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Devotional thoughts:

This year I am celebrating the 45th anniversary of my ordination. Valerie and I are attending my seminary reunion. Reaching these milestones in life causes me to reminisce about seminary life and my early days in the ministry. Doubtless, this is the reason that the following story came to my mind while I was contemplating the lessons for this week.

There has long been an ongoing debate about what should be taught at the seminary. Curriculums continually change. Yet, no matter what they teach, there is no way that they can fully prepare you for what comes next. I left the seminary as a theologian and Bible scholar. I learned how to be a pastor from Pastor Haake during my vicarage year. What I did not learn was how much controversy a pastor must face in the congregation and community where he will eventually serve. As the saying goes, "I could write a book."

In our little town of Ignace, Ontario there was a Lutheran Church, an Anglican Church, a Catholic Church, a Baptist Church, and a Pentecostal Church. The clergy of the town met together regularly and we were good friends. We certainly had our theological differences but one issue united us.

The youth hockey association (in their infinite wisdom and desire to save money) decided to hold hockey practice on Sunday morning! While many in our community saw no problem with this decision, the pastors and priests were (needless to say) quite dismayed. One pastor from our ministerial association, speaking for us all, wrote a letter to the editor of our small town newspaper expressing our concern.

I will never forget a response that was published a week later. In brief, the letter writer stated that if the pastors would make church and Sunday school more fun, we wouldn't have problems getting young people there on Sunday morning instead of attending hockey practice.

More troubling than that letter is the number of people who agree with that sentiment. For 45 years, people both inside and outside the church have expressed that opinion to me in one form or another. For the church to grow, they say, it must be fun, enjoyable, and entertaining. To be certain, there is nothing particularly godly about a boring church service. However, the opinion that Christianity must be fun does run contrary to what Jesus says in our Gospel lesson for today.

Do Christians attend church because there is nothing better to do on Sunday morning? Do we follow Jesus because Christianity will make our lives carefree? Is our faith in Jesus simply the pathway to earthly success?

These are all questions we must ask. Jesus says that before you follow Him, you should count the cost!

Following Jesus means bearing a cross. Following Jesus means nothing can be more important than Him. In fact, life itself comes in second.

Our old sinful flesh will still choose hockey practice over Sunday school. Our old sinful flesh stays in bed on Sunday morning. Our old sinful flesh loves pleasure and entertainment more than Jesus.

But Jesus loved us more than anything else. For our sake, He resisted Satan when tempted to turn stones into bread. For our sake, He prayed “not my will but Thine be done.” For our sake, He looked down from the cross and prayed, “Father forgive them.”

When we stumble and fall, He restores us to Himself. He loves us when we fail to love Him. He forgave Peter for denying Him three times. He called Saul on the road to Damascus.

Because of His great love for us, we declare, “Take my life and let it be Consecrated, Lord to Thee.” By the working of the Holy Spirit, we choose life over death. We fear, love, and trust in God above all things. We refuse to allow husband or wife, mother or father, son or daughter to stand between us and Jesus.

I don’t know what crosses you have been given to bear. I don’t know the difficulties you face because of your faith in Jesus. But I do know that He has said to you, “Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light” (Matthew 11:28-30).

“Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice. Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus” (Philippians 4:4-7).

Introduction

Jesus' cross is proof of His total commitment to us. Bearing our own personal crosses is evidence of our commitment to Him.

Some have suggested that the Christian cross does not consist of the everyday trials and tribulations of life. Rather they say that the Christian cross can only be identified as the unique persecutions and difficulties that we face because we are Christians. Early in my ministry, I subscribed to this definition. However, I think I was wrong.

I believe that the Christian cross is any trial, pain, or suffering that we undergo in life that we bear with faith and Christian virtue. There is no doubt that martyrs who were persecuted were bearing a cross but let me pose this scenario to you.

