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Devotional thoughts:

“May you live in interesting times” is an expression that comes to us from Merrie Olde England, although some claim it to be an ancient Chinese curse. We certainly do live in interesting times. If you long for a more normal and calm life, you are not alone!

The pandemic was certainly interesting. Future generations will study it and our global response. Medical scientists occupied themselves with finding vaccines, treatments, and cures. Social scientists were interested in our reaction to the threat of illness and our willingness (or lack of willingness) to adapt to a “new normal.” Politicians were interested in using it to their advantage in the elections. Business leaders were interested in using it to turn a profit. People of goodwill were interested in caring for those who suffered through it all.

We live in a time of interesting national debate. How should we react to people with gender dysphoria? Should biological males be allowed to compete with biological females in athletic events? Does this harm women in their struggle for equality? Indeed these are interesting times.

Heat waves and hurricanes, tornadoes and droughts keep our weather interesting.

Our economy is interesting. Will the stock market go up? Will it go down? Will businesses survive or will they thrive? Will I have a job? Can I feed my family?

The people of Jesus’ day lived in interesting times. There was an oppressive government. The religious leaders were heartless. Healthcare was almost nonexistent. Slavery was an accepted part of society. Many people were poor. Hunger was always at the door.

As we consider our time or any period, it soon becomes apparent that every time has its own challenges. Every era is interesting in its own way. History is full of pandemics and plagues, wars and oppression, danger and hardship. Through all of this, we have a loving God who cares for us.

In the Gospel lesson for today, Jesus is heartsick. He has just learned that John the Baptist has been beheaded. He wants some time alone. Their lives had been entwined since before they were born. Both of their births were foretold by angels. Their mothers spent time together during their pregnancies. John had prepared the way for Jesus’ ministry. Now he was gone! Jesus needed some time alone. But this could not be.

As Jesus sails with His disciples to a desolate place, the desperate crowds see the boat and follow Him on foot from all of the towns. When He comes to shore, hoping for some quiet time, He is greeted by a great crowd of suffering people. What could He do? He had compassion on them! He healed their sick.

Jesus’ expedition had not been planned. He wanted to be alone and set off in the boat. The people following Him had not prepared for their travels. They simply watched and followed His boat from shore. Now they are in a desolate place, the day is over, and there is no food. Who will feed this massive crowd of five thousand men, besides women and children?

The disciples plan to send them away. Jesus plans to feed them.

I am reminded of the old folk song, “There is a hole in the bucket” and the question, “With what shall I fix it?” The disciples ask Jesus, “With what shall we feed them? We have only five loaves here and two fish.”

The disciples, like each of us, have short memories. They have forgotten about water changed to wine. They have forgotten about manna in the wilderness. They have forgotten about the great catch of fish breaking their nets.

Jesus, while experiencing grief, has compassion for the people. He never forgets us. He meets all of our needs. Jesus multiplies the loaves and fish to meet the needs of more than five thousand people until they were satisfied and there still was enough left over so that each disciple returned with a basketful!

In these interesting times, remember that we are not alone in a desolate place. Jesus is here with us as He has promised to be with us always (Matthew 28:20). He will never leave us or forsake us (Hebrews 13:5).

As much as food occupies our time, we have a greater need. Jesus scolded Satan with these words from Deuteronomy, “Man does not live by bread alone.” (Matthew 4:4).

We need the “Bread of Life,” Jesus himself. Our earthly life will end. No amount of food will prevent it. Jesus offers us life in paradise with Him forever. There, the Tree of Life grows and produces its fruit and its leaves for the healing of the nations (Revelation 22:2).

During interesting times and always, cast all your cares on Him for He cares for you (1 Peter 5:7).

“Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus” (Philippians 4:6-7).

