Ruth 1:1–19a

¹In the days when the judges ruled there was a famine in the land, and a man of Bethlehem in Judah went to sojourn in the country of Moab, he and his wife and his two sons. ²The name of the man was Elimelech and the name of his wife Naomi, and the names of his two sons were Mahlon and Chilion. They were Ephrathites from Bethlehem in Judah. They went into the country of Moab and remained there. ³But Elimelech, the husband of Naomi, died, and she was left with her two sons. ⁴These took Moabite wives; the name of the one was Orpah and the name of the other Ruth. And Orpah kissed her mother-in-law, but Ruth clung to her.

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Devotional thoughts:

We always had at least one cat when I was growing up. Our children had cats in our home until allergies flared up. I like watching funny cat videos online. But there are still things that I don't know about cats.

I've always been puzzled by cats being stuck in trees. I've never witnessed it myself but many plots in film or on TV feature a cat stuck in a tree.

Cats are such good climbers. They seem to be able to go everywhere. They appear to be fearless. So I wondered, "Can cats really get stuck in trees, or is this just a myth?" What do you think?

I was pretty sure that it was a myth and that firefighters rescuing cats from trees was just a plot device for scriptwriters. But not being confident, I thought that I better do some research. To my surprise, I discovered that, yes, cats can get stuck in trees.

Cats have claws that are shaped like sharp hooks. They can easily climb up but down is a different story. If a cat is not too high, it can jump down. But they can go so high that they are afraid to jump. They may stay up in a tree for days. The only safe way for them to come down is backward but many cats are unwilling to do that. Experts suggest that if a cat does not come down from a tree after twenty-four hours, a rescue attempt should be made.

Have you ever been in a situation where you needed to be rescued? Cats in a tree came to my mind because when I was very young, I once got stuck in a tree. Somehow, I climbed a tree across the driveway from our backdoor. I had a wonderful view of the top of our house. But I soon discovered that I was stuck.

That was the first time it ever occurred to me that I could get myself into real danger. I was helpless. I couldn't come down.

In full panic mode, I yelled for help. I don't know what my mother thought when she heard me through the kitchen window. She quickly came out the back door wearing her apron. When she saw my predicament, she calmly brought a green step ladder to the tree. With her help, my feet were soon securely planted on terra firma.

The ten lepers in our Gospel lesson are in a helpless situation through no fault of their own. They cannot help themselves and there is no one who can help. They have banded together to provide comfort to one another in their misery.

Then one day, the most amazing thing happened. The only one who could help them came to their village. Because of their leprosy, by law, they were not allowed to approach Jesus. They could only stand at a distance. The Greek says they "stood far off." Their only hope was to catch Jesus' attention.

The Bible says that they "lifted up their voices." I wonder what it sounded like. I imagine that they shouted at the top of their lungs!

My brother-in-law and I once capsized our fishing boat in the frigid fall waters of a remote lake in Northwestern Ontario. A long way off, there was another boat. I didn't think that we could ever catch their attention until my brother-in-law let out the loudest yell for help known to man. (I may have yelled louder from the tree when I was a little boy). Soon these fishermen rescued us.

I'm guessing that there was real urgency in the voices of the lepers as they yelled, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us." They would not let Jesus pass by without noticing them. He was their only hope.

In response, in my mind, I can hear Jesus calmly say, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." The Old Testament assigned priests the responsibility to verify healing (Leviticus 14). Jesus is the one who can and does heal.

However, they weren't healed right away. It wasn't until they started on their way that they were cleansed. They started out on their expedition to the priests in faith!

All ten were healed! Only one returned to give thanks and he was a Samaritan. He did this with a loud voice! We get our word "megaphone" from the Greek words for loud voice. There was no holding him back in his cry for mercy and there would be no holding him back in his cry of thanksgiving and praise.

In the end, Jesus told him, "Rise and go your way; your faith has made you well." Literally, the Greek says, "Your faith has saved you." The connections between faith and salvation, God's mercy and our thanks and praise, are demonstrated by this account of Jesus healing the ten lepers.

I have never met an individual with leprosy. However, I have heard people cry out, "Lord, have mercy on us." To be honest, most of the time we mumble or softly speak these words.

Our disease is much worse than leprosy. It is not a disease of the skin but a disease of the soul. We need more than physical healing. We need spiritual healing. There is no one who can cleanse us from our sins except for Jesus.

If we were to recognize the seriousness of our predicament of sin, we would raise our voices. We would cry out like a little boy stuck in a tree. Our voices would be filled with urgency.

In Christ, God hears our plea for mercy. His mercy endures forever!

Because Jesus died on the cross for our sins, He says to us “Your faith has saved you.” Your sins have been forgiven. Eternal life is yours!

