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Devotional thoughts:

I'm guessing that you've never heard of Oliver Harms, to be more specific Oliver Raymond Harms. He served as the seventh president of the Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod (LCMS) from 1962 to 1969. It seems curious even to me that I remember him.

I was baptized at Trinity Lutheran Church in St. Joseph, attended there, and went to Sunday school there. Next, we joined Trinity Lutheran Church in Sawyer and I attended Trinity Lutheran School there. In my young mind, the only acceptable churches were named Trinity Lutheran! This all changed in 1962 or '63.

For several weeks in school, we learned to sing “All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name” in parts. As I recall, I had never been taught harmony before. I soon learned that this was all in preparation for singing in a mass children's choir at the Reformation Rally being held in the gymnasium at Lakeshore High School in Stevensville.

The day of the Reformation Rally came. When we walked into the gymnasium, I was startled. The entire venue was filled to capacity. Not only were the bleachers full, but chairs also occupied the entire floor area.

We were taken to our places in the mass children's choir. I saw that there also was also a mass choir of adults. This was going to be one spectacular worship service.

The guest speaker was Rev. Oliver Harms, president of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod. On that day, I learned that there was more to the Lutheran Church than the two congregations named Trinity.

Six years ago, I had the privilege of attending a Reformation Rally at the Breslin Center at Michigan State University in East Lansing, Michigan. This was a spectacular event honoring the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. Thousands of people filled this huge arena. There were mass choirs and bands. It was an event that many years from now will still be remembered by the children in the choir! Still, I am not sure that it will be more memorable to them than the Reformation Rally at Lakeshore High School was for me.

Why is the Reformation worth remembering on such a grand scale? The secular world sees the Reformation as the beginning of the separation of church and state. They applaud the emphasis on an individual standing up against authority. They miss the point.

The Reformation is worth celebrating because in it Martin Luther was used by God to restore the truth of God's word and His plan of salvation to the Church. Prior to the Reformation, the Gospel of forgiveness given freely for Christ's sake had been lost. This burdened countless souls who trembled in fear as they faced eternity. Martin Luther felt this burden intensely. The more he tried to be perfect, the more he recognized his imperfections. He wondered, “How could a holy God accept a sinner like me?” How could he ever obtain the righteousness demanded by God? He wrote, “I, blameless monk that I was, felt that before God I was a sinner

with an extremely troubled conscience. I couldn't be sure that God was appeased by my satisfaction. I did not love, no, rather I hated the righteous God who punishes sinners."

Martin Luther found the solution to his dilemma in the Bible. As he meditated on Romans chapter one particularly verse 17, "The righteous shall live by faith," he was led to the rediscovery of the Gospel. He wrote, "I began to understand that this verse means that the righteousness of God is revealed through the Gospel, but it is a passive righteousness, i.e. that by which the merciful God justifies us by faith, as it is written: "The righteous person lives by faith." All at once, I felt that I had been born again and entered into paradise itself through open gates. Immediately I saw the whole of Scripture in a different light. I ran through the Scriptures from memory and found that other terms had analogous meanings, e.g., the work of God, that is, what God works in us; the power of God, by which he makes us powerful; the wisdom of God, by which he makes us wise; the strength of God, the salvation of God, the glory of God."

While we mark the Reformation from the date of Luther posting the 95 Theses on the church door in Wittenberg on October 31, 1517, it is this rediscovery of the Gospel that gave the Reformation its power and lasting impact. This is the truth of God's word that set him free. This is the truth of God's word that makes us free indeed! With Luther and the rest of mankind, we were slaves to sin, but God's own Son has set us free from sin, death, and the devil. There is no greater truth to celebrate.

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:6-7).

Introduction

The lessons and propers for this week are all chosen because of their long-standing association with Martin Luther and the Reformation. Psalm 119:46, "I will speak of your testimonies before kings" that begins and ends the introit has long been thought to aptly describe Martin Luther as he stood before the emperor at the Diet (congress) of Worms in 1521. It also describes the presentation of the Augsburg Confession in 1530 when Christian Beyer stood before the same emperor and read our Lutheran statement of faith.