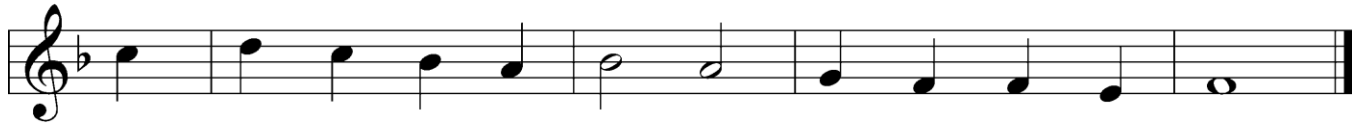

Introduction

Most modern forms of mediation turn a person inward. Biblical meditation turns a person outward toward what God has said and done especially what He has said and done through Jesus for our salvation.

Each Sunday has its own special theme directing us to meditate on God's word and actions. This theme is found in the Propers of the Day (the parts of the service that change week to week). From Advent through the Easter season these themes focus our attention on the life of Jesus from His birth to His death and resurrection. There is always much more in the propers than can be covered in any Sunday service. God willing, I will use the propers for Sunday to provide you with a devotion each day to help you meditate on what God has done for you.

The introit this week is again from Psalm 105. It points us to the Exodus, a time of desperation in the history of God's people. There is a Pharaoh who no longer remembers Joseph. The Children of Israel are enslaved by the Egyptians. There seems to be no hope. They cry out to God.

God sent them a deliverer. He sent them Moses. Still, as they fled Egypt, Pharaoh had a change of heart and came with His troops to recapture the Israelites.

But God intervened with a pillar of cloud by day and a pillar of fire by night. In the wilderness of Sinai, the people were hungry and thirsty. But God had not forgotten them. We are no different. We were born into slavery to sin. God sent us a deliverer in the person of His own Son. He provides for all our needs. Moses faced hardship to deliver his people. Jesus went to the cross to deliver us.

Today, Jesus, the Good Shepherd, is leading us through the wilderness and trials of life. We have no worries because He is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. When our journey is complete, we will enter the Promised Land of heaven and live with Him for all eternity.

Our souls also become hungry and thirsty. Our souls need spiritual nourishment and the water of life. The greatest wealth in the world could never buy this spiritual nourishment. No great deed could ever merit it. But God provides it to us, free of charge.

However, this does not mean there is no cost. It was purchased for us, not with silver or gold but with the precious blood of Christ (1 Peter 1:18-19).

We rejoice to come to God in Christ, our savior, and receive from Him all that our souls will ever need for time and eternity.

Prayer: O Lord God, thank You for the Bread and Water of life. Grant that we would always turn to Your holy word to learn of our Savior, Jesus and so nourish our souls. Amen.

Romans 9:1–5

¹I am speaking the truth in Christ—I am not lying; my conscience bears me witness in the Holy Spirit— ²that I have great sorrow and unceasing anguish in my heart. ³For I could wish that I myself were accursed and cut off from Christ for the sake of my brothers, my kinsmen according to the flesh. ⁴They are Israelites, and to them belong the adoption, the glory, the covenants, the giving of the law, the worship, and the promises. ⁵To them belong the patriarchs, and from their race, according to the flesh, is the Christ who is God over all, blessed forever. Amen.

You may have noticed that our epistle lessons have been a semi-continuous reading of the Book of Romans. Last week, we were in chapter 8. This week we begin chapter 9. For your personal devotions, you may want to read the entire Book of Romans.

The Apostle Paul was a passionate man. He was zealous for God and His truth. At first, this led him to persecute the followers of Jesus. However, Jesus had a different plan for him. On the road to Damascus, Paul (who as then named Saul) had a personal encounter with Jesus. Jesus asked him this question, “Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?” From that day forward, Paul turned his passion from persecuting Christians to telling everyone about salvation in Christ. He became the greatest missionary of all time.

However, he had one great disappointment. His kinsmen, the Jewish people, often rejected salvation through faith in Christ. This caused him great sorrow and anguish in his heart. He longed for them to share in the joy of salvation through faith and receive the gift of eternal life. If it were possible, he would even be willing to give up his own salvation so that they would believe.

Let us, with Paul, remember just how valuable our faith in Christ is and how wonderful is the gift of salvation and eternal life.

Prayer: O God, thank you for the gift of faith and eternal life. Grant us the same zeal and love for our neighbors as Paul expressed for his kinsmen; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name, Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven; give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For Thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever and ever. Amen.

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
