The Sixth Sunday after Pentecost

July 4, 2021

One of the greatest concepts in the Bible is the Kingdom of God. Misguided believers in both the Old and the New Testaments confused the Kingdom of God with an earthly kingdom to be established with Jerusalem as its capital city.

In fact, King Jesus does already rule the universe by His almighty power (Eph. 1:15-23). However, He has no interest in a political kingdom. He spoke these words to Pilate, **“My kingdom is not of this world. If it were, My servants would fight to prevent My arrest by the Jews. But now My kingdom is from another place”** (John 18:36).

Jesus directed His disciples to proclaim, **“The kingdom of God has come near to you.”** **God’s kingdom comes to us today through the Word and Sacraments. In His kingdom, Jesus brings peace and forgiveness. We enter His kingdom by faith.**

The thief on the cross called out to Jesus, **“Remember me when You come into Your kingdom.”** **We look forward to the day when our sojourn through this sinful world comes to an end and we are with the Savior forever in His eternal kingdom of paradise in heaven.**

In addition, we rejoice in the freedoms that we enjoy in our nation. Many have sacrificed for our benefit. Yet not everything in our country is in accord with God’s holy word, therefore we do not forget that we must obey God rather than men. It is important for Christian citizens to exercise their rights in a God-pleasing way.

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Devotional Thoughts:

This is an unusual year in many ways. The weather, politics, and the economy are keeping us guessing. The Covid-19 pandemic has been waxing and waning. A relatively minor curiosity among the unusual events we are experiencing is that the Fourth of July, American Independence Day, falls on a Sunday. It won't happen again until 2027. In light of this, grant me an indulgence to consider our national holiday in my devotional thoughts.

I was a vicar (intern) at Holy Cross Lutheran Church in Moline, Illinois from August 1975 to August 1976. I was there to celebrate the bicentennial of the Declaration of Independence. Remarkably, July 4th fell on a Sunday that year, too. As you can imagine, patriotism was in vogue. Our church sponsored a float in the Independence Day Parade. Red, white, and blue were everywhere. We said the Pledge of Allegiance at the beginning of our service and sang patriotic hymns. A special Independence Day sermon was preached. (I continued these practices throughout my ministry when I served in the United States.)

How times have changed! Now athletes refuse to stand for the National Anthem or turn their back on the flag. Pastors, believing they are being faithful to God, refuse to mention the 4th of July in their sermons and remove the American flag from their churches. One conspicuous example of this is found on the website of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod. On this site, prayers are provided for each Sunday to aid pastors in preparing for worship. In the prayers for this week, no mention is made of Independence Day although it falls on a Sunday.

In spite of this, patriotism has a long history in the Lutheran Church. In 1732, German-speaking Lutherans in Pennsylvania requested a pastor from Germany. In 1742, the request was finally fulfilled when Henry Melchior Muhlenberg accepted their call. His journals indicate that he was one of the first people to hear the public reading of the Declaration of Independence. His son, Peter was a pastor but in the Revolutionary war, he became a Major General in the Continental Army and later was elected to the U.S. Congress. Another son, Frederick also became a pastor. He served in the Continental Congress and was the first Speaker of the House of Representatives. As Speaker, he signed the Bill of Rights along with John Adams, the Vice-president.

The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod also has a long history of patriotism and national service. Pastors of the LCMS have served as military chaplains since the Civil War.

Of course, patriotism should never be confused with faithfulness to God. A constant theme in the Old Testament is the unfaithfulness of the kings of Judah and Israel. Their rebellion against God was ultimately punished by destruction and exile. Nevertheless, a good and peaceful government is a gift from God. Paul reminds us that all authority comes from God (Romans 13) and we are to pray for our national leaders (1 Timothy 2:1-3). In fact, it is pleasing to God.

Patriotism and praying for our national and local authorities are particularly difficult when we are scorned and ridiculed for our faith by political leaders and fellow citizens. But this should not be surprising. Jesus met the same disdain in his hometown of Nazareth. They refused to recognize Him even as a prophet! To them, He was just a carpenter and nothing more. In their minds, he certainly wasn't the Christ, the Son of God and Savior of the world.