Have you ever experienced stage fright? Many of us have. Yet this stage fright is nothing compared to the danger faced by Luther and the Lutheran confessors. They stood there in peril for their lives. Following the Diet of Worms, Luther was declared an outlaw. Anyone who would shelter or help him would also be considered outlaws. So why did Luther make the bold statement, "Here I stand"? He knew that his salvation depended on Christ alone and no threat from church or state could ever cause him to give up his faith.

He concluded his remarks at Worms with these words: "Unless I am convinced by the testimony of the Scriptures or by clear reason (for I do not trust either in the pope or in councils alone, since it is well known that they have often erred and contradicted themselves), I am bound by the Scriptures I have quoted and my conscience is captive to the Word of God. I cannot and will not recant anything, since it is neither safe nor right to go against conscience. Here I stand, I can do no other. May God help me. Amen."

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Christmas and Thanksgiving are the only non-Sunday movable holidays that we have the privilege of celebrating on the day. Other than those two, people in our culture do not attend worship services on the actual date of holidays. This is why Reformation Day is usually observed on the last Sunday of October and All Saints' Day is usually observed on the first Sunday of November, although in fact, they fall on October 31 and November 1.

This is not necessarily a bad thing. This year it gives us an entire week to celebrate the Reformation.

I suspect the average "Lutheran on the street" knows that the Reformation involves Martin Luther nailing 95 Theses on the church door in Wittenberg and that we sing "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God."

If in singing "A Mighty Fortress," we were to pay attention to the words, we would learn important truths of the Reformation.

A mighty fortress is our God,
 A trusty shield and weapon;
 He helps us free from ev'ry need
 That hath us now o'ertaken.
 The old evil foe
 Now means deadly woe;
 Deep guile and great might
 Are his dread arms in fight;
 On earth is not his equal.

God cares for us in every need. We have many of them. Without God on our side, the devil, the old evil foe, could never be defeated. He is too clever and powerful for us. Nothing on earth is a match for him.

With might of ours can naught be done,
 Soon were our loss effected;
But for us fights the valiant One,
 Whom God Himself elected.
Ask ye, Who is this?
Jesus Christ it is,
 Of Sabaoth Lord,
 And there's none other God;
He holds the field forever.

When we try to stand alone against the devil, we will surely fall in battle. The situation is hopeless. But all is not lost. The valiant One fights for us! If you don't know who this is, let me tell you. It is Jesus Christ. He is the Lord of the armies of heaven (Sabaoth). In fact, He is God! In the field of battle against the devil, He will always prevail.

Though devils all the world should fill,
 All eager to devour us,
We tremble not, we fear no ill;
 They shall not overpow'r us.
This world's prince may still
Scowl fierce as he will,
 He can harm us none.
 He's judged; the deed is done;
One little word can fell him.

Indeed, it feels like the whole world is against us. Evil is ready to swallow us, but we have no fear. Yes, the devil may prowl around like a roaring lion, scowling at us with a most miserable face. But he's a caged beast. There is no way he can hurt us. The cross and resurrection put an end to him. One word causes his defeat. [Which is that word? Some say that it is "Jesus" which is certainly a good answer. Others believe it to be a word from the cross, "It is finished" which in Greek is a single word. Whenever the devil speaks in your ear to convince you that you are not worthy of heaven and that you need to do more to earn your salvation, simply respond with Jesus' words, "It is finished!"]

The Word they still shall let remain
 Nor any thanks have for it;
He's by our side upon the plain
 With His good gifts and Spirit.
And take they our life,
Goods, fame, child, and wife,
 Though these all be gone,
 Our vict'ry has been won;
The Kingdom ours remaineth.

In John chapter 1, we learn that Jesus, God's only-begotten Son, is the Word. There is nothing that can defeat Him. He stands next to you on the field of battle and gives to you His gifts and the Holy Spirit. Nothing can defeat you. It is possible to lose all our earthly blessings as countless martyrs have before. Nevertheless, we will remain forever in God eternal Kingdom singing God's praises with angels and archangels and all the company of heaven.

