

The Day of Pentecost May 23, 2021

Today around the world, the Church is celebrating the coming of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit, symbolized by the tongues of fire, has been with the Church from its beginning and promises to be with us throughout all eternity.

The liturgical color for this festival is red to remind us of those tongues of fire that rested upon the believers on the first Pentecost Day. It represents divine zeal displayed on the day of Pentecost and points to the blood of the Martyrs of the Church.

Today, we remember that we have been called, gathered, enlightened, and sanctified by the Holy Spirit through the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This same Jesus sends us out with the power of his Spirit to bring peace and forgiveness to the world.

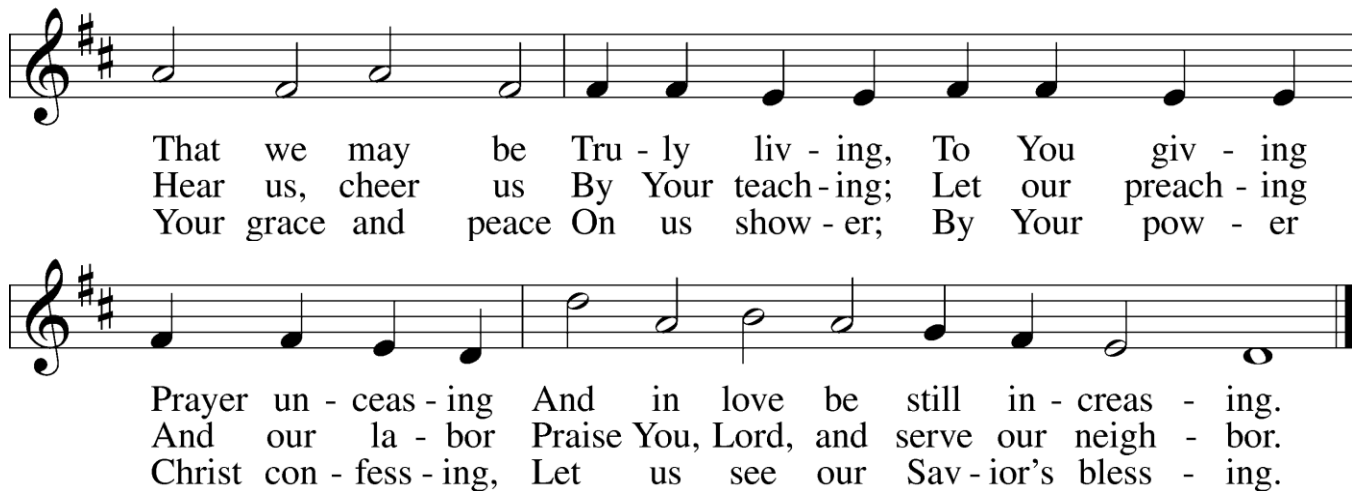

Devotional thoughts:

Wenn aber der Tröster kommen wird, welchen ich euch senden werde vom Vater, der Geist der Wahrheit, der vom Vater ausgeht, der wird zeugen von mir.

Imagine for a moment that you could hear me reading these words. There are a few of my friends and relatives who could understand them. Most of the people I know would have difficulty with them.

Let me set the stage. On the Day of Pentecost, 50 days after the Passover Sabbath, people gathered to celebrate the end of the grain harvest. This was one of the three Old Testament Pilgrimage Festivals called the Feast of Weeks. (The other two are The Passover and the Feast of Tabernacles.) According to Rabbinic tradition, it also commemorated the giving of the Torah, the first five books of the Bible.

Seven weeks before, people from all over flooded Jerusalem to worship at the temple for the Passover. Now, they are again gathered for this great festival. There are Parthians and Medes and Elamites and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome. Imagine the language barrier! Soon that would all change.

In the middle of this commotion, someplace in Jerusalem, the disciples were gathered in a house, possibly where they had recently selected Matthias to complete the number of the apostles. Unknown to them, God was about to do something grand. He was going to send the Holy Spirit in fulfillment of Jesus' promise recorded in our Gospel lesson for today.

Without warning, the tremendous noise of a mighty wind filled the house. It sounded like the breath of God! Not only that, but tongues of fire rested on each one of them! I am not exactly sure what it looked like, but I am reminded of a time centuries before when Moses saw a bush that burned with fire but was not consumed (Exodus 3:2).

