has been exceedingly faithful to the religious laws and regulations of the Old Testament. Yet he knows that none of those things brings salvation. His own righteousness from following the law is worthless.

His righteousness must come from somewhere else. It comes from Christ. Everything else is unimportant compared to knowing the righteousness that comes from God by faith in Christ. His ultimate goal is to share in Christ's resurrection from the dead.

In this time of uncertainty and turmoil, it is an important reminder that we do not become distracted from the ultimate importance of knowing Christ and sharing in His resurrection from the dead.

Let us join Paul in pressing toward this goal, the upward call of God in Christ Jesus.

Prayer: O Lord, thank you for Jesus and the righteousness that He grants to us through faith. Grant to us a proper perspective on life valuing the gift of eternal life above all else, in Jesus' name. Amen.

He is often rejected. We may become discouraged by the problems we have living in a world that is hostile to the Christian faith. We may allow ourselves to become self-absorbed with our own problems and difficulties.

Pause for a moment to remember, "This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it." We live in the Day of Salvation. It is the Lord's doing. It is marvelous in our eyes. The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone!