Prayer: O Lord, thank You for giving us the eternal Gospel of salvation by grace through faith for Christ's sake. Grant that we may remain forever faithful to You and Your word and so be made truly free indeed receiving the crown of life, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

Psalm 46 was Martin Luther's inspiration for his world-renowned hymn, "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God." There were many times when Luther had reason to turn to this psalm. We mostly focus on his ongoing struggle with church and secular authorities. But Luther also faced other physical and mental challenges.

He ministered in Wittenberg during the plague. His thoughts on this were often shared during the pandemic.

God granted him a wonderful wife in Katherine Von Bora and a happy marriage. But two of his children died. One was just a few months old and the other was his thirteen-year-old daughter who died in his arms. Yes, Luther experienced many troubles in life and found comfort in God's word.

We, too, experience a life filled with troubles and sorrow. We each have our own burdens to bear. Nevertheless, God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. The sinful world may present us with challenges, yet we need not fear though the earth gives way.

All around us, nations and politicians may rage but the Lord of hosts is with us! He is our fortress. In all

these times of trouble, we can be still and calm knowing that God is on our side. He gave His only Son for us. His love is complete. He will care for us at all times and in all places until we join Him for all eternity.

Prayer: Almighty God, we live in troubled times. We experience trouble in our lives. Grant that in all this trouble we would turn to you in faith trusting in Your divine presence and protection for time and eternity, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

The word angel means messenger. Through the years, many have associated this angel of Revelation 14:6 with Martin Luther. They saw him as the messenger that restored the eternal gospel to the church. While Martin Luther does fit Revelation 14:6-7, so does every pastor and teacher who clearly proclaims the eternal gospel. Every mother who teaches her children about Jesus fits these words. Every father who leads his family in daily devotions fits these words. Every time you tell someone of Jesus and his love for sinners, these words apply to you.

The eternal gospel is this: God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life (John 3:16).

Prayer: O Lord, God, thank you for all messengers who bring Your eternal gospel to the people of the world. Grant that we may actively participate in bringing the message of salvation to every nation and tribe and language and people, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

²¹But now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, although the Law and the Prophets bear witness to it— ²²the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction: ²³for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, ²⁴and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, ²⁵whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith. This was to show God’s righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over former sins. ²⁶It was to show his righteousness at the present time, so that he might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus.

²⁷Then what becomes of our boasting? It is excluded. By what kind of law? By a law of works? No, but by the law of faith. ²⁸For we hold that one is justified by faith apart from works of the law.

If you ever wanted to sum up Lutheran theology, these words from Romans are a perfect fit. All religions of the world emphasize what you do for your own salvation. True Christian theology agrees with St. Paul and these words from Romans. Everything necessary for our salvation has been done for us by God in Christ Jesus. “the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction: for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus.”

The Reformation can be explained in these words: “For we hold that one is justified by faith apart from works of the law.”

Prayer: O Lord, we all fall short of Your glory, but You still love us and sent Jesus to grant us life and salvation. Thank you for this extravagant gift. Amen.

An ongoing challenge for children of the Reformation is to remain steadfast in God's grace and truth. The devil, the world, and our own sinful nature are always tempting us to abandon God's word and to find comfort in our own wisdom and understanding. In times past, the Gospel of salvation through faith in Christ was threatened by authorities of both church and state. Today, it is threatened by the fear of ridicule or discrimination with friends or in our places of employment. We pray in the collect that the Holy Spirit would keep us faithful in a world filled with enemies of the Gospel.

May we ever be faithful to the three solas of the Reformation. We are saved by FAITH ALONE, not by our works of righteousness. This salvation comes to us purely by GRACE ALONE. We can claim no credit. It was won for us by Christ on the cross and given to us freely. This is all revealed to us in SCRIPTURE ALONE. We never rely on human tradition or wisdom. We only trust what God has told us to be true in His holy word.

Prayer: Almighty and gracious Lord, pour out Your Holy Spirit on Your faithful people. Keep us steadfast in Your grace and truth, protect and deliver us in times of temptation, defend us against all enemies, and grant to Your Church Your saving peace; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

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