There are two individuals. One is a believer and the other is an unbeliever. They both endure an extended stay in the hospital undergoing treatment for cancer. The unbeliever is filled with anger, constantly being rude and insulting the medical staff while complaining about everything. The believer is kind and generous, always thankful for the people who are providing treatment while enduring the hardship graciously. I am convinced that the believer is bearing a cross in this situation. The believer is enduring suffering in a uniquely Christian way.

The circumstance I just described is not a hypothetical one but one I witnessed. I regularly visited a woman on the oncology floor at our local hospital. Her name was Irene. Like many cancer patients, she had a long and difficult treatment regimen. She spent many days in the hospital. Whenever I visited her, she had a positive attitude. One day as I was leaving her room, a nurse stopped me and said, "We are always so glad to have Irene here. She spreads happiness to the entire floor!" Irene's illness was not something thrust upon her because she was a Christian. But it was a cross that she bore with Christian faithfulness and virtue! May we all learn to bear our crosses from her.

As we are called to bear our individual cross, I recall the words of the Apostle Paul, "For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us" (Romans 8:18).

Later in the chapter, he writes these words of encouragement for every Christian who bears a cross:

"And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose" (Romans 8:28).

And

“What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things? Who shall bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is to condemn? Christ Jesus is the one who died—more than that, who was raised—who is at the right hand of God, who indeed is interceding for us. Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or danger, or sword? As it is written,

“For your sake we are being killed all the day long;
we are regarded as sheep to be slaughtered.”

No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord” (Romans 8:31-39).

Have you ever noticed that the Book of Psalms and Jesus' Sermon on the Mount begin in the same way with a description of the "Blessed"? Psalm 1 presents us with the distinction between the "blessed" and the "wicked." (Did you notice that the opposite of blessed in this psalm is not the unblessed but rather the wicked?).

Blessedness is rejecting wickedness and the way of sinfulness. Blessedness has nothing to do with scoffers!

Blessedness delights in God's holy word. The blessed spend their days and nights meditating on God's word! (This is why these daily excursions on the propers for the week are called "meditations." Christian meditation is not inward reflection and mindfulness. Christian meditation is focusing on the truth of God's word.)

When drought, trouble, and hardship come, the blessed flourish because of the nourishment provided by God's word. But the wicked dry up in the face of suffering and distress.

You and I are blessed because of Jesus. He came to purchase us from wickedness with His holy, precious blood and His innocent suffering and death. The wicked perish. The blessed receive eternal life!

Let us pray: O Lord, thank You for our blessings in Jesus. Preserve us from wickedness. Direct us by Your holy word that we would never stand in the way of sinners, nor sit in the seat of scoffers through the same Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

¹⁵“See, I have set before you today life and good, death and evil. ¹⁶If you obey the commandments of the LORD your God that I command you today, by loving the LORD your God, by walking in his ways, and by keeping his commandments and his statutes and his just decrees, then you shall live and multiply, and the LORD your God will bless you in the land that you are entering to take possession of it. ¹⁷But if your heart turns away, and you will not hear, but are drawn away to worship other gods and serve them, ¹⁸I declare to you today, that you shall surely perish. You shall not live long in the land that you are going over the Jordan to enter and possess. ¹⁹I call heaven and earth to witness against you today, that I have set before you life and death, blessing and curse. Therefore choose life, that you and your offspring may live, ²⁰loving the LORD your God, obeying his voice and holding fast to him, for he is your life and length of days, that you may dwell in the land that the LORD swore to your fathers, to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob, to give them.”

Moses had a rich and full life. At the time of his birth, he was condemned to death because he was a baby boy. Pharaoh had declared, “Every son that is born to the Hebrews you shall cast into the Nile, but you shall let every daughter live” (Exodus 1:22).

His mother loved him dearly and hid him for three months. When she couldn't hide him any longer, she placed him in the Lord's hands. She cast him into the Nile but in a little boat. His mother had lovingly made a basket of bulrushes to protect her dear son.

We don't know what she prayed. But God answered her heart's desire. Pharaoh's daughter found the helpless child floating in the river. God worked it out so that Moses' mother was able to nurse her son for Pharaoh's daughter. This was the first of many miracles in the life of Moses.