I was grateful that my mother rescued me from the tree. We were extremely appreciative that we were rescued from potential hypothermia in Northwestern Ontario. I am thankful that Jesus died on the cross to open the kingdom of heaven. If the leper returned praising God with a loud voice and giving thanks to Jesus, can I do anything less for the salvation that He has won for me?

Praise to the Lord, the Almighty, the King of creation!
O my soul, praise Him, for He is your health and salvation!

“Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice. Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus” (Philippians 4:4-7).

God’s richest blessings to you in Christ.

Introduction

This is another week where the abbreviation of the psalm found in our introit simply whets my appetite for the entire psalm. There are so many gems in Psalm 34 that I am moved to share it with you here.

Psalm 34

- ¹ I will bless the Lord at all times;
his praise shall continually be in my mouth.
- ² My soul makes its boast in the Lord;
let the humble hear and be glad.
- ³ Oh, magnify the Lord with me,
and let us exalt his name together!
- ⁴ I sought the Lord, and he answered me

and their faces shall never be ashamed.
- ⁶ This poor man cried, and the Lord heard him
and saved him out of all his troubles.

Why praise the Lord at all times? We do this because He is good to us at all times. At all times, He cares for us. At all times, He loves and forgives us. There never is a time when He forgets us.

He always hears our prayers. He never neglects to answer and deliver us from evil. He sends His angels to watch over us and protect us.

The only ones who doubt the Lord's goodness are those who haven't tasted for themselves the benefits of faith. Those who trust in their own wisdom and might are like hungry young lions who cannot feed themselves. But those who seek the Lord lack no good thing.

The truth of God's goodness is something so important that we must share it with our children. Our strong desire is for them to lead godly lives of faith and obedience.

God is deaf to the disobedient and unfaithful but He always listens to our cries for mercy. The Lord is near to the brokenhearted and saves the crushed in spirit. The Lord redeems the life of his servants. None of those who take refuge in him will be condemned.

I hope that you will meditate on Psalm 34 throughout the week.

A few years ago, God granted to me the privilege of entering retirement after more than 40 years of active, ordained ministry in the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod. For more than 32 years, I served a congregation with about 1100 members. I could fill a book and bore a crowd with everything I learned about God and His people through the years.

One thing that came to mind as I read the collect was something that I hadn't considered when I entered the ministry. I did expect that only about 40-50% of the congregation would be in church on any given Sunday. I understood that some people had pressing issues that kept them away. Some would be sick or out of town. Others just chose not to be "every Sunday" attenders.

What I hadn't anticipated was that almost every one of our members would contact me when they had serious troubles. I was always glad to bring help or comfort in any way that I could. I eventually realized that each year I encountered the equivalent of 1000 years of serious troubles through my relationships with the members of God's flock entrusted to me.

God's people are not immune to troubles. In fact, sometimes following Jesus means bearing a cross. No one craves troubles but often God uses troubles to bring us blessings.

First, troubles cause us to cry to God for mercy. One way that He answers that cry is to send pastors to you to bring His message of comfort and grace. Sometimes they can bring the resources and generosity of the other members of the body of Christ.

Second, troubles move us to give thanks to God for His compassion.

Let us pray: Almighty God, You show mercy to Your people in all their troubles. Grant us always to recognize Your goodness, give thanks for Your compassion, and praise Your holy name; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Psalm 111 constitutes the exclamation of a faithful believer to God. We are the only ones who can truly give thanks to God with our whole hearts. Verse one concludes with the statement that we do this in the congregation!

How many of you are also proud of your parents and their accomplishments. My father was known as one of the best of his craft. My mother humbly spoke of her high school education but she was as widely read as any college graduate that I know. I beam with pride when I speak about my grandchildren! They are amazingly gifted.

If I can't keep quiet about my parents, children, and grandchildren, can I be any less vocal about my heavenly Father? Contemporary society demands that we are to be quiet about our religion. The Bible knows nothing of this. Faithful people have always shouted their praise to God in public.

We praise God for every blessing. We praise Him for food and drink, house and home, family and children and everything He gives to us out of His bountiful goodness and mercy.

But the highest reason to boldly praise God is for the redemption that He has granted to us in Jesus Christ our Lord (verse 9). Those who do not recognize this are the greatest fools of all.

The world doesn't like our boasting. To them, this seems like foolishness. But true wisdom comes from fearing, loving, and trusting God above all things!

We cannot help but boast in the Lord for all that He has done for us in Jesus Christ. If we are tempted to give credit to someone or something else for our salvation, we are greatly deceived.