The disciples were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages as the Holy Spirit gave them the words to say. This in its self would be amazing enough but it is just the beginning of a tumultuous day.

At some point, the disciples made their way to the crowds of people. Perhaps they were standing on the top of the massive steps on the north side of the Temple mount where their voices could be heard by the gathered throng.

Next, the most amazing event happened on that first Day of Pentecost. The people heard them telling the mighty works of God in their own languages! The disciples weren't babbling in unintelligible speech as had happened long before when people sought to build for themselves a city and a tower with its top in the heavens and God confused their speech (Exodus 11:1-9). Now they would each hear and understand the most wonderful good news of all!

Peter spoke loudly for all to hear and understand the first Christian sermon. Jesus, whom they had crucified, was raised from the dead, ascended into heaven, and is sitting at the right hand of God. From there, He had sent the Holy Spirit. What they were seeing and hearing was evidence of this.

When the Holy Spirit convicted them of their sin, they were cut to the heart and asked, "Brothers, what shall we do? Peter answered them, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is for you and for your children and for all who are far off, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to himself."

On that day, they learned that everyone who calls upon the name of the Lord shall be saved! The Holy Spirit working through the word of apostles to bring three thousand souls to faith on that day! What began on the Day of Pentecost continues to this day each time God's word is proclaimed, the Holy Spirit is at work bringing people to faith and strengthening them in the faith!

The Holy Spirit has also touched your heart! Sometimes He convicts you of sin and brings you to repentance. Then He comforts you with the forgiveness of sins won by Jesus on the cross and promises you eternal life!

You and I are privileged to continue the work of the disciples begun on that first Day of Pentecost. We bring God's word of salvation to people of every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages (Revelation 7:9).

We begin this work at home when we teach our children about Jesus and His love. We continue this work when we support Christian schools and churches. We are active in this work when we speak to our friends and neighbors about the promises of God in Jesus. To enable the message of salvation to go to all nations in

fulfillment of Jesus' Great Commission (Matthew 28:18-20), we support missionaries, Bible translators, the Lutheran Hour, and media ministries.

I suppose you may be wondering about the opening sentence of this little message. It is Luther's German translation of the first verse of the Gospel lesson for today, John 15:26, "But when the Helper comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth, who proceeds from the Father, he will bear witness about me." Jesus tells us that the work of the Holy Spirit is to teach about Jesus! May His work ever flourish among us.

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice. Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:4-7).

God's richest blessings to you in Christ.

L Lord God, as we celebrate this Day of Pentecost, grant that Your Holy Spirit would bring us the peace and joy of salvation through Jesus Christ Our Lord.

Pentecost and the Church Year

The curious may ask, “How did the Church Year come into existence?” While we may not possess all of the details, the answer to this question is not too difficult. The Church Year grew out of the events of Jesus’ life and ministry on earth.

The central and most important part of the Church Year is The Resurrection of our Lord. Every other part of the Church Year relates to this day and the salvation that Jesus won for us on the cross.

The Bible is quite clear about the events surrounding Easter. The actual days on which they occurred are recorded, therefore from earliest times, these days were observed annually: Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter, Ascension Day, and Pentecost. The accounts of these events were read in the churches. Sermons were preached explaining them. People rejoiced to learn again about these undeniably important actions of Jesus for the salvation of the world.

Eventually, the observance of Jesus’ birth was added to the Church Year as well as the seasons preceding Christmas and Easter (Advent and Lent) as a result the first half of the Church Year was dedicated to the life and work of Jesus.

Pentecost is the day on which Jesus fulfilled His promise to send the Holy Spirit to His Apostles. It is sometimes called the birthday of the Church because by the end of the day, after Peter’s sermon, 3,000 were baptized and added to the Church.

It is the Holy Spirit who brings us into the faith and keeps us in the faith. He continues to work through the Church today by the means of grace (Word and Sacraments). The second half of the Church Year is dedicated to the work of the Holy Spirit in the lives of the Christian people. Since it is the Holy Spirit who causes the Church to grow in numbers and faith, green (the color of growth) is chosen for the Sundays after Pentecost.