In addition, the national leaders in Jerusalem saw Him as a threat to their earthly power and authority. Their solution was to put Him to death as a rebel against authority. History tells us that Peter and Paul also were executed by the government in Rome.

In the face of this opposition, what are we to do? First, we must understand that we live in a sinful world and our leaders are sinful. They need a savior just as we do. Their sinful actions should never catch us off guard. We do not accept their sinfulness but understand it. Just as King David of old, our leaders need to repent and receive forgiveness (2 Samuel 12; Psalm 51; Psalm 32).

Next, we recognize that our nation is a gift from God. He has put each of us in this time and place in history. It is no accident that we are to be citizens of our country while at the same time we are citizens of God's kingdom. When confronted with this dilemma Jesus declared, "Render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's" (Matthew 22:21).

While it may have become fashionable in the church to ignore Independence Day, it is good to hear what Martin Luther has to say about Romans 13:

"In chapter 13 [Paul] teaches honor and obedience to worldly government. Although worldly government does not make people righteous before God, nevertheless it is instituted in order to accomplish at least this much, that the good may have outward peace and protection and the bad may not be free to do evil in peace and quietness, and without fear. Therefore the good too are to honor it even though they themselves do not need it. Finally, he comprehends it all in love, and sums it up in the example of Christ: as he has done for us, we are also to do, following in his footsteps" (AE 35:379).

As we celebrate the Fourth of July during a time of discord, it would be well for us to conclude by hearing the Apostle Paul's direction concerning Christian citizenship and patriotism.

^{3:1} Remind them to be submissive to rulers and authorities, to be obedient, to be ready for every good work,² to speak evil of no one, to avoid quarreling, to be gentle, and to show perfect courtesy toward all people.³ For we ourselves were once foolish, disobedient, led astray, slaves to various passions and pleasures, passing our days in malice and envy, hated by others and hating one another.⁴ But when the goodness and loving kindness of God our Savior appeared,⁵ he saved us, not because of works done by us in righteousness, but according to his own mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewal of the Holy Spirit,⁶ whom he poured out on us

richly through Jesus Christ our Savior, ⁷ so that being justified by his grace we might become heirs according to the hope of eternal life. ⁸ The saying is trustworthy, and I want you to insist on these things, so that those who have believed in God may be careful to devote themselves to good works. These things are excellent and profitable for people” (Titus 3:1-8).

“Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice. Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus” (Philippians 4:4-7).

They all echo the idea articulated in the antiphon for the introit this week from Psalm 34:8, "Blessèd is the man who takes refuge in him!"

Mercy is one of the several themes for this week. We all need God's mercy but not all of us recognize this. When we neglect God's word and neglect to worship, we are saying in essence that we do not need God's mercy and grace.

When we willfully sin and slander God's name, we reject God's mercy and grace. When we ignore pleas for help and mercy, we disregard our own need for God's mercy and grace.

Then there are times when God allows us to experience some discomfort or suffering. He may do this so that we would recognize just how helpless we are. Then we lift up our eyes to the Lord our God and seek His mercy.

Lamentations 3:22-21 reminds us, "His mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning." Without God's mercy, no one would survive. Dangers and hardships abound. Adversaries and foes are around every corner. Sickness and disease are never far away. But God in His mercy protects us.

But we ought never to forget the greatest mercy of all. It was won for us on the cross. "He was pierced for our transgressions; He was crushed for our iniquities; upon Him was the chastisement that brought us peace, and with His wounds we are healed" (Isaiah 53:5).

Prayer: Almighty God, grant us a steadfast faith in Jesus Christ, a cheerful hope in Your mercy, and a sincere love for You and one another; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

These words from God to Ezekiel are sobering, “I send you to the people of Israel, to nations of rebels, who have rebelled against me. They and their fathers have transgressed against me to this very day.” The people of Israel are suffering in exile because of their rebellion. God had sent many prophets to bring warnings to them but they refused to listen. As a result, God’s patience was eventually exhausted and the people suffered the consequences.

