



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Devotional Thoughts:

It is a rare treat to live in a time with righteous rulers. Our Old Testament lesson and Gospel lesson both speak of times when national leaders abandoned God and His standards. In the Old Testament lesson, God reveals to Amos His judgment upon Israel because of their wickedness. In the Gospel lesson, we learn of the offensive and corrupt actions of King Herod.

We know from history that this particular King Herod is Herod Antipas, the son of Herod the Great. Upon the death of Herod the Great, Caesar Augustus divided the Holy Land into three parts. Each of these parts was to be ruled by one of Herod's sons.

Matthew 2:22 reports this about Joseph's return with Mary and Jesus from Egypt, "But when he [Joseph] heard that Archelaus was reigning over Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there, and being warned in a dream he withdrew to the district of Galilee." Another son, Philip, ruled in the north and Herod Antipas ruled in Galilee and Perea. Archelaus was a poor ruler and was soon replaced in Judea by a Roman governor. The fifth Roman governor of Judea was Pontius Pilate. This is the political setting of today's account from Mark.

Jesus' reputation spread far and wide. His ministry and miracles were a topic of conversation in the royal household. Herod seems to have been curious about spiritual things but didn't allow religion to interfere with his personal pleasure. God's plan for a moral life was of little interest to him.

His half-brother, Philip, had married Herodias. The marriage didn't last. She soon left him for Herod. The King Herod of our story was already married. He divorced his wife and married Herodias.

John the Baptist found Herod's moral misconduct to be repulsive. He had a message for the ruler of Galilee and Perea, "It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife."

Herodias made no pretense of showing an interest in spiritual things. She was offended by his message and simply wanted John the Baptist dead.

We don't know what palace intrigue may have taken place. But eventually, Herod put John the Baptist into "protective custody." Josephus recounts that he was imprisoned in the fortress, Machaerus in present-day Jordan near the Dead Sea.

It seems that from time to time, Herod would summon John the Baptist and listen to his message. From what we know of John the Baptist, his messages must have included a strong emphasis on judgment, repentance, and the forgiveness of sins. It is hard to understand what was going on in Herod's mind as he heard John preach. Mark tells us that he was perplexed yet heard him gladly. What happened next reveals that John's preaching hadn't penetrated Herod's heart.

Herod held a massive party on what may have been his 50th birthday. Everyone who was anyone was there. I imagine that if the party was held today, reporters would be watching the red carpet and describing the guests' stunning attire.

This party was highlighted by a stage show. It included a dance by Herodias's daughter, Salome. Although the Bible doesn't report her name, we learn it from Josephus.

Salome's dance has been the subject of art throughout the ages. Recent broadcasts of the Oscars or Grammy award shows may provide a modern illustration for this first-century performance. Mark simply reports "she pleased Herod and his guests."

Herod enjoyed the dance. He also was delighted that his party guests were equally charmed. A suitably grand reward was in order. It must show his appreciation to her and impress the elite of the nation with his extravagance.

Without much reflection on his proposal, he made an ostentatious offer to Salome. "Ask me for whatever you wish, and I will give it to you." "Whatever you ask me, I will give you, up to half of my kingdom."

Pastoral wisdom passed down from generation to generation has often pointed to this passage with this warning. "Never promise or swear to things with an uncertain or unknown outcome." In essence, Herod had written a blank check that he would soon regret.

We don't know the age of Salome. We may assume that she was young, for she sought advice from her mother. In any case, she contemplated her request with more deliberation than Herod when he made the offer.

The complete hatred of Herodias for John the Baptist and her corrupt heart is indicated by her detestable suggestion. Salome was to request the head of John the Baptist—on a platter!

Upon hearing this, Mark reports that "the king was exceedingly sorry." The Greek word translated "exceedingly sorry" has the connotation of all-encompassing sorrow. In spite of this, Herod would proceed to fulfill this hideous request.

At this point, pastoral wisdom requires me to point out that oaths to do evil or sin must be broken. Saving face, sidestepping embarrassment, or avoiding public humiliation is never an excuse to sin. It is certainly never an excuse to commit murder and execute an innocent man. This applies to all whether they are high and mighty or lowly and weak.

And so the renowned and memorable ministry of John the Baptist comes to an end. My mother would often recount to me that many years ago Pastor David Wacker at Immanuel Lutheran Church in Bridgman, Michigan had so graphically described the beheading of John the Baptist from the pulpit that a gentleman sitting in front of him fainted. I will make no such attempt. John the Baptist's desire that "He must increase, but I must decrease" (John 3:30) was now fulfilled.