With next Sunday (Trinity Sunday) the festival half of the Church Year comes to its conclusion. The observances of the great events in the life of Christ are past until we again approach Christmas. Nevertheless, God is still doing great things in our lives every day. During the Pentecost season, we seek to focus more clearly on how Christ touches our lives by His Spirit and how we respond.

Introduction

As often is the case, there is much to be found in Psalm 104 that didn't make its way into the introit. One verse that would seem to fit well with the Day of Pentecost is Psalm 104:4, "He makes His messengers winds, His ministers a flaming fire." I cannot help but think of the mighty rushing wind and the tongues of fire from the Day of Pentecost when I read these words.

A key verse from our introit is Psalm 104:30, "When you send forth your Spirit, they are created." It is a common mistake to believe that the Holy Spirit is only mentioned in the New Testament. While it is true that the Holy Spirit and His work are more fully revealed in the New Testament, you will find Him referred to throughout the Old Testament.

We learn of the Holy Spirit already in Genesis 1:2, "The Spirit of God was hovering over the face of the waters." A key passage describing the Holy Spirit's omnipresence is Psalm 139:7-10 (NIV),

- ⁷ Where can I go from your Spirit?
Where can I flee from your presence?
⁸ If I go up to the heavens, you are there;
if I make my bed in the depths, you are there.
⁹ If I rise on the wings of the dawn,
if I settle on the far side of the sea,
¹⁰ even there your hand will guide me,
your right hand will hold me fast.

In fact, on Pentecost, Peter describes the events of the day as the fulfillment of the Old Testament prophet, Joel. He quotes Joel 2:28 in Acts 2:17, "And in the last days it shall be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit on all flesh."

The most important thing to remember about the work of the Holy Spirit is His work in our hearts. Without the Holy Spirit, none of us would believe in Jesus. 1 Corinthians 2:14 tells us, "The natural person does not accept the things of the Spirit of God, for they are folly to him, and he is not able to understand them because they are spiritually discerned." In fact, we learn from 1 Corinthians 12:3 that "no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except in the Holy Spirit."

Pentecost is an opportunity to thank God for the gift of faith granted to us by His Spirit. It is an occasion to thank Him for the gift of salvation that we receive by faith.

“The Princess Bride” is a film that has fans from all generations. One of the characters in the movie is a villain named Vizzini, played by Wallace Shawn. He credits himself with being astoundingly intelligent. Compared to him, he considers Plato, Aristotle, and Socrates to be morons.

He uses his intelligence to create infallible plans for the demise of the movie’s hero. Each time his diabolical tactics fail. To this, he exclaims the memorable and often quoted word, “Inconceivable!”

Here is a so-called brilliant man whose intelligence has failed him. He is so much like each one of us. Left to our own cleverness, we could never figure out God and His plan of salvation. To the human mind, the fact that God sent His only-begotten Son to die on the cross for the sins of the world seems inconceivable!

That He should rise from the dead is totally inconceivable! That you and I have our sins forgiven and receive the gift of eternal life is absolutely inconceivable!

But the Holy Spirit has called us by the Gospel, enlightened us with His gifts, sanctified, and kept us in the true faith—inconceivable, but true!

There is a folk song or children’s rhyme that I cannot discover the origin to, but I think you may have heard before. It goes like this:

Nobody likes me, everybody hates me
I think I’ll go eat worms!
Big fat juicy ones
Eensie weensy squeensy ones
See how they wiggle and squirm!

I suppose most of us have shared the feelings of the child reciting this poem. It may have happened when you suffered some severe disappointment in your life or when you felt rejected by someone dear. The Psalm for this week teaches us how amazingly untrue the words of this ditty are.

In Psalm 139, David speaks for all of us. God is so concerned and cares so much about you that He makes sure that He knows everything about you. He is interested in your thoughts. He is interested in where you go and what you do. He is always with you. He holds your hand and leads you. He is with you in the darkness of the night and the bright light of the day.

In the two verses following our Psalm of the Day, David goes on to say:

- ¹³ For you formed my inward parts;
you knitted me together in my mother’s womb.
¹⁴ I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made.
Wonderful are your works; my soul knows it very well.

David knows God and writes about the wonder that he experiences because of His love. Not a moment passes that God doesn’t care for you. There is no need to eat big fat juicy worms! We are never without God’s love. Not in time. Not in eternity!