Let us pray: O Lord, thank You for blessing each one of us in so many wonderful ways. Grant us the wisdom to publicly sing your praise through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

name of his wife Naomi, and the names of his two sons were Mahlon and Chilion. They were Ephrathites from Bethlehem in Judah. I like to listen to the Bible being read. There are several ways to do this. One that is easy to use is a website called <https://www.biblegateway.com/> There are multiple Bibles available for you to read in many different languages. Some of the Bibles give you the option to listen to them being read out loud by a narrator. I prefer to listen to the ESV but I will sometimes listen to the KJV.

One of my favorite Old Testament books to hear read is Ruth. It is such a compelling story that I enjoy listening to it over and over again.

Ruth and her mother-in-law, Naomi, experience incredible tragedies and heartbreak resulting from the death of their husbands. Naomi also was required to cope with the untimely deaths of both of her sons. Through all this, Ruth and Naomi developed a powerful bond of love and friendship. If this is all there was to the story of Ruth and Naomi, it would be enough. But there was so much more.

Ruth not only wholeheartedly committed herself to Naomi, but she also fully and completely pledged herself to Naomi's people and Naomi's God!

The Bible does not report what led Ruth to make such a vow. It is easy to conclude that Naomi must have been a powerful witness of faith to Ruth for her to make such a promise.

The Book of Ruth is not only the account of Ruth's faithfulness to her promise. It is also a report of God's faithfulness to Ruth through Boaz.

An important aspect of the story of Ruth is the truth that God accomplishes His purpose through people. Ruth and Boaz became David's great-grandparents. Therefore, they were also ancestors of Jesus!

They could not have known how God would use them to bless the world. When we are faithful to God, who knows how God will use us to accomplish His purpose.

Let us pray: O Lord, thank You for the faithfulness of Ruth and Naomi. Grant us also the wisdom and ability to remain faithful to You. Use us to accomplish Your purposes in the Church and in the world through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

In the 1960s, there was a well-known pain reliever commercial that featured the often-quoted phrase, “Mother, please, I’d rather do it myself.” In this commercial, a woman is tending to her cooking when her mother asks, “Do you think it needs a little salt?” At this suggestion, the first woman angrily explodes saying, “Mother, please, I’d rather do it myself.” The announcer then explains that she has lost control because of a headache. A few minutes after taking the pain reliever, she brings a hot cup of tea or coffee to her mother. They both smile and all is well!

If only problems in life could be resolved so easily! This commercial is remembered by many today because it’s so comical. Almost everyone from my generation instantly recognizes the phrase, “Mother, please, I’d rather do it myself.” Over the years, I have jokingly used it in a number of situations.

However, the Apostle Paul wrote to Timothy when the time for joviality was long past. Paul’s ministry would soon end. There is no humor in that realization. He understood that Timothy’s time for work would also come to an end. Neither, he nor Timothy could afford to say, “I’d rather do it myself.” So Paul directed Timothy to entrust the message of salvation through trusting Jesus to faithful men who would be able to teach others also.

Jesus found and trained the Twelve Apostles. They, in turn, trained the next generation and so on until our very day.

The work to be done is great. Even with the power of social media and the internet, no one can do it all by themselves. We need to pass the work on and engage the creativity and resourcefulness of others to proclaim the Gospel.

But there is one ingredient that must we must never neglect. These men must be faithful!

The Church needs trustworthy and faithful pastors who will preach and teach the whole counsel of God. They not only must be willing to step up to the task with energy and enthusiasm but they must also truthfully teach the undiluted word of God. The Church never benefits from false and misleading preaching.

Let us pray: O Lord, thank You for the gift of pastors and other leaders in the Church. Continue to raise up generation after generation of faithful church workers to proclaim Gospel of salvation through faith in Christ. Let each one of us take up that task, as we are able, and then, when it is time, hand it on to those who follow after us in this sacred task. Amen.

Almost every parent with more than one child has heard this exclamation, “He hit me first!” Unfortunately, children are not the only members of society who believe that every evil can be justified when it is done in retaliation. For many, this is the definition of fairness.

In our modern society, there are those who believe that present-day unfairness is justified because of past inequity. Fortunately for us, God is not like that.

2 Timothy 2:13 tells us, “If we are faithless, he remains faithful.” This sounds totally strange to human ears. In our way of thinking, if we break our promises then God would be perfectly justified in breaking His promises.

But God never breaks His promises. This is the essence of who He is. If He broke His promises, He would be denying Himself. He would never do that.

God’s promises are totally trustworthy. We are not always faithful. We are not always trustworthy but God is always dependable. We would be in a terrible mess if God went back on His promises to us.

“This is a faithful saying, and worthy of all acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners; of whom I am chief” (1 Timothy 1:15). You never need to doubt the promise of salvation given to you through faith in Jesus. He is always there for you to welcome you home!

Let us pray: O Lord, thank You for Your faithful promise of salvation. Keep us in the one, true, faith. If we should stumble or fall, restore us to faith in Jesus. Amen.