It would be easy to use today's lessons to point out God's judgment on corrupt and shameful activities displayed by celebrities or politicians. Not only do they often behave badly, they frequently flaunt and promote immoral and repulsive behavior. That is a legitimate ministry of the present day John the Baptists among us. But that would squander a real opportunity for self-reflection offered by this account.

There is a little bit of Herod and Herodias in all of us. None of us likes to hear God's word of judgment and condemnation because of our sin. It is fashionable today to declare one's self to be "spiritual but not religious." Often this is simply a coded way of saying, "I'm not going to allow God to influence my activities or moral decisions."

Like Herod, we are tempted to allow power, pleasure, or fame to influence our morality. We may like to dabble in spiritual matters but not want to go so far as to allow God's commandments to change our lifestyles.

Some may even sink to the depths of Herodias. We slide in that direction whenever we allow hate to guide our actions rather than love.

John the Baptist still has a message for each of us today. "Repent!" Mark reports that Jesus began His ministry with the very same message, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent and

believe in the gospel" (Mark 1:14). In our Gospel lesson last week, Jesus sent out the twelve, two by two. They went out and proclaimed that people should repent (Mark 6:12).

The message of repentance means that it is not too late to change. It is not too late to receive forgiveness and absolution for all of our wrongdoing.

John the Baptist sought to decrease so that Jesus would increase. In one way Jesus' increasing meant that He was raised on a cross. John the Baptist's death did not redeem anyone. But when the Lamb of God was sacrificed on the cross, He took away the sins of the world. Included in those sins was every moral failure and burden weighing down your soul.

In the Epistle lesson for this week, Paul proclaims what this means. Because of Jesus, God has blessed us with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places. He chose us in Him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and blameless before Him. By His glorious grace, He adopted us through Jesus Christ. In Jesus, we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of His grace, which he lavished upon us.

May we never trade this to follow in Herod's footsteps.

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice. Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:4-7).

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Enhancing Your Worship Meditating on God's Word and Works

Introduction

Most modern forms of mediation turn a person inward. Biblical meditation turns a person outward toward what God has said and done especially what He has said and done through Jesus for our salvation.

Each Sunday has its own special theme directing us to meditate on God's word and actions. This theme is found in the Propers of the Day (the parts of the service that change week to week). From Advent through the Easter season these themes focus our attention on the life of Jesus from His birth to His death and resurrection. There is always much more in the propers than can be covered in any Sunday service. God willing, I will use the propers for Sunday to provide you with a devotion each day to help you mediate on what God has done for you.

Students of Scripture have identified seven penitential psalms (6; 32; 38; 51; 102; 130). Psalm 143 is the last of them. David declares in Psalm 143:2 "Enter not into judgment with your servant, for no one living is righteous before you."

It is always an easy thing to call others to repentance. Social media appears to be filled with modern "John the Baptists" pointing out every deviation from progressive or conservative orthodoxy. It seems as though no one can ever be pure enough to meet the righteous demands of Twitter.

Now and again, one media outlet or another will uncover some socially heretical statement made in the past by prominent moral watchdogs. Then the words of David ought to echo in our ears, "No one living is righteous."

Before expressing the moral outrage of modern-day Pharisees, it would be wise for each of us to examine our own hearts in the light of Holy Scripture. St. Paul echoes King David's words in Romans 3:

"None is righteous, no, not one; no one understands; no one seeks for God.

All have turned aside; together they have become worthless; no one does good, not even one" (Romans 3:11-12).

Before we begin to call others to repentance, it is good to remember that "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). While looking for a speck in your neighbor's eye, make sure that you do not neglect the log in your own eye (Matthew 7:3). When you uncover the log in your eye, it is time to remember how Paul concludes his statement about sin: "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (Romans 3:23-24).

Bear in mind that each call for repentance is not a demand for a "pound of flesh." Rather it is a call to penitence and forgiveness in Christ.

May our own gracious acts of kindness and forgiveness to repentant sinners be a guide to those around us.

Throughout my life, people have been concerned with pollution. In the early part of the twentieth century, it was common for people to toss their trash out of the window as they drove through the countryside. Then Lady

Bird Johnson, the First Lady of the United States, started her antilittering campaign. It changed our habits. Some people consider it the most effective first-lady project ever.

On June 22, 1969, the Cuyahoga River in Cleveland, Ohio burst into flames. This produced countrywide concern for our rivers and environment which led to the Clean Water Act in 1972.

Acid rain, the diminishing of the ozone layer, smog, and air pollution led to a number of laws collectively referred to as the Clean Air Act. To bring all of this together, 50 years ago on December 2, 1970, President Nixon signed an executive order establishing the Environmental Protection Agency.

