
# The Twelfth Sunday after Pentecost August 20, 2023



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# **Devotional thoughts:**

You may have noticed that most of our Gospel readings this year are from the Gospel According To Matthew. Today we have the opportunity to examine one of the more fascinating aspects of this Gospel. Let's see if you can discover it from the following portions of Matthew.

Matthew begins in the second chapter with the report of wise men coming from some faraway country in the east to worship the newborn King of the Jews. In Matthew 8, a Roman centurion comes to Jesus to request healing for his paralyzed servant. He tells Jesus, "I am unworthy to have you come under my roof, but only say

the word and my servant will be healed." When Jesus heard this, he marveled and said to those who followed him, "Truly, I tell you, with no one in Israel have I found such faith.

Later in chapter 8 Jesus travels to a gentile area on the other side of the Sea of Galilee and heals two men. In chapter 15 we find the Gospel lesson for today. On the way to His crucifixion, a man from Cyrene, a city in Libya on the northeast coast of Africa, carried Jesus' cross. And of course, Matthew's Gospel ends with these words of the Great Commission "make disciples of all nations."

Have you figured it out? Although it is the most Jewish of the four Gospels, Matthew repeatedly shows Jesus reaching out to the non-Jewish world. Jesus' work of salvation is for all. Jesus' message reaches out across all human boundaries with love and forgiveness!

Jesus was raised in Nazareth, a town in Galilee. He made Capernaum His home base for ministry on the northwest shore of the Sea of Galilee. He spent a large portion of his ministry in and around northern Israel but He did not confine Himself to this small area. He was constantly on the go. He traveled through Samaria and ministered to the people there. He traveled across the Jordan. He journeyed to Jerusalem and Judea. Today, we find Him leaving His home region and traveling to Tyre and Sidon, the two most important cities of Phoenicia, located in present-day, Lebanon.

In this land of Gentiles, a Canaanite woman came to Him with an urgent plea, "Have mercy on me, O Lord, Son of David; my daughter is severely oppressed by a demon." Her cry is one that you have echoed many times, Kyrie, Eleison. Lord, have mercy!

Her cry for mercy is not for herself. It is an intercessory prayer for her dear beloved daughter. As a parent or grandparent, you may totally understand her concern. She will go to any length to help her daughter.

At first, Jesus' response may seem callous and cruel when He does not answer her but this is a teaching moment for His disciples and for us. He knows that there is more to this woman than the disciples can see. She is a woman of great faith! Even His harsh response, "It is not right to take the children's bread and throw it to the dogs," will not put her off.

She responded with some of the most memorable words coming from someone other than Jesus, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table."

She is only begging for crumbs! Yet what wonderful crumbs these are when they come from The Master's table. There is miraculous healing in these crumbs! Her daughter is instantly healed!

There are many lessons to learn here. The disciples had witnessed Jesus heal many times. They know the power of God displayed in Jesus' miracles. What the disciples now need to see is Jesus' love and concern for everyone, even non-Jews! They also need to learn that Gentiles can and do have great faith!

What do we need to learn? Since most of us are Gentiles, we see Jesus' love and concern for us! We know that He hears our, Kyrie, Eleison. Lord, have mercy! We realize again that crumbs from The Master's table are sufficient for all of our needs. We understand that forgiveness, life, and salvation are for each one of us regardless of our ethnic background.

In this time of national strife, it is particularly important for us to learn that the Gospel has no boundaries. The Christian Church is not an exclusive club! It is home to all who share the faith of this anonymous Canaanite woman. Like Jesus, we have love and concern for all.

In our lesson today, we see Jesus leaving the comfort of His home territory and traveling to where people need Him. Let us also be so moved to bring compassion and care to those in need wherever they may be and whoever they are.

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:6-7).



# The Week of The Twelfth Sunday after Pentecost August 21 - 26, 2023

### Introduction

Most modern forms of mediation turn a person inward. Biblical meditation turns a person outward toward what God has said and done especially what He has said and done through Jesus for our salvation.

Each Sunday has its own special theme directing us to meditate on God's word and actions. This theme is found in the Propers of the Day (the parts of the service that change week to week). From Advent through the Easter season these themes focus our attention on the life of Jesus from His birth to His death and resurrection. There is always much more in the propers than can be covered in any Sunday service. God willing, I will use the propers for Sunday to provide you with a devotion each day to help you mediate on what God has done for you.

The introit distills the essence of Psalm 28 for us. In this Psalm, David pleads with God to hear his cry for mercy. He implores God to not be deaf to him.

We often find ourselves in David's shoes. It seems as though God is not listening. All of the somber news reports move us to prayer. Yet as we anxiously wait, it seems that political conflict gets worse and crime on our city streets won't go away.

You may have been in David's shoes while lying in a hospital bed or praying for a sick loved one. You may have been in David's shoes when you lost a job or experience some tragedy.

At the end of the Psalm, David exclaims, "Blessèd be the LORD! For he has heard the voice of my pleas for mercy."

David learned from experience what we all need to know. God answers all our prayers. He does it in His own way, in His own time, and for our blessing. In human terms, we think we have all the answers. And we demand that God answer in our way and in our time.

May God grant us His grace and Spirit to trust Him with all our needs. Since He did not spare His own Son, we know that He will give us everything to fulfill His ultimate will of bringing us to Himself for all eternity.

Let us pray. O Lord, hear my cry for mercy! Grant us patience to wait for your answers to our prayers through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, ever one God world without end.

Isaiah reports that foreigners will join themselves to the Lord. We are thankful that we are among the foreigners who have been welcomed into the Lord's family.

But as regards election, they are beloved for the sake of their forefathers. <sup>29</sup>For the gifts and the calling of God are irrevocable. <sup>30</sup>Just as you were at one time disobedient to God but now have received mercy because of their disobedience, <sup>31</sup>so they too have now been disobedient in order that by the mercy shown to you they also may now receive mercy. <sup>32</sup>For God has consigned all to disobedience, that he may have mercy on all.

The Apostle Paul has great concern for his fellow Israelites, descendants of Abraham. In welcoming Gentiles into the Church, God has not rejected the Jewish people.

While Paul is an apostle to the Gentiles, he knows that Jesus died for the salvation of the Jews as well. All of us have been disobedient and enemies of God at one time or another. That does not mean that God has rejected us.

Like the father of the prodigal son, God is waiting with open arms to welcome all who repent and believe whether they are Jew or Gentile, slave or free, male or female. May we join Paul in praying for all unbelievers, that they would come to faith and receive mercy from God our Father and the gift of eternal life.

Prayer: O God, thank You that You have made us all one in Christ. Grant us the desire and ability to continue to boldly share the message that "everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved" through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Praise God! We are never brokenhearted because God rejects us. Instead of rejecting us, He sent His Son to save us. He binds up our wounds and welcomes us into His family, here in time and there in eternity! Praise the Lord! Alleluia!
