Devotional Thoughts:

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My childhood home was a cross between "Leave it to Beaver" and "The Waltons." Maybe that's why these were two of my mother's favorite shows.

We weren't as affluent as the Cleavers and we weren't as impoverished as the Waltons. But we did share our evening dinner together almost every night. Mom would prepare a meal that would be ready shortly after dad returned home following his 10-hour workday. (I might add that his commute was a half hour and he worked 5 hours on Saturday for a 55-hour workweek to support our family.)

Eating with the family at suppertime was never optional. I remember that most of our dinner conversations were very much like those of our television counterparts. Work, school, and church were regular topics.

Our Gospel lesson for this week reminded me of one dinner discussion that I will never forget. It happened on the evening following my first day of high school.

Until that day, I had only one teacher in my classroom but now I was changing classes every hour and experienced a different teacher in each room. As we passed the potatoes and gravy, my father asked, "How was school? Do you like your teachers?"

In response, I boldly gave my assessment. I reported that I liked this teacher, that teacher, and another. I also listed those that I did not like.

My dad then gave me his words of wisdom that I have never forgotten. He said, "You better be careful. Sometimes first impressions can be misleading and turn out to be just the opposite of what you first thought."

I remember that conversation because it wasn't long before my assessment was turned on its head. Just a few weeks into the school year, my lists were totally reversed. It turned out that the teachers I thought I liked were now the ones that I didn't care for. While the ones that I gave a negative assessment to, turned out to be my favorites. Since that day, I have learned to be cautious with first impressions. I try to withhold judgment when meeting new people until they have proven themselves to me. This bit of wisdom served me well in more than 40 years of active ministry.

This incident came to mind while reading the Gospel lesson because, in it, Jesus evaluates life in a way that is totally contrary to my human judgment. By the world's way of thinking, the rich, those with full bellies, and those who laugh are blessed. Almost everything we do in life is done in pursuit of these goals. Yet, Jesus says to those individuals, "Woe!"

In contrast, Jesus says that those who are poor, hungry, and weep are the ones who are "Blessed!" Who would have guessed?

So what's the missing ingredient that turns our worldly thinking upside down? How is it that our human evaluation can be so contradictory to Jesus' words? The unseen factor that changes everything is God's love for us in Christ!

The real difference between the blessed and those who experience woe is their relationship to God. Those who trust in Jesus for salvation and believe God's promises are the truly blessed. They may be hated now by the worldly but great is their reward in heaven. The worldly may receive accolades now. They may be praised by the godless even as false prophets have always been praised. But this momentary glory turns out to be nothing in the end.

Jeremiah explains it this way, "Cursed is the man who trusts in man and makes flesh his strength, whose heart turns away from the LORD" (Jeremiah 17:5). "Blessed is the man who trusts in the LORD" (Jeremiah 17:7).

Jesus' cross is the perfect example of how God works through opposites. The cross appears to the world as the ultimate defeat of Jesus. The soldiers placed a crown of thorns on His head and mocked Him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" Then they spat upon Him (Matthew 27:29-31). Those who passed by the cross derided him, wagging their heads and saying, "You who would destroy the temple and rebuild it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross" (Matthew 27:39-40). The chief priests, with the scribes and elders, mocked him, saying, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. He is the King of Israel; let him come down now from the cross, and we will believe in him. He trusts in God; let God deliver him now, if he desires him. For he said, 'I am the Son of God." And the robbers who were crucified with him also reviled him in the same way (Matthew 27:41-44).

But in the "woe" of the cross, we receive God's ultimate blessings. In the sacrifice that Jesus offered there, we receive the forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation!

But short was their triumph; the Savior arose, And death, hell, and Satan He vanquished, His foes. The conquering Lord lifts His banner on high; He lives, yes, He lives, and will nevermore die. He's Risen, He's Risen, stanza 3, C. F. W. Walther

The truly blessed evaluate life from the perspective of eternity, not the first day of high school! In God's economy, things aren't always the way that they first appear to our human way of thinking. The cross led to the empty tomb!

Introduction

Happy Saint Valentine's Day!