Moses grew up in the royal palace as the son of the princess. But he never forgot that he was born a Hebrew, one of God's people. One day, he protected a Hebrew slave who was being beaten by an Egyptian. When he was found out, he was forced to flee to the land of Midian because Pharaoh sought to kill him. This turned out to be a blessing because there he met God in the burning bush.

Everything up to this point in Moses' life was simply a prelude. His real work began when He led His people out of slavery in Egypt through the Red Sea into the wilderness. They were on their way to the Promised Land. But as things developed, God disciplined the Children of Israel with a 40-year journey through the wilderness. Moses was not allowed to enter the Promised Land and at the age of 120, he died.

In our Old Testament lesson, we hear Moses speaking to God's people at the end of his life. When it was all said and done, when he considered all that he had been through on their behalf, he was concerned about only one thing. He implored the people, "Therefore choose life, that you and your offspring may live, loving the LORD your God, obeying his voice and holding fast to him, for he is your life and length of days, that you may dwell in the land that the LORD swore to your fathers, to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob, to give them." Every aspect of his life had been dedicated toward this one ultimate purpose that his people would choose life!!!

What is important to you? Have you dedicated your life to anything? Some people are committed to their careers. Others are committed to social causes and community service. To be sure, these are noble causes. But they pale in comparison to the cause of Moses, Jesus, the Apostles, and prophets. They and all of God's servants share in the mission of bringing eternal life to people through faith in Jesus. John wrote, "These are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name" (John 20:31).

Someone in your life wanted you to believe in Jesus and share in eternal life. There is no greater cause than presenting the gift of forgiveness of sin, life, and salvation to people you know and love.

Let us pray: O Lord, thank You for the gift of eternal life. Grant us the privilege of bringing the salvation won by Jesus to the people around us. Amen.

Philemon 1–21

¹Paul, a prisoner for Christ Jesus, and Timothy our brother,

To Philemon our beloved fellow worker ²and Apphia our sister and Archippus our fellow soldier, and the church in your house:

³Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

⁴I thank my God always when I remember you in my prayers, ⁵because I hear of your love and of the faith that you have toward the Lord Jesus and all the saints, ⁶and I pray that the sharing of your faith may become effective for the full knowledge of every good thing that is in us for the sake of Christ. ⁷For I have derived much joy and comfort from your love, my brother, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you.

⁸Accordingly, though I am bold enough in Christ to command you to do what is required, ⁹yet for love's sake I prefer to appeal to you—I, Paul, an old man and now a prisoner also for Christ Jesus—¹⁰I appeal to you for my child, Onesimus, whose father I became in my imprisonment. ¹¹(Formerly he was useless to you, but now he is indeed useful to you and to me.) ¹²I am sending him back to you, sending my very heart. ¹³I would have been glad to keep him with me, in order that he might serve me on your behalf during my imprisonment for the gospel, ¹⁴but I preferred to do nothing without your consent in order that your goodness might not be by compulsion but of your own free will. ¹⁵For this perhaps is why he was parted from you for a while, that you might have him back forever, ¹⁶no longer as a slave but more than a slave, as a beloved brother—especially to me, but how much more to you, both in the flesh and in the Lord.

¹⁷So if you consider me your partner, receive him as you would receive me. ¹⁸If he has wronged you at all, or owes you anything, charge that to my account. ¹⁹I, Paul, write this with my own hand: I will repay it—to say nothing of your owing me even your own self. ²⁰Yes, brother, I want some benefit from you in the Lord. Refresh my heart in Christ.

²¹Confident of your obedience, I write to you, knowing that you will do even more than I say.

The Book of Philemon is only 21 verses long. It is a personal letter written by the Apostle Paul to a wealthy Christian man named Philemon on behalf of a slave named Onesimus.

I prefer to not become sidetracked in this meditation on slavery which is too important of a subject to avoid. *The Lutheran Study Bible* contains two excellent articles on slavery in the Bible and in the Roman world. They are found on pages 101 and 2095.