As a result, fewer and safer pesticides are used. The discharge of pollution into lakes and rivers is controlled. Cars meet emissions standards. More work needs to be done but our environment is now the cleanest it has been in my lifetime.

Christians should take a cue from society. We too should be concerned about pollution. We certainly are concerned about the pollution of our land, water, and air. But more than that, we should be concerned about the pollution entering our eyes and ears.

Psalm 85:8 declares, "Let me hear what God the LORD will speak." It seems that today every effort is being made to drown out the voice of God's word. Commentators, pundits, and politicians all scream into our ears. The entertainment industry is determined to fill our minds with the vulgar and profane. God's people must focus to filter out this secular pollution and listen to God and His holy word.

When we listen to God's word, what do we hear? Yes, this week we have heard a call to repentance. But that is only the beginning. Our psalm for this week assures us that God has an even better word for us. When we take time to listen to God's word, we learn that God "will speak peace to his people."

When God's salvation comes near to us in Christ, what is it like? The psalmist explains, "¹⁰Steadfast love and faithfulness meet; righteousness and peace kiss each other."

When we hear God's word of grace in Christ and take it to heart it is as if "¹¹Faithfulness springs up from the ground, and righteousness looks down from the sky." The spring and summer rains of God's word in our lives cause faithfulness to blossom and flourish. The warmth of God's love, mercy, and righteousness bathes us like the sun on a balmy day.

Let us block out the pollution that bombards our ears every day and "hear what God the LORD will speak."

Prayer: Almighty God, thank You for Your word of peace. Grant that we may faithfully hear You speak to us through Your holy word, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

⁷This is what [the Lord GOD] showed me: behold, the Lord was standing beside a wall built with a plumb line, with a plumb line in his hand. ⁸And the LORD said to me, "Amos, what do you see?" And I said, "A plumb line." Then the Lord said,

"Behold, I am setting a plumb line in the midst of my people Israel; I will never again pass by them;
⁹the high places of Isaac shall be made desolate, and the sanctuaries of Israel shall be laid waste, and I will rise against the house of Jeroboam with the sword."

¹⁰Then Amaziah the priest of Bethel sent to Jeroboam king of Israel, saying, "Amos has conspired against you in the midst of the house of Israel. The land is not able to bear all his words. ¹¹For thus Amos has said,

"Jeroboam shall die by the sword, and Israel must go into exile away from his land.""

¹²And Amaziah said to Amos, "O seer, go, flee away to the land of Judah, and eat bread there, and prophesy there, ¹³but never again prophesy at Bethel, for it is the king's sanctuary, and it is a temple of the kingdom."

¹⁴Then Amos answered and said to Amaziah, "I was no prophet, nor a prophet's son, but I was a herdsman and a dresser of sycamore figs. ¹⁵But the LORD took me from following the flock, and the LORD said to me, 'Go, prophesy to my people Israel.'

In the Upper Peninsula of Michigan near St. Ignace, there is a tourist attraction called "Mystery Spot." Some years ago, I visited there with my wife and daughters. We had a good time. As you go through the "Mystery Spot," your guide will explain:

In the early 1950's, 3 surveyors named Clarence, Fred and McCray came from California to explore the Upper Peninsula. They stumbled across an area of land where their surveying equipment didn't seem to work properly. For instance, no matter how many times they tried to level their tripod, through the use of a plum-bob or level, the plum-bob would always be drawn far to the east, even as the level was reading level. As they continued their research of this land, they noticed a constant feeling of being light-headed. Later, realizing their queasiness and problems with the surveying equipment only occurred in an area about 300 feet in diameter, they felt they had discovered a "Mystery Spot"! (http://mysteryspotstignace.com/about_us)

What follows is a series of optical illusions, carefully constructed to give you a sense that indeed, in this one spot, a plumb bob will not point straight down. Water appears to run uphill. Tall people appear to be short and short people appear to be tall.

God told Amos that He was setting a plumb line in the midst of his people. God's word is the straight-line necessary to measure all human activity.

Satin would like to deceive you into believing that in your mystery spot, God's word doesn't apply. Things are different. You are free to create your own reality. He wants you to believe that you are free to create your own morality.

When we depart the uprightness of God's holy word, eventually God's patience with us is exhausted and He will no longer be near to us with His blessings. Our lives become a desolate wasteland.

May we never live under the illusion that God's word does not apply to us. May we come to our senses and return to the Lord our God. He is merciful and gracious. Slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love.