In our celebration of God’s blessings upon our nation, we must never forget God’s displeasure with sin. We ought not to misinterpret God’s patience as an acceptance of evil. Now is the time to repent and return to the Lord your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love; and he relents over disaster (Joel 2:13).

Prayer: Look mercifully upon our nation, O Lord. We implore You, let not our sin destroy us, nor hopelessness overwhelm us, but let Your boundless mercy save us; through Jesus Christ, our Lord.. Amen.

2 Corinthians 12:1–10

¹I must go on boasting. Though there is nothing to be gained by it, I will go on to visions and revelations of the Lord. ²I know a man in Christ who fourteen years ago was caught up to the third heaven—whether in the body or out of the body I do not know, God knows. ³And I know that this man was caught up into paradise—whether in the body or out of the body I do not know, God knows— ⁴and he heard things that cannot be told, which man may not utter. ⁵On behalf of this man I will boast, but on my own behalf I will not boast, except of my weaknesses. ⁶Though if I should wish to boast, I would not be a fool, for I would be speaking the truth. But I refrain from it, so that no one may think more of me than he sees in me or hears from me. ⁷So to keep me from becoming conceited because of the surpassing greatness of the revelations, a thorn was given me in the flesh, a messenger of Satan to harass me, to keep me from becoming conceited. ⁸Three times I pleaded with the Lord

about this, that it should leave me. ⁹But he said to me, “My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.” Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me. ¹⁰For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities. For when I am weak, then I am strong.

This is one of the most powerful portions of Paul’s epistles. It is unfortunate that it is included in our readings when so many other things catch our attention.

Paul’s words are a mighty rebuke to those who claim that faith guarantees healing and that the lack of healing is a sign of weak faith. Often God allows illness and suffering to serve a larger purpose.

Paul, a man of extreme faith, recounts his encounter with God when he prayed for healing. God’s answer to his prayer was not miraculous healing but these words, “My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.”

Sometimes our difficulties in life serve a greater purpose. Paul includes these on the list: weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities. One day while reading this passage of scripture, I suddenly realized that the insults and hardships I was called upon to endure were opportunities to rely on God for His grace. We can join Paul in exclaiming, “When I am weak, then I am strong.” May our difficulties in life move us to cling to Jesus and His cross.

Prayer: O God, whose strength is made perfect in weakness, strengthen us by Your grace that we may endure hardships and insults of every kind. Grant us faith to trust that Your will for us is always best and that we may glorify Your holy name; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

⁷ So to keep me from becoming conceited because of the surpassing greatness of the revelations, a thorn was given me in the flesh, a messenger of Satan to harass me, to keep me from becoming conceited

Romans 12:3

³ For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think, but to think with sober judgment, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned.

These two passages go hand-in-glove. They are at odds with pop culture and pop psychology.

Many in our country believe that the greatest evil in the world is low self-esteem. To be sure, this is a danger. No one should believe that they are worthless and unworthy of love. God in Christ loves each one of us.

On the other hand, there is great danger in thinking too highly of one's self. Much evil in the world results from individuals placing their wants, needs, and goals over everyone else.

The corporate environment has long been characterized as a dog-eat-dog world. We witness this every day in politics. Twitter and Facebook are filled with extreme criticisms of those who don't live up to some unspoken standard of modern self-righteousness.

Conceit is particularly painful when it is found in the church. Pastors are often forced to endure countless meetings where people allow inflated egos to destroy God-pleasing plans. Lay people have to endure pastors who glory in lording it over those who sit in the pew.

These two passages of scripture offer a healthy antidote to such thinking. Paul is reflecting the teaching of Jesus:

⁴² And Jesus called them to him and said to them, "You know that those who are considered rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones exercise authority over them. ⁴³ But it shall not be so among you. But whoever would be great among you must be your servant, ⁴⁴ and whoever would be first among you must be slave of all. ⁴⁵ For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." (Mark 10:42-45).

We are thankful that Jesus humbled Himself to die on the cross for our sins. May we also learn such humility.

Prayer: O God, You resist the proud and give grace to the humble. Grant us true humility following the example of Jesus that we may never be conceited or prideful. Give us lowliness by Your grace; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

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