I enjoy reading Philemon and the other personal comments found in Paul's epistles. They help me remember that these were real people who lived in a real time and place. They struggled with the same issues that we face today in our interpersonal relationships.

Philemon was a dedicated and committed Christian. The local congregation met in his house. Paul was instrumental in bringing the Gospel to him. Through Paul's ministry, Philemon came to faith. Now in a parallel fashion, Philemon's slave, Onesimus, also came to faith through the work and ministry of the Apostle Paul.

It seems that Onesimus had been a trusted but unbelieving slave of Philemon. At some point, he ran away with some valuables from Philemon's household. Unspecified circumstances brought him to Paul and to faith in Jesus. The Book of Philemon is Paul's passionate letter of intercession on behalf of Onesimus.

Reading Philemon helps us understand how the early Christians viewed each other. Through faith in Jesus, Paul considered Philemon to be his partner and brother. Because Onesimus had now come to faith, Paul encouraged Philemon to think of Onesimus as his brother in the same way.

Christians still use this language of the family when speaking about each other. Yet, I wonder if we are always as serious about it as Paul was in New Testament times.

We have all become brothers and sisters in Christ. We have all been baptized into the family of God. As we interact with our fellow redeemed, let us use Philemon as a guide. May we truly treat one another as dear brothers and sisters in Christ caring for one another as we do for our own families.

Let us pray: O Lord, thank You for making us a part of Your family through Jesus' sacrifice on the cross. Grant that we would love one another as our brother, Jesus has loved us. Amen.

Luke 14:25–27

²⁵Now great crowds accompanied [Jesus], and he turned and said to them, ²⁶“If anyone comes to me and does not hate his own father and mother and wife and children and brothers and sisters, yes, and even his own life, he cannot be my disciple. ²⁷Whoever does not bear his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple.

The words of Jesus in our Gospel lesson are so startling that we may miss what prompted them. Great crowds were accompanying Jesus. We can assume that some in the crowd were sincere in their commitment to follow Jesus. It is likely that many were not. Mixed together were the faithful and the unfaithful, the authentic and fraudulent, the true and false disciples. Even among the twelve, there was one who would betray Him.

So it has always been. Sometimes people are motivated to participate in a local congregation simply for personal gain. They see the church as a gateway to social status, business connections, and the like.

Some years ago, a young immigrant woman attended my adult membership class. Week after week, we talked about salvation and other important spiritual topics. Through the Lutheran Heritage Foundation, I obtained a Bible in her language. When she read the Bible for the first time in her native tongue, she cried.

One day, she informed me that she would no longer be attending the class. I asked her why she had made that decision. She told me that her friend convinced her that a church from another denomination offered her more benefits than our congregation. I was saddened but I learned an important lesson. Some people follow Jesus not because He offers them forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation. No, they follow Jesus for “personal benefits.”

Jesus doesn’t want that kind of followers. They aren’t really His disciples. They will soon learn that following Jesus means giving up all personal benefits and even life itself. Following Jesus means bearing a cross. Loving Jesus means hating the world of sin and selfishness.

Our old sinful self loves the “personal benefits” that the devil and the world have to offer. But in the face of eternity, none of them mean anything. The Apostle Paul understood the relative value of earthly things. He wrote to the Philippians:

“But whatever gain I had, I counted as loss for the sake of Christ. Indeed, I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things and count them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God that depends on faith— that I may know him and the power of his resurrection, and may share his sufferings, becoming like him in his death, that by any means possible I may attain the resurrection from the dead.” (Philippians 3:7-11).

May we always share Paul’s attitude who said, “Far be it from me to boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ” (Galatians 6:14).

Let us pray: O Lord, thank You for the greatest benefit of all, salvation through faith in Jesus. Grant us the faith to take up our cross and follow Jesus. Give us the courage to leave behind the great crowds who only seek Jesus for worldly benefits through the same Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

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