Prayer: O Lord, thank You for Your wonderful concern for me and the love that is mine in Jesus. Grant that I may never become discouraged with life and its trials but rather grant that I may rejoice in the gift of life for time and eternity through Jesus Christ my Lord. Amen.

But there was no breath in them. ⁹Then he said to me, “Prophecy to the breath; prophesy, son of man, and say to the breath, Thus says the Lord GOD: Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe on these slain, that they may live.” ¹⁰So I prophesied as he commanded me, and the breath came into them, and they lived and stood on their feet, an exceedingly great army.

¹¹Then he said to me, “Son of man, these bones are the whole house of Israel. Then you shall know that I am the LORD; I have spoken, and I will do it, declares the LORD.”

I am guessing that as you read through this lesson, you were singing in your mind the words to a spiritual song written by the civil rights activist, James Weldon Johnson (who, by the way, also wrote, “Lift ev'ry voice and sing”).

Dem bones, dem bones, dem dry bones.
Dem bones, dem bones, dem dry bones.
Dem bones, dem bones, dem dry bones.
Now hear the word of the Lord.

Of course, dry bones can never come together and live again! (Unless God's omnipotent word calls them to life.) The first “dry bones” were the house of Israel in exile. They were dried up. Their hope was lost. They were cut off from life itself.

We, too, are “dry bones.” We are captive to sin and death. When we depend on ourselves, our hope is lost!

There is only one way back to life. The Holy Spirit brings us back to life through the Word of the Lord when we hear the Gospel and believe in Jesus as our savior. He turns the cross to the resurrection. He turns

death to life. Through the Gospel, the Holy Spirit has breathed into us the breath of life.

Prayer: Almighty God, thank You for giving us life. Grant that our dry bones of despair would be brought again to a life of joy and peace in Christ, through the same Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

“I did not say these things to you from the beginning, because I was with you. ⁵But now I am going to him who sent me, and none of you asks me, ‘Where are you going?’ ⁶But because I have said these things to you, sorrow has filled your heart. ⁷Nevertheless, I tell you the truth: it is to your advantage that I go away, for if I do not go away, the Helper will not come to you. This is another one of those few weeks where the main lesson of the day is not the Gospel lesson. Rather, our main reading is the second reading from Acts 2 and the account of the Day of Pentecost.

However, the Gospel lesson for today is a key for understanding the Day of Pentecost and the work of the Holy Spirit.

Jesus sends the Holy Spirit from the Father. He is the Spirit of Truth. There never says anything false about God!

The work of the Holy Spirit is teaching us about Jesus. He did this by inspiring Holy Scripture so we would learn of Jesus and His work of salvation. He does this when the message of the cross and forgiveness touches our ears. He does this when He brings us to faith and keeps us in the faith.

In this translation of John, Jesus calls the Holy Spirit, the Helper. Other translations say Advocate or

Comforter. The Greek word is Paraclete. There is no exact English match for this word. All of the translations touch on one aspect of it or another. The Greek word paraclete means someone who is “called to your side.” It is a technical term for the attorney who represents you in court hence the use of the word advocate. It has the idea of intercession, that is, someone speaking for you, or intervening for you, or acting on your behalf.

It also means someone who comes to your side to bring help or comfort. Hence, all of these translations give us a glimpse into the work of the Holy Spirit who comes to our aid in every circumstance.

Jesus did not leave us or His disciples without help, comfort, and aid. The Holy Spirit is always there with us, binding up our hurts, and taking up our cause.

Prayer: O Lord, thank You for the gift of the Holy Spirit who comes to us through the means of Grace. Grant that we would never neglect Your word and sacraments and so deprive ourselves of the comfort and help that the Holy Spirit brings through the Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

The gradual for the Day of Pentecost makes the great connection between the Holy Spirit and faith. Without the Holy Spirit we are dead in our trespasses and sins (Ephesians 2:1). However, God has poured out His Spirit on people of every nation, regardless of age, gender, or race. All are able to believe by the working of the Spirit.

It is only through the Spirit that our hearts are changed from unbelief. Our human spirits reject God and His plan of salvation. However, just as on the Day of Pentecost, the Holy Spirit works in us the miracle of faith and we are justified, that is, declared not guilty of all sin and moral failings. With great joy, we confess this wonderful faith and the salvation that is ours in Jesus Christ.