Believe it or not, Valentine's Day is an official day of commemoration in the Church Calendar of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod. February 14 is designated for the commemoration of Valentine, Martyr. The LCMS website includes this biography of Saint Valentine:

A physician and priest living in Rome during the rule of the Emperor Claudius, Valentine become one of the noted martyrs of the third century. The commemoration of his death, which occurred in the year 270, became part of the calendar of remembrance in the early church of the West. Tradition suggests that on the day of his execution for his Christian faith, he left a note of encouragement for a child of his jailer written on an irregularly-shaped piece of paper. This greeting became a pattern for millions of written expressions of love and caring that now are the highlight of Valentine's Day in many nations.

No one can blame you if you weren't aware of St. Valentine's martyrdom. Very few people still refer to today as Saint Valentine's Day. Sometime in the 14th or 15th century, his day became associated with romantic love. No one is sure exactly why this happened although there are a number of theories.

His day gives us the opportunity to reflect on the varieties of love that we experience. The greatest and deepest love that we experience in life is the love that God has for us in Christ. This is the self-sacrificing love that Jesus had for us when He gave Himself for us on the cross. It is a love that we do not deserve. It is expressed in the words of Romans 5:8, "God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us."

Believe it or not, this is the love that God expects us to have in marriage. The Apostle Paul wrote to the Ephesians, "Husbands, love your wives, as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her" (Ephesians 5:25).

Every other kind of love is secondary to this self-sacrificing love. You may or may not fall into and out of romantic love. But this love is not romantic love. It is the action of the will. You cannot fall into or out of it. It is the love of determination and commitment, no matter what may come.

God never stops loving us even when we stop loving Him and reject His love! It is unfortunate that some contemporary Christians speak of "falling in love" with God. We do not have a romantic relationship with God. He's not our boyfriend or girlfriend!

St. Valentine knew God's love for him in Christ. He was so determined to return God's love that he refused to deny God even though it meant his martyrdom.

If Valentine's Day is a celebration of that kind of love, may it long flourish! May God grant us this same self-sacrificing love in our marriages and families.

Let us pray: Lord God, our heavenly Father, thank You for so loving the world that You gave Your onlybegotten Son. Grant that we may also love You with our whole hearts and our neighbors as ourselves through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

You may have noticed that Jesus begins the Sermon on the Plain and the Sermon on the Mount in the same way. What you may not have noticed is that Jesus was following the example of the Psalms. All three begin with the same word: Blessed!

If you look at Jesus' sermon carefully, you will also notice that He used the outline of Psalm 1. Psalm 1 shows us the distinction between the "Blessed" and the "Wicked." Jesus elaborates on this distinction in our Gospel lesson for this week.

In both Hebrew and Greek, the word translated as "blessed" has the first meaning of happy! Most of us are looking for happiness in our lives but many people are looking in the wrong places.

If you were to spend much time with me while I am watching television, you would quickly learn how distressed I am by the advertising of sports betting apps. The main purpose of these commercials is to show you how happy you will be when you wager and win using their apps. These commercials are deceptive on two levels. Statistically, we know that for every winner, there must be a loser. Second, how sad it is to see people willing to seek happiness at the expense of others.

Psalm 1 gives us the corrective. Happiness does not come from hurting others. Happiness does not come by walking, standing, or sitting in the way sinful people want us to. Real happiness comes from delighting in God's word. Real happiness comes from helping others.

In contrast, despite all of the deception of worldly propaganda, the wicked do not prosper. They are like chaff that the wind drives away. In the end, they perish. Jesus makes this clear when He explains that the ultimate blessing of the faithful is found in the great reward of heaven.

Prayer: O Lord, thank You for the happiness that You give to us in Jesus. Grant us the grace to delight in Your word and will. Move us to be the salt of the earth and the light of the world that You have called us to be as we await the day when we will join You in the mansions of heaven through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

"Gallia est omnis divisa in partes tres" is the famous beginning of Julius Caesar's The Gallic Wars. It is a well-known phrase even among non-Latin students. In translation, it reads, "All Gaul is divided into three parts."

This comes to mind because of our lessons for this week. Jesus' Sermon on the Plain, Psalm 1, and Jeremiah 17:5–8 each follow this theme: "All humanity is divided into two parts: The Blessed and the Cursed.

Jeremiah 17:5 teaches us, "Cursed is the man who trusts in man." To these people, Jesus says, "Woe." The Psalmist calls them wicked.

On the other hand, Jeremiah 17:7 tells us, "Blessed is the man who trusts in the LORD." Jesus explains that these are the ones who receive the Kingdom of God. God satisfies their needs. They shall not want. God turns their sorrow into laughter.

