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Devotional thoughts:

I grew up in two small towns in Southwestern Michigan. For most of my young life, a major trip consisted of going “up north” to vacation country in Michigan. We lived less than 100 miles from Chicago but we seldom ventured into the city. I remember thinking that rich people traveled on airplanes and this would be something that I could read about or see on television but never experience.

When I was a senior in college, everything changed. I took a class called “Music and Art in Europe.” My very first airplane flight was across the Atlantic Ocean. During that flight, we encountered some turbulence as we flew near thunderstorms. I was able to curl up with a blanket and snooze through most of the trip. I simply believed that this was a normal flight and that a few bumps should be expected. You can imagine my surprise when I heard one of the flight attendants say, “This was the roughest flight I’ve ever experienced!”

In the following years, God has granted me the privilege of many more airplane flights. I even briefly piloted planes in the bush of Northwestern Ontario where navigation consisted of carefully recognizing the shapes of the lakes.

All these thoughts and many more rushed through my mind as I read the Gospel lesson for this week. I recalled all the places I’ve been and the things that I have experienced. But there is one place that I have never been—heaven. But I know someone who has been there. A careful reading of our lesson for this week helps us to learn details about heaven that we would not know otherwise until we get there.

Before we talk about heaven, let’s make a few observations about our reading. The story of the Rich Man and Lazarus is the third lesson about the dangers surrounding the misuse of money recorded in this section of Luke. The first one is the story of the Prodigal Son in Luke 15:11-32. It tells how a wayward youth squandered his inheritance. The second is the Gospel lesson from last week and the story of the Dishonest Manager in Luke

16:1-13 which ends “You cannot serve God and money.” Finally, following two brief paragraphs, Jesus told the story of the Rich Man who was blind to the needs of his neighbor, poor Lazarus, who lay at his very gate.

It is tempting to call this story a parable and it may be one. However, Luke doesn’t identify it expressly as a parable. (Note: The story of the Lost Sheep is identified as a parable but not the stories of the Prodigal Son or the Dishonest Manager.) If it is a parable, it is the only one in which Jesus used the personal name of one of the individuals.

Lazarus’ poverty was so great that he longed to eat the scraps that fell from the Rich Man’s table. He was so weak that he couldn’t even prevent the dogs from licking his sores.

In contrast, the Rich Man lived a luxurious lifestyle. Nothing was too good for him. His clothes were the best. His meals were feasts. The way he ignored Lazarus was proof that he loved neither God nor his neighbor. He only loved money. That is where his heart was. This is what he served. He was deaf to God’s word and he was blind to Lazarus’ misery.

But in the end, both Lazarus and the Rich Man died. The fate of the Rich Man proved the truth of Galatians 6:7(KJV), “Be not deceived; God is not mocked.” He learned the hard way “that the unrighteous will not inherit the kingdom of God.” (1 Corinthians 6:9).

This should serve as a dire warning to each of us. The love of wealth, the world, immorality, and such will lead to a terrible end. The devil, the world, and our old sinful self seek to deceive us into believing that there are no ill consequences to a selfish, ungodly lifestyle. Our pop culture praises the Rich Man’s self-indulgent choices. But the outcome of such choices is a disastrous eternity of anguish and torment.

The only antidote to such a tragedy is Jesus. He died on the cross to suffer the consequences that our sinfulness deserves. He came so that we will not suffer eternally but have eternal life in heaven. This is a life of joy, bliss, comfort, and peace. Faith in Jesus opens the kingdom of heaven to all believers. He died so that we may live.

As I mentioned at the beginning, the story of the Rich Man and Lazarus gives us important details about eternity. First, we learn that immediately at death, your soul (who you are) is separated from your body. The body decays but the soul lives on. For those who trust in Jesus for salvation, the soul is carried by the angels to “Abraham’s side” which is another name for heaven or paradise. However, for the wicked and unbelieving their destination is a place of anguish which we commonly call “hell.”

Second, we learn that individuals experience the joys of heaven or the suffering of hell right after death. Third, individuals can’t go back and forth between heaven and hell.

Jesus can speak confidently about these things because He came down from heaven. Before He was born of the Virgin Mary heaven was His home. He is able to teach about heaven with authority. I’ve never been to heaven but He has.

Now He is waiting for us in paradise with the Thief on the Cross and all the believers who have gone before. It is a place of inexpressible joy. Not only do we want to spend eternity there with Jesus, but we also want all of our loved ones to be there, too. We sincerely want them to avoid the anguish of hell.