Prayer: Look mercifully upon us, O Lord, that we would never depart from the uprightness of Your word. Grant that we would always experience Your gracious presence in our lives; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

Ephesians 1:3–14

³Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, ⁴even as he chose us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and blameless before him. In love ⁵he predestined us for adoption through Jesus Christ, according to the purpose of his will, ⁶to the praise of his glorious grace, with which he has blessed us in the Beloved. ⁷In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace, ⁸which he lavished upon us, in all wisdom and insight ⁹making known to us the mystery of his will, according to his purpose, which he set forth in Christ ¹⁰as a plan for the fullness of time, to unite all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth.

¹¹In him we have obtained an inheritance, having been predestined according to the purpose of him who works all things according to the counsel of his will, ¹²so that we who were the first to hope in Christ might be to the praise of his glory. ¹³In him you also, when you heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and believed in him, were sealed with the promised Holy Spirit, ¹⁴who is the guarantee of our inheritance until we acquire possession of it, to the praise of his glory.

Now through the end of August, our epistle lessons will come from Paul's letter to the Ephesians. This is one of my favorite books of the Bible. It is densely packed with rock-solid theology.

Right away, following his greeting, Paul dives into eternal election and predestination! I remember once when my daughter was in high school that she was confronted by "Bible-believing" evangelical Christians. They were astonished when she admitted that she believed in predestination!

But here it is, as big as day, in Ephesians 1:5 & 11! It is also found in Acts 4:28 and Romans 8:29 & 30. So it is surprising that this group of "Bible-believing" young people could not understand how it was possible to find a Christian who believed in predestination.

Of course, predestination is one of those sticky doctrines that cause Christians to disagree with each other. I recall a time when an elder in the church was telling me of an experience he had at Bible Study Fellowship. He detailed the intense discussion caused by this doctrine in his group during a recent meeting.

As he described the debate between the two sides, he concluded that he wasn't sure which one was correct. I had to chuckle inside. This elder in a Lutheran Church had articulated to me the Calvinist Reformed view versus the Arminian Reformed view of predestination. It never occurred to him (or his group) that there was a third view that is entirely consistent with Holy Scripture but admittedly not compatible with human reason.

This Lutheran view affirms Ephesians chapter 1 that God "chose us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and blameless before him. In love he predestined us for adoption through Jesus Christ, according to the purpose of his will, to the praise of his glorious grace, with which he has blessed us in the Beloved." So predestination is real!

However, Lutherans do not make the mental leap thinking that because we are predestined for adoption through Jesus Christ that some are not and therefore predestined to be lost. This would be contrary to Scripture. He wants none to be lost. The Bible says so in 2 Peter 3:9, "The Lord is not slow to fulfill his promise as some count slowness, but is patient toward you, not wishing that any should perish, but that all should reach repentance."

And so the Calvinists are partly right and the Arminians are partly right and they are both partly wrong in their doctrines of predestination. Lutherans are content to live in the tension between Ephesians 1 and 2 Peter 3.

So what does it mean for you? This doctrine of predestination articulated in Ephesians 1 is there for your comfort.

When I was young, I always knew that I believed but worried that someday I might fall away. When I learned in Ephesians that God has chosen me before the foundation of the world, it gave me great comfort. God has done everything necessary for my salvation and He will keep me in the faith until He calls me home. He will do this for you, too.

Jesus, our Good Shepherd, tells us this in John 10:27-29, "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never perish, and **no one will snatch them out of my hand**. My Father, who has given them to me, is greater than all, and **no one is able to snatch them out of the Father's hand**."

Ephesians 1:11-14

¹¹In him we have obtained an inheritance, having been predestined according to the purpose of him who works all things according to the counsel of his will, ¹²so that we who were the first to hope in Christ might be to the praise of his glory. ¹³In him you also, when you heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and believed in him, were sealed with the promised Holy Spirit, ¹⁴who is the guarantee of our inheritance until we acquire possession of it, to the praise of his glory.

There is so much in these few verses from Ephesians 1 that it's hard to know which treasure to explore next. Today, let's consider the word inheritance. Over and over again the Bible talks about our salvation as an inheritance.

Inheritance is a "grace" word. Inheritances are neither earned nor deserved. They are simply received.

Jesus earned our inheritance in heaven by His death on the cross. When He declared "It is finished," He made it clear that there is nothing we can contribute. He has done it all. And now, He gives this salvation to us freely as an inheritance.

If an inheritance is earned, it wouldn't be an inheritance. It would be a wage that we deserve. The only wage that we have earned and deserve is death. "The wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 6:23). Eternal life in Christ is an inheritance!

Prayer: Almighty and most merciful God and Father, we thank and praise You that You have made us members of Your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, and heirs of Your heavenly kingdom. We humbly implore You that You would keep us in the one true faith and move us to lead godly lives to the praise and honor of Your holy name and finally, with all Your saints, obtain our promised inheritance in heaven; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

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