Another way to say this is, "All of humanity is on one of two paths." One is the path of life. The other is the path of death.

Jesus is the path of life. He is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. In Him is Light and this Light is the Life of humanity.

Sinfulness is the path of death. It is the path of darkness. It is the way of the devil, the world, and our own sinful flesh.


We thank God that He has called us out of darkness into His marvelous light. We thank God that He has taken us off the path of death and put us on the path of life. We thank God that through faith in Jesus we are now counted among the Blessed. Our sins are forgiven. Heaven is our home.

Peter puts it this way:

But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy (1 Peter 2:9-10)

Prayer: We therefore pray You to help Your servants, whom You have redeemed with Your precious blood. Make them to be numbered with Your saints in glory everlasting. Amen. (Taken from the Te Deum. You may wish to pray the entire Te Deum. It follows.)

1 Corinthians 15 is the great Resurrection Chapter of the Bible. It is a perfect example of how controversy can lead to a blessing. The Apostle Paul rightly tells us that the resurrection of the dead is essential to the Christian faith. Without the resurrection of the dead, Christianity would be nothing. But we would not have his clear teaching about the resurrection if it hadn't been a point of controversy in the Corinthian church. Some people were denying the resurrection and Paul knew that he had to counter their false doctrine as forcefully as possible.

You may have heard this old saw, "All religions are basically the same." It seems that even the most educated people repeat this unchristian adage. By it, I assume that they are trying to say that all religions teach basic morality. There may be some truth to this since God has written His law into the hearts of all mankind in the form of a conscience. However, Christianity is not primarily about teaching right and wrong. Christianity is about Jesus coming into the world to save sinners and give them eternal life. It's about the forgiveness of sins. It's about being rescued from sin, death, and the devil.

The Christian faith does expect people to live holy and righteous lives. It takes tremendous discipline to resist sin and seek God's will for our lives. But if this is all there is, Christianity is a waste of time. Paul puts it this way in verse 19, "If in this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied."

Never be deceived into believing that Christianity is just another religion. It is the only faith that teaches, "God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16).

Prayer: O Lord, thank You for the gift of eternal life and the promise of the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Grant us faith to put our trust in Jesus knowing that in the cross, He overcame sin, death, and the devil through the same Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Since Monday was Valentine's Day, we didn't look at the introit as is my custom for Mondays. So let's take it up today.

Our introit follows (or establishes) the theme of the day by giving the real solution to this age-old riddle, "Who are the blessed?" Just as Psalm 1, Psalm 119 begins with the word, "Blessed," but it continues by restating the word at the beginning of the second verse, too!

¹Blessed are those whose way is blameless, who walk in the law of the Lord!

²Blessed are those who keep his testimonies, who seek him with their whole heart,

Did you notice that these verses don't claim, "Blessed are those who win gold medals"? As you can guess, I've been watching the Olympics all week. It is wonderful to be physically accomplished and mentally strong. But contrary to popular belief, life is more than sports.

Through the years, I have thought it to be sad that gifted athletes are sometimes held to a lower standard of morality and conduct because of what they can do for the team. Coaches have been known to turn a blind eye to infractions committed by star players because of an unwholesome desire to win. On occasion, I have witnessed young athletes come to a tragic end because they were never held accountable for their actions.

True blessings come from being faithful to God and His word. True blessings come from seeking the Lord with our whole hearts. How wonderful it would be if we taught young people to be as dedicated to God as they are to sports. Alas, it will never be.

But there is something more important here that we should be careful not to miss. Psalm 119 begins with these words, "Blessed are those whose way is blameless." Read them again. Then answer this question, "Are you blameless?" None of us are! If this is the case, then none of us can be blessed!

But there is a way to be blameless. It comes through Jesus. He is the one who was blameless for us. Our sins, our failures, our false priorities are all placed upon His shoulders. He paid for our moral bankruptcy on the cross. In turn, through faith in Him, we receive His blamelessness. In Him, we are truly and completely blessed. We may never win a gold medal but we have been given the crown of life.

Prayer: O Lord, thank You for the blamelessness and blessings that are ours in Christ. Grant us Your Holy Spirit that we may walk according to Your law and keep Your commandments. Move us to seek You with our whole hearts through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

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