God has given us the privilege of sharing His word of salvation with our family and friends. We know the way to heaven and He has called us to join in His Great Commission of making disciples of all nations.

Introduction

Most modern forms of mediation turn a person inward. Biblical meditation turns a person outward toward what God has said and done especially what He has said and done through Jesus for our salvation.

Each Sunday has its own special theme directing us to meditate on God's word and actions. This theme is found in the Propers of the Day (the parts of the service that change week to week). From Advent through the Easter season these themes focus our attention on the life of Jesus from His birth to His death and resurrection. There is always much more in the propers than can be covered in any Sunday service. God willing, I will use the propers for Sunday to provide you with a devotion each day to help you mediate on what God has done for you.

The portion of Psalm 119 that comprises our introit begins with verse 73, “Your hands have made and fashioned me; give me understanding that I may learn your commandments.” This verse is an interesting couplet. The psalmist recognized that God created him but beyond his functioning body, he needed one more essential component to make him complete. He needed to understand God’s commandments!

Our Gospel lesson is a warning against those who have contempt for God’s commandments. The psalmist does not want to be such a wicked individual. Rather he desires to learn and understand God’s commandments and delight in God’s law.

All who understand the full implication of God’s commandments also understand their sinfulness. They come to God with the words of the Prodigal Son, “Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son” (Luke 15:21). We all join the psalmist and the Prodigal Son and rely on God’s goodness, mercy, and grace. The psalmist placed his hope in God’s word and promises (Psalm 119:74, 76). He trusted God’s steadfast love to comfort him.

We, too, place our hope in God’s word and promises. We trust in God’s steadfast love. But we have the privilege of knowing what the psalmist could only imagine. God’s Old Testament promises are all fulfilled in Jesus. He is the one who brings us true comfort and hope.

Because of Jesus’ sacrifice on the cross, the words of the Prodigal Son’s father also apply to all who repent and have faith in Him. In Christ, God the Father looks at us and says, “This my son was dead, and is alive again; he was lost, and is found.” This is why we delight in God’s word!

Let us pray: O merciful Lord, thank You for Your righteous law. Give us a right understanding of Your commandments. Grant us the comfort that comes from the forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation won for us by our Lord and Savior Jesus. Amen.

The last five psalms are known as “Hallelujah Psalms.” In Hebrew, they all begin and end with “Hallelujah” (Praise the LORD!).

Psalm 146 is a lifelong commitment to praising God! The Lord is the only one who brings salvation. We deceive ourselves if we place our trust in powerful people such as princes or presidents. All of their plans come to an end as soon as they breathe their last breath!

Instead, trust in God who made heaven and earth. He never breaks His promises! Because He is almighty and faithful, He keeps them all!

God, in His act of salvation, brings justice to the oppressed, feeds the hungry, sets prisoners free, carries the burdens of those who are crushed, and upholds the widows and orphans. These were all done by Jesus during His earthly ministry to prove that He was the long-promised Messiah.

When John the Baptist sent messengers to Jesus to ask if He was the one or if they should expect another, Jesus said, “Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight and the lame walk, lepers are cleansed and the deaf hear, and the dead are raised up, and the poor have good news preached to them” (Matthew 11:4-5).

At the beginning of His ministry, Jesus went to the synagogue in Nazareth and read from the scroll of Isaiah these words:

“The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,
because he has anointed me
to proclaim good news to the poor.
He has sent me to proclaim liberty to the captives
and recovering of sight to the blind,
to set at liberty those who are oppressed,
to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor.”

And he rolled up the scroll and gave it back to the attendant and sat down. And the eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. And he began to say to them, “Today this Scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing” (Luke 4:18-21).

This is the very definition of what it would be like when the LORD reigns (Psalm 146:10). In Jesus, the Kingdom of God came into the world! Praise the LORD! Hallelujah!

You and I have experienced the blessings of salvation expressed in Psalm 146. With Simeon, our eyes have seen the LORD’s salvation that He has prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to His people Israel (Luke 2:30-32). Hallelujah! Praise the LORD!

Let us pray: O Lord, thank You for bringing us into Your Kingdom to receive the salvation that Jesus earned for us on the cross. Grant that we would always praise You and let our Hallelujahs sound forth in response to the undeserved love You have shown to us in Him. Amen.

Amos 6:1–7

I was excited to read the Old Testament lesson from Amos this week. I would be surprised if you could guess which verse produced my excitement. Give up? It was verse 4, especially these words, “Woe to those who lie on beds of ivory.” You still might not understand why these words would catch my attention. Let me explain.

A few weeks ago, I read an article that began with: “An extraordinary treasure was unearthed in Jerusalem: **ivory plaques** from the First Temple period, the first of their kind to be found in Jerusalem”¹ (emphasis mine). Another article opened with: “**For the first time, archaeologists have found evidence of a luxury item mentioned in the Bible:** tiny ivory panels that would have been embedded on wooden furniture of the high and mighty during the First Temple period in ancient Jerusalem, the Israel Antiquities Authority announced on Monday”² (emphasis mine). I found it quite astounding that the discovery of ivory plaques or panels would be written about just weeks before we read about them in our lessons.

Of course, it wasn’t that the ivory couches were sinful. Rather it was the attitude of those who occupied them. Amos wrote during a time when both the northern and southern kingdoms were experiencing political stability. This political stability brought prosperity. Prosperity blinded the wealthy and the powerful. They cared little for God and His people. They became idolaters. They were corrupt. They oppressed the poor. God would put an end to their revelry by sending them into exile.

History proves that God carried out His threat. The northern ten tribes were destroyed by the Assyrians. The southern kingdom of Judah was conquered by the Babylonians. Nevertheless, God was faithful to His promises. He preserved the remnant of His people who had not bowed their knees to idols.

As we contemplate the Rich Man and Lazarus this week, let us heed the warning given by Amos. It is very easy to be tempted by wealth and to let it rule our lives. Now is the time to pay attention to the words of Amos 5:6, "Seek the Lord and live!" Let us also take to heart Amos 5:14-15:

¹⁴ Seek good, and not evil,
that you may live;
and so the Lord, the God of hosts, will be with you,
as you have said.
¹⁵ Hate evil, and love good,
and establish justice in the gate;
it may be that the Lord, the God of hosts,
will be gracious to the remnant of Joseph.

It is not too late to return to the Lord. Jesus came into the world to save sinners!

Let us pray: O Lord, let us not be blinded by wealth. Make us aware of those who are in need. Move us to help them as we are able. Grant us true repentance and faith so that we will seek You and live through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

1 Timothy 3:1–13

¹The saying is trustworthy: If anyone aspires to the office of overseer, he desires a noble task. ²Therefore an overseer must be above reproach, the husband of one wife, sober-minded, self-controlled, respectable, hospitable, able to teach, ³not a drunkard, not violent but gentle, not quarrelsome, not a lover of money. ⁴He must manage his own household well, with all dignity keeping his children submissive, ⁵for if someone does not know how to manage his own household, how will he care for God's church? ⁶He must not be a recent convert, or he may become puffed up with conceit and fall into the condemnation of the devil. ⁷Moreover, he must be well thought of by outsiders, so that he may not fall into disgrace, into a snare of the devil.

⁸Deacons likewise must be dignified, not double-tongued, not addicted to much wine, not greedy for dishonest gain. ⁹They must hold the mystery of the faith with a clear conscience. ¹⁰And let them also be tested first; then let them serve as deacons if they prove themselves blameless. ¹¹Their wives likewise must be dignified, not slanderers, but sober-minded, faithful in all things. ¹²Let deacons each be the husband of one wife,

managing their children and their own households well. ¹³For those who serve well as deacons gain a good standing for themselves and also great confidence in the faith that is in Christ Jesus.

I could write pages on our Epistle lesson from First Timothy. It has been a touchstone for me for over 50 years.

The word “overseer” in verse 1 is not as clear a translation as one might hope. The other common translation for the Greek word “*episcopo*” is “bishop.” The Living Bible translates it as “pastor.” *The Concordia Self-Study Commentary* states, “The modern ‘pastor’ is closer to it than the sense that bishop has acquired in church language.”³

You may wish to read verses 1-7 again. It is clear from these verses that pastors must meet a higher standard than those who make up the rest of the congregation. As a corollary, pastors who violate those requirements are no longer qualified to serve in this noble task.

Likewise, there are special qualifications for deacons who assist pastors in leading congregations. (Note: In many Lutheran congregations in our country, deacons are equivalent to our elders.)

Some years ago, a gentleman who wielded an undue amount of influence in the congregation came to me and requested that I give my approval for him to serve as an elder. In good conscience (and in light of 1 Timothy 3), I couldn’t do that.

While I did not mention our meeting to anyone, word must have gotten around. At our next elders’ meeting, I was confronted with the statement that I didn’t have the authority to deny anyone their right to be an elder. To this, I responded, “No one has the right to be an elder.”

That turned out to be the end of the discussion. It must have been common knowledge that this individual could not meet the qualifications for a deacon listed by the Apostle Paul. While the subject never came up again, I wasn’t surprised when this “gentleman” worked tirelessly to oppose my ministry. This proved to me that indeed he hadn’t met the requirements of an elder.

There are at least two lessons to learn from that episode. First, God always grants us forgiveness in Jesus but sometimes the consequences of our sins cannot be undone. We must learn to guard ourselves against such damaging activities.

Second, sometimes serving in the “noble task” means making difficult decisions because they are right and then living with the outcome no matter how unfortunate it may be. God’s people have always understood that doing the right thing sometimes means bearing a cross.

God has placed each of us in a vocation. As His people, we seek to serve wherever He has placed us. May we support our pastors in their noble task. “You can be like faithful Aaron, Holding up the prophet’s hands” (Hark! The Voice of Jesus Crying, stanza 3).

Let us pray: O Lord, thank You for the gift of pastors and other leaders in the Church. Grant them the strength, courage, and wisdom to serve You and Your people with honesty and integrity so that Your Name would be praised and Your kingdom come through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

1 Timothy 6:6–19

⁶Now there is great gain in godliness with contentment, ⁷for we brought nothing into the world, and we cannot take anything out of the world. ⁸But if we have food and clothing, with these we will be content. ⁹But those who desire to be rich fall into temptation, into a snare, into many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. ¹⁰For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils. It is through this craving that some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs.

¹¹But as for you, O man of God, flee these things. Pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, steadfastness, gentleness. ¹²Fight the good fight of the faith. Take hold of the eternal life to which you were called and about which you made the good confession in the presence of many witnesses. ¹³I charge you in the presence of God, who gives life to all things, and of Christ Jesus, who in his testimony before Pontius Pilate made the good confession, ¹⁴to keep the commandment unstained and free from reproach until the appearing of our Lord Jesus Christ, ¹⁵which he will display at the proper time—he who is the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords, ¹⁶who alone has immortality, who dwells in unapproachable light, whom no one has ever seen or can see. To him be honor and eternal dominion. Amen.

¹⁷As for the rich in this present age, charge them not to be haughty, nor to set their hopes on the uncertainty of riches, but on God, who richly provides us with everything to enjoy. ¹⁸They are to do good, to be rich in good works, to be generous and ready to share, ¹⁹thus storing up treasure for themselves as a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of that which is truly life.

We have a bonus Epistle lesson this week. 1 Timothy 6:6-19 is appointed as an alternative to 1 Timothy 3:1–13. Part of the focus of this lesson is on the proper understanding of wealth. But more than that, it is a valuable text for understanding and living the Christian life.

It contains one of the most well-known passages in the Bible, “The love of money is a root of all kinds of evils.” The truth of these words is proven over and over again in each generation. Ours is no exception.

Unfortunately, these powerful words overshadow an equally important passage that begins the reading, “There is great gain in godliness with contentment.” Contentment with the good things God has given to us is a great blessing. I’m not sure that people are any happier today than they were in the difficult times our nation experienced in the past. Most of us would do well to remember that cell phones and high-definition televisions are not keys to happiness.

However, those two verses take a back seat to what the Apostle Paul tells Timothy next, “Fight the good fight of the faith. Take hold of the eternal life to which you were called and about which you made the good confession in the presence of many witnesses.”

We must never let the cares and concerns of this world distract us from the importance of eternal life. Sometimes the struggle can seem like a fight, the good fight of faith. Thankfully, we do not do battle alone. God has provided us with all the necessary resources for the fight. Paul speaks of them in Ephesians 6:10-18:

¹⁰ Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his might. ¹¹ Put on the whole armor of God, that you may be able to stand against the schemes of the devil. ¹² For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers over this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places. ¹³ Therefore take up the whole armor of God, that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand firm. ¹⁴ Stand therefore, having fastened on the belt of truth, and having put on the breastplate of righteousness, ¹⁵ and, as shoes for your feet, having put on the readiness given by the gospel of peace. ¹⁶ In all circumstances take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming darts of the evil one; ¹⁷ and take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God, ¹⁸ praying at all times in the Spirit, with all prayer and supplication. To that end, keep alert with all perseverance, making supplication for all the saints,

Let us never lose sight of the fact that victory over sin, death, and the devil has already been won for us by Jesus on the cross. He grants us forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation which we receive by faith. May we ever stand firm in our faith in Jesus by the power of the Holy Spirit.
